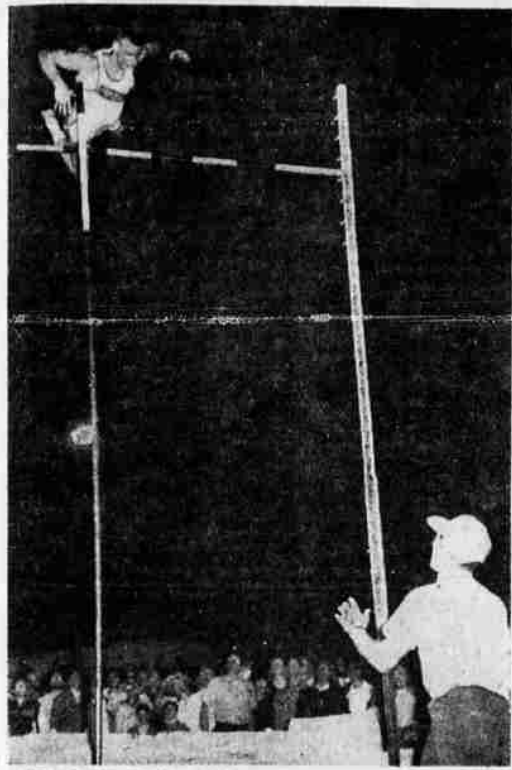

Yank Basketball Team Dropped By Brazil 85-81

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—The United States, which invented the game of basketball and never has lost an Olympic or Pan-American court championship, still is looking for its first world title.

Brazil won its second straight world crown Saturday night by beating the Yanks, 85-81, after Yugoslavia downed Russia, 69-67, in the fourth annual round-robin series.

The U. S. squad which appeared here was virtually the same team that swept unbeaten through the recent Pan-American games at Sao Paulo. However, it was not considered up to U. S. Olympic standards.

Some 25,000 fans went wild Saturday night after Brazil avenged a Pan-American loss to the Yanks.

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America's Track Hopes Brighten Following Record Setting Relays

MODESTO, Calif. (UPI)—America's chances in the meet with Russia this summer never looked better today following a night of world-record cracking in the 22nd annual California Relays Saturday.

World marks were bettered in the pole vault, two mile relay and the broad jump; and the American record in the mile was topped by Peter Snell of New Zealand, who was clocked in 3:34.9.

The pole vault mark, which is knocked over just about every weekend since the invention of the glass pole, went to Brian Sternberg, a 20-year-old University of Washington sophomore who cleared 16 feet, 7 inches.

The broad jump of 27 feet, 4 inches by a 20-year-old Washington soph, Phil Shinnick, probably never will be recognized. A careless official watching the wind gauge failed to turn it on—so the mark probably will be listed as wind-aided.

"It's a shame," said meet director Tom Moore, "there was practically no wind at the time."

The surprising thing about the leap was that before Saturday, Shinnick never had jumped further than 25 feet, 3 inches.

"But I got all excited when I saw Ralph Boston jump nearly 27 feet," he said.

Boston finished second with a great leap of 27 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

It was a night of fine performances. And the best overall probably was the glamor event, the mile.

It was supposed to be a match between Snell and America's Jim Beatty. But two others got into the act. Cary Weisiger of the Marines finished second in 3:37.5. Next came Beatty, then Jim Grelle, the latter two each timed in 3:38.

"I was flat for the race," said Beatty without offering an alibi. "I don't know what happened. Maybe I trained too much for the 5,000 meters. I can run 3:38 any time. I should have done better."

Snell said he ran the race he had planned—mainly keeping an eye on Beatty.

"So I was surprised with the showing of Weisiger," said the New Zealander. "But I was all worked up for this race for a long time. Then, when they played the New Zealand national anthem, I became inspired."

For the first time in history, two men bettered the 200-foot mark in the discus in one meet: Al Oerter won it with a powerful heave of 202 feet, 11 inches, and Jay Silvester finished only second with a great toss of 201 feet, 10 1/2 inches in the high jump.

The two-mile relay world mark was set by Oregon State with a clocking of 7:18.9, knocking over the old mark of 7:19.4, set by a United States national team in 1960. Running on this club were Jan Underwood, Jerry Brady, Norm Hoffman and Morgan Groth.

Rains Halt Golf Play

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—The final round of the \$50,000 Memphis Open was due to get under way this afternoon after two reschedulings in as many days due to heavy rains.

Eighty-nine golfers—81 pros and 8 amateurs—remained in the field after Sunday's slated final round was washed out by thunderstorms.

PGA officials moved qualifications for the U.S. Open, which had been set for today, up to Tuesday. Pros who were signed to qualify at other courses will be allowed to qualify at Memphis, according to Mark Thomas, tournament supervisor.

More rain was forecast for today, but optimistic officials went ahead and scheduled 36 holes of play. Saturday's 18 holes were rained out also.

"A rainout today would just move everything up a day," said Dick Giffin, PGA representative. Open qualifications would be moved to Wednesday, and the pro-am for the Indianapolis Open would be moved from Wednesday to Thursday. The Indianapolis event is slated to begin Friday.

Tony Lama led the field after Friday's competition with a six-under-par 67-134. Close behind at 136 were George Knudson, Jerry Edwards, Harold Kneec and Tommy Aaron.

Call it savvy or savoir faire, but route-going pitchers are becoming commonplace in the Pacific Coast League while separating the boys from the ballplayers.

