

Shirley Booth, E. Marshall Win Second Emmy Awards

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Shirley Booth and E. G. Marshall, two old pros from Broadway, shared television's top awards today as the best actress and actor of the 1962-63 season.

Miss Booth and Marshall both won Emmys at Sunday night's 15th annual awards presentations as the best performers in regular series. It was the second year in a row for both stars.

The middle-aged actress won her golden statuette for her role as the doleful housemaid in "Hazel." She won a motion picture Oscar in 1952 for her performance in "Come Back, Little Sheba."

Marshall's second straight triumph resulted from his portrayal as the straight-laced defense attorney on the highly rated "The Defenders" series.

Another Broadway veteran, Kim Stanley, won the best single performance Emmy for her role as a drug-addicted lawyer in a two-part segment of the "Ben Casey" series titled "A Cardinal Act of Mercy."

English star Trevor Howard was voted the Emmy for best single performance by an actor for his title role in "The Invincible Mr. Disraeli," which was beamed as a segment of "The Hallmark Hall of Fame."

But it was a documentary, "The Tunnel," which carried away the best program of the year award—as well as best documentary laurels.

A grim and true account of the digging of an escape tunnel from East to West Berlin beneath the infamous wall, "The Tunnel" actually was filmed during the event itself. The controversial show was delayed in being televised for two months because of the Berlin crisis.

Sunday night's studded audiences in New York's Hotel Americana with Arthur Godfrey as host, in Hollywood's Palladium with Joey Bishop in charge, and in the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington, D.C., with Chet Huntley at the helm.

Popular Winner
One of the most popular awards was to Carol Burnett, who was voted the best performer in a variety or musical program for her appearance in "Julie and Carol at Carnegie Hall."

"The Dick Van Dyke Show" was voted the best comedy program and collected the best comedy writing and directing Emmys, too. But the overall winner of the evening was "The Defenders."

Dinah Shore Married In Quiet Rite

REDLANDS, Calif. (UPI) — Television star Dinah Shore was married Sunday to Palm Springs, Calif., contractor Maurice F. Smith—only two days after the blonde singer picked up the first divorce papers from her first marriage.

The wedding, attended by Miss Shore's two children, was as much a surprise to her friends in Hollywood as her separation from actor George Montgomery in December of 1961.

The couple refused to say where they would honeymoon, but Smith said they probably would spend a week driving through Northern California.

The quiet civil ceremony was performed at the home of Superior Judge Joseph Ciano here. Besides Miss Shore's children, Melissa Ann, 15, and John David, 10, others attending were Smith's two sons, Dexter, 12, and Dana, 5. Melissa Ann was maid of honor and Dexter was the best man.

"I hadn't thought of getting married this soon," the 45-year-old singer said, "but it was a woman's prerogative to change her mind."

Italian Film Wins Award

CANNES, FRANCE (UPI) — "The Leopard," an Italian movie directed by Luchino Visconti, won the Cannes International Film Festival's top award, the "Golden Palm," Thursday night.

Irish actor Richard Harris was named the best actor for his brash portrayal of a rugged hero in Britain's "This Sporting Life." France's Marina Vlady was named best actress for her role in the Italian movie "The Queen Bee."

Actress Arlene Francis Injured In Highway Mishap

NEW YORK (UPI) — Actress Arlene Francis, injured Sunday in a head-on automobile collision on Long Island in which one person was killed, was reported in satisfactory condition today at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center.

Four other persons, including a nine-year-old girl whose mother was killed, were injured in the crash on Northern State Parkway near Lake Success, N.Y.

Miss Francis, who was returning to the city from Mincola, N.Y., for the television program, "What's My Line," on which she is a panelist, was taken unconscious to Meadowbrook Hospital in East Meadow, N.Y. She was transferred to the New York hospital after regaining consciousness several hours after the accident.

The 51-year-old star, who recently closed in the Broadway play, "Tchin-tchin," received a fractured collar bone, a minor concussion, scalp lacerations and multiple bruises. A medical center spokesman said "her face was unharmed."

The others injured were in a car driven by Joseph Arco, 34, of Brooklyn, whose wife, Rose, 34, was pronounced dead on arrival at Meadowbrook Hospital. Police said Miss Francis' control apparently went out of the car when she tried to avoid a minor accident between two other cars. They said her car jumped the center divider and crashed head-on into Arco's car.

RAINIER GOES HOME
NEW YORK (UPI) — Prince Rainier of Monaco ended his five weeks in this country Friday and flew home, leaving his wife, Princess Grace, behind. She will remain here until Tuesday.

It was the couple's first trip to the United States in two years, and included a Philadelphia visit to see Princess Grace's mother, Mrs. John B. Kelly Sr. The royal couple also saw several Broadway shows and met astronaut L. Gordon Cooper Jr.

Northern Cities Battle Negro Problem

NEW YORK (UPI) — If one word could be used to symbolize the Negro problem in New York City, the word would be Harlem. Civil rights leaders on both sides of the color line agree that the removal of Harlem and all it represents from the face of the nation's largest metropolis would all but eliminate the racial tensions here.

There are slightly more than one million Negroes living in New York City and they represent about 12 per cent of the city's population. Ten years ago it was roughly 10 per cent and the increase is the result of Negro migration from the South as well as the exodus of the white middle class to suburbia, since both movements show no signs of decline, the percentage is expected to continue rising.

Nearly 35 per cent of New York's Negroes live in Harlem, and most of the others live in what might be called suburban Harlems in other parts of the city.

There is no law enforcing this residential segregation, but to escape from it is almost as difficult here as it is in communities where segregation has the official approval of local governments. And therein lies the difference between the racial conflict in New York and the one that now is on the rampage in the South. For unlike the South, the civil rights struggle here is not a legal problem.

Best In Nation
"New York City and New York state have the most enlightened civil rights laws in the country," says Stanley Lowell, chairman of the City Commission on Human Rights. And Negro leaders would be the first to agree.

New York Negroes have no trouble exercising their right to vote; there are no legal barriers to school integration; the housing of blacks by city and state, making it illegal for realtors to refuse rental or sale on racial grounds; and it is against the law to refuse employment to Negroes because of race.

"The shortcomings of our laws are that they're all negative," Lowell said. "You can enact legislation forbidding people to practice overt discrimination, but you can't pass laws demanding employers to actively seek out qualified Negroes and you can't pass laws forcing white Americans to accept Negroes as first-class citizens. And that's what the white community must do. We must increase our awareness of the Negro problem and we must do something about it before it blows up in our faces."

Tension On Rise
There has not been a serious race riot in New York since 1943 when racial tensions erupted in Harlem and quickly spread to other parts of the city.

Since then there have been a few minor skirmishes, "but these did not originate from racial problems as such," said Deputy Police Commissioner Walter Arm. Arm confirms the recent reports that conditions in Harlem and other Negro areas have been more tense and hostile in recent weeks.

"I don't know if it's a resentment over what's been going on in Birmingham (Ala.) and other parts of the South or what, but the atmosphere is not good. Not good at all," he said.
