

Eighth, Ninth Graders Show Bright Future In Area Track

The county high schools got a look at some of their future athletes at Modoc Field Saturday afternoon and were happy at the sight as they watched some good marks set in the middle portion of the Klamath Basin Athletic Association Invitational Track meet, the eighth and ninth grades.

SOME good marks were established for future tracksters to take shots at. All the marks in this meet were considered records since this is the first annual track meet put on by the

newly-formed Klamath Basin Athletic Association. Bob Williams, Curt Peterstetter and Greg Scott all were double winners in this meet. Williams pulled down wins in both the hurdle events. He copped the 70-yard highs in 9.5

and the 120-yard lows in a fine 14.9. Peterstetter won the pole vault at 11 feet and won the high jump at 5.3. He also placed in a tie for second in the open high jump in the night meet at 5.8.

Greg Scott garnered a pair

of dash victories. He captured the 70-yard dash in 8.3 and topped the 150-yard entrants in 16.45. Bob Moore was second in the 70 in 8.35 and Mickey Bender was second in the 150 in 16.5.

Bender got off a good jump in the broad jump to set a good standard for himself and others to shoot at. He leaped 19 feet 8 1/2 inches. Scott was second in this event at 18.5.

Jim Mitchell won the shot put in a walk with a toss of 45-4. Bob Middleton placed second with a throw of 43-8. Middleton was third in the javelin at 129-4 and

he won the discus at 139-9 1/2. Steve Eckert grabbed off the first place ribbon in the javelin with a throw of 136-11. Fred Franklin was assistant second at 120-5 and then Middleton.

Dave Coffman set a good mark for the 1320-yard runners to go at. He paced the three-quarters of a mile in 3:40.9. Jackson was second and Hagen third.

Bob Moore outran the field handsly to capture the 330-yard dash in a fine 38.5. Bill Steber was second at 39.6 and Dale Parrish third at 41.4. Britt took the 660-yard run in 1:31.7 and

Duane Hoptowit was second in 1:34.5. The 440-yard relay team from Klamath Union, Greg Scott, Bob Williams, Bob Moore and Mickey Bender was clocked in 46.7 to win. KBAA team was second and Fremont third.

Williams took the hurdles in flying style. He won the 120-yard lows in 14.9 and the 70-yard highs in 9.5. Bob Tucker was second in the lows in 15.2.

Black Indicted With Narcotics

BALTIMORE (UPI)—Timothy N. Black, in whose apartment professional football star Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb was found dying at a kitchen table, has been indicted by a grand jury on charges of possessing narcotics equipment.

According to the police, Black said that he was a friend of the Pittsburgh Steelers star and the two of them had used narcotics on occasion. Lipscomb was taken to a hospital from Black's apartment and died en route.

Black's bail of \$3,000 is being continued and he faces trial in a Baltimore criminal court at a later date. An autopsy report showed that Lipscomb had died from an overdose of heroin.

Cincinnati Decisions Phils, 5-2