No one felt the impact of the "Full-routers" more yesterday than Hawaii and Salt Lake City, both last-place teams in the northern and southern divisions.

Eight pitchers hurled complete games yesterday in the triple-A loop and five of them won their ball games. Scott Breeden and Ted Willis each went the route for San Diego in the Padres' 11-2 and 4-1 twin conquests of Hawaii, making the Cincinnati farm club the winningest team in the league with 26 victories.

Padres Score Early Hawaii's Fred Newman matched Willis' distance stunt in the nightcap which was settled by San Diego's three-run splurge in the first inning and Art Shamsky's insurance four-master two innings later.

In other contests, pitchers Connie Grob (2-3) and Dave Giusti (4-3) of Oklahoma City hurled complete games in sending Salt Lake to its 10th defeat in a row 5-0, 6-3; Lou Klimchuck's 10th-inning homer gave Denver an 11-8 win over Dallas-Ft. Worth but the Texans captured the opener 13-7; Seattle scored all its runs in one inning for a 5-2 victory over Tacoma after the Giants nipped Seattle 3-2 in the opener, and Spokane edged Portland 3-1 after losing 11-3.

Other route-going pitchers were Bob Heffner of Seattle who lost to Tacoma by one run that scored when the Rainiers failed to complete a double play with the bases loaded.

Pig Inning Seattle's Pete Smith came back in the seven-inning nightcap to beat the Giants with no relief help. The Rainiers tallied all five of their runs in the third on singles by Dalton Jones, Dave Hall, Archie Sken and Russ Gibson, plus doubles by Bobby Gene Smith and Jim Rivera, and Billy Harrell's triple.

Bob Flynn pitched all seven innings for the Giants.

Johnson 18-5 Favorite In Pastrano Title-Go

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Light heavyweight champion Harold Johnson is a prohibitive favorite at 18-5 to beat clever Willie Pastrano at the Las Vegas convention center Saturday night in their title fight, which features this week's boxing schedule.

Their 15-round bout will be televised nationally by ABC.

This will be the fifth defense for muscular Johnson of Philadelphia, 34, since he won the vacant title in 1961.

Twenty-seven-year-old Pastrano of Miami Beach, second-ranking contender, clinched the title shot by upsetting Wayne Thornton of Fresno, Calif., by a decision on May 4.

Johnson seeks his 20th straight victory. He hasn't been beaten since May 6, 1955, when knocked out by Julio Mederos in the "doped orange" incident.

Johnson is heavily favored because of his combined skill and punch. Pastrano is the speediest and most elusive performer in the 175-pound division, but he is a comparatively light hitter.

Promoters Mel Greb and Jack Doyle hope for a gate of \$90,000 in the 8,000-seat convention center. In addition the television fee to the promotion is \$60,000. Johnson is guaranteed \$37,500; Pastrano \$21,250.

An excellent to round light-weight contenders' fight is slated for Caracas, Venezuela, Monday night, when third-ranked Bunny Grant of Jamaica, B.W.I., meets fourth-rated Carlos Hernandez of Venezuela.

Rigney Shuffles LA Lineup In Effort To Ignite Angels

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Manager Bill Rigney devoted today's break in his club's schedule to play musical chairs with the Los Angeles Angels' lineup while awaiting the arrival of the Detroit Tigers Tuesday.

Rigney and general manager Fred Haney's five-player switch over the weekend apparently shook up the Angels enough so that they took the final game from the Kansas City Athletics Sunday 6-4, coming up with a big inning and a pair of timely hits for the victory.

With Bo Belinsky headed for the Hawaii Islanders of the Pacific Coast League, Rigney said the eccentric southpaw's sidekick, Dean Chance, will return to the starting rotation this week, probably in Thursday's day encounter with the Tigers.

And Rigney was satisfied with the initial effort of first baseman Charles Dees and will have him back in the lineup tomorrow. Dees in his first major league turn at bat Sunday doubled in a run and also demonstrated excellent defensive ability.

Dees was one of the players involved in the big switch that also sent outfielder Ken Hunt to Hawaii and rookie catcher Ed Kirkpatrick to Nashville as well as bringing in veteran catcher Hank Poole, signed as a free agent. Rigney was contemplating using outfielder George Thomas at third base when action resumes Tuesday with Lee Thomas going to the outfield while Dees occupies first base.

The Angels mounted a 10-hit attack against the Athletics to salvage the final game of the series and Rigney commented that the victory, "may have gotten us over the hump."

Infielders Billy Moran and Jim Fregosi wielded the big bats for the Angels, driving in two runs each in the big sixth inning when Los Angeles batted around.

Fregosi had three hits in four times at bat and drove in three runs while Moran had a pair of hits to his credit and two runs batted in.

When action resumes again Tuesday, Ken McBride was slated to take the mound against the Tigers who sent word ahead that Mickey Lolich would be their hurler.

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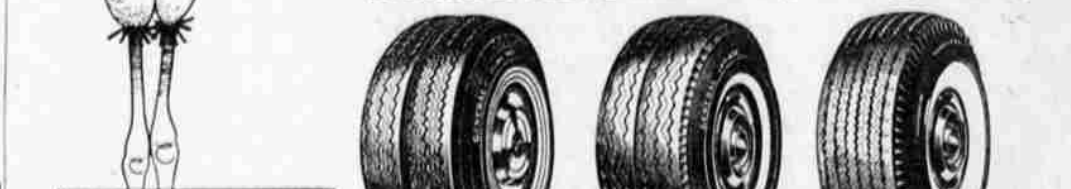
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
