Antisegregation demonstrations had been planned for this past weekend, but were held in abeyance pending today's meeting at 4 p.m. EDT.

Mayor Allen Thompson, who has vowed that segregation will be preserved here, invited 14 Negroes to the meeting and asked the city's two Negro ministerial groups to send two representatives each. Four of the 14 were chosen by Negroes at a civil rights rally last Tuesday.

**Ministers Confer**  
A group of top Negro and white ministers also have begun conferring on the racial situation, but Thompson said the city administration has not sanctioned these conferences.

Evers also said he had not been advised of any conclusions reached by the ministers.

At Greensboro, N.C., Negroes halted their daily demonstrations over the weekend but told Mayor David Schenck they would resume this afternoon unless "some concrete, tangible, positive

**Negro Leader Critical Of JFK On Segregation**  
LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. told about 20,000 persons taking part in a "Freedom Rally for Birmingham" Sunday night that President Kennedy "had not done enough" to outlaw segregation.

King, leader of the Alabama desegregation movement, told an enthusiastic crowd that the President "had done some significant things on civil rights" but that much more should be done.

After the rally an estimated 1,000 persons marched the four miles through the downtown area to city hall led by two Negroes holding two police dogs on leashes.

The assemblage was quiet and orderly during the march and the half-hour they remained at city hall to listen to the vice chairman of the Los Angeles chapter of the Congress for Racial Equality give a short talk.

Some marchers carried signs with such slogans as "Equality."

**Other Developments**  
Elsewhere, there were these developments:

—A group of Negro organizations at Clarksdale, Miss., asked city officials for an audience to discuss racial problems. The Negroes threatened mass demonstrations if their request went unheeded.

—North Carolina Gov. Terry Sanford told Negro college graduates at Elizabeth City, N.C., that "racial tolerance cannot be ordered—no proclamation can do away with prejudices and discrimination."

—The Southern Regional Council in Atlanta called upon the South to end segregation in governmental facilities and businesses serving the general public.

—Negroes planned a meeting in Richmond, Va., tonight to lay strategy for more antisegregation demonstrations against downtown theaters.

—The Montgomery Advertiser-Journal, starting today, will carry news of interests to Negroes in all editions instead of in separate editions.

## Both Parties Eye San Francisco As Site For Presidential Meet

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Both political parties are reported eyeing San Francisco as a strong contender for their 1964 presidential conventions, but neither will make its choice until next month.

The Democrats were said to be leaning toward San Francisco and Atlantic City, although party leaders still are awaiting a firm offer from Chicago.

Chicago already appears to be the strongest rival of San Francisco for the Republican meeting.

Neither party has ruled out any bidding cities, however. Detroit, Philadelphia and Miami Beach are still in the running for both conventions, while Baltimore has made a bid to the Democrats and Dallas is seeking the GOP meeting.

**Meet In June**  
The Republican decision will be made by the party's national committee when it meets June 21 in Denver. The Democrats plan to meet in Washington June 23 to make their site selection.

Cooling of relations between the Kennedy administration and the Cuban refugee groups in Florida was reported to have caused the Democrats to lose interest in Miami Beach. Racial tension in the South also discouraged them.

Atlantic City has transportation problems because its airport is unable to handle jet planes. The Democrats have found, however, that a nearby jetport could accommodate special flights.

The Republicans expect to hold their convention well ahead of the Democrats because the GOP is not renominating an incumbent president and will need more time to build up its candidate. GOP leaders want their convention to start July 13, 1964, or July 20, 1964.

The Democrats, who undoubtedly will renominate President Kennedy, plan a mid-August convention.

**Says Goldwater Leads**  
A Republican leader said Sunday that Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona had "more hard support than anybody" for the GOP presidential nomination but no contender had it sewed up.

The statement came from Sen. Thurston Morton, Ky., former

GOP national chairman. Morton noted that Goldwater's support was in a relatively few states while New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller had "a lot of support in many parts of the country."

Morton said he believed Rockefeller's divorce and remarriage "well could be an asset" and that his re-election as New York governor in 1962 indicated the divorce was no political handicap.

A newspaper poll of Republican

convention delegates also showed strong support for Goldwater. The poll, conducted by the Indianapolis News, showed 339 GOP delegates favoring Goldwater, 244 for Rockefeller, 24 for Michigan Gov. George Romney and scattered support for others.

The newspaper, in announcing the results today, said the ballots were sent in mid-April to 1,331 delegates and replies were received from 707.
