County Board Sets Up Schools For Balloting

The Klamath County School Board has established the elementary school buildings in the district as polling places for the June 10 school consolidation election. However, the school election precincts served by each elementary school have been changed so that they coincide with existing Klamath County election precincts.

The reason for the change is because the school district has to rely on the county clerk's list of registered voters and these lists are based on the county's election precincts. A number of the county election precincts overlap two or more school subdistricts and it would be possible for a voter in one of these election precincts to appear and vote at two or more elementary schools if the school election precincts did not coincide with the County election precincts.

While such a voter would be detected when the vote was canvassed and the poll books were checked, it would be impossible to tell how he voted and it was feared this might raise serious legal questions concerning the validity of the election.

The polling places for the legal voters of the Klamath County School District are established as follows:

Voters in the Dairy, Lost River and Langell Valley precincts will vote at Bonanza Elementary; South Homedale precinct at Peterson School; North Homedale and East Homedale at Ferguson; South Enterprise and South Altamont at Stearns; Midland precinct at Falcon Heights Elementary; Wood River at Fort Klamath School; Plevna precinct at Keno Elementary and Beauty and Bly precincts at Bly Elementary.

Voters in Klamath Lake, Lakeview, Orinda and Stewart-Lenox precincts will vote at the Fairhaven Elementary School and the Shasta School will be the polling place for residents of the West Shasta, South Shasta, Shasta, East Shasta and North Shasta precincts. West and East Malin precinct residents will vote at Malin Elementary and West and East Merrill at Merrill Elementary. Residents at Gilchrist, Odell and

Police Check Accidents Involving Auto Damage

The Klamath Falls Police Department investigated two week-end accidents that resulted in major damage to three cars, and arrested the driver of another car on a drunk driving charge.

A city patrolman observed a car driven by William J. Bordeaux, 23, weaving on the South Sixth Street overpass at 3:11 a.m. Saturday. The vehicle, which apparently was traveling at a high rate of speed, hit the island divider and almost crashed at one point before the driver was stopped on South Sixth near Avalon.

The driver tested .32 in a blood test given at Klamath Valley Hospital. A test of .15 is considered evidence of intoxication.

Two cars received major damage when they collided at the Shasta Way and Division Street intersection at 2:20 a.m. Saturday.

One of the vehicles, driven by Clifford A. Bort, 31, 2344 Orchard Avenue, was traveling north on South Sixth and turned right at Division Street and was crossing Shasta Way when it collided with a car driven by Charles W. Hammond, 43, 2043 Hope Street.

Hammond was driving south on South Sixth when he turned left onto Shasta Way. Both drivers said they thought the other was going to stop.

Edgar Jones, 26, 432 Broad Street, escaped injury when his car was wrecked when it smashed into the back of a Consolidated Freight semi-truck parked on Elm Street near Market.

The Jones vehicle was proceeding west on Elm when Jones said he swerved sharply to avoid another car heading straight for him. Jones apparently couldn't pull out of the swerve in time to avoid hitting the truck.

Accidents Claim 5 Persons On Northern Cal Highways

YREKA — Five people were killed and two others received minor injuries in four traffic accidents on Northern California highways during the weekend, the California Highway Patrol has reported.

Killed in a two-car head-on collision on U.S. 99, 20 miles south of Yreka, about 2:40 p.m., Friday, were:

Florence Hall, 71, driver of one of the cars and her passenger, Code Hall, 79, both of Weed, and Chang Dim Lim, 69, operator of the other automobile and his passenger, B. A. Leon, 32, both of Mount Shasta.

The other fatality was Joseph Henry Werbeck, 39, Portland, Ore., who lost control of his automobile about 10:35 p.m., Sunday, when he apparently attempted to avoid a deer crossing the highway. The car proceeding northbound at a high rate of speed, went onto the shoulder of the road and threw Werbeck about 60 feet through the air and onto the pavement. The victim was pronounced dead on arrival at the Mount Shasta Hospital.

In the four-car fatal, an employee of the California Highway Patrol said he was driving behind the northbound Lim vehicle when he observed a southbound car operated by Mrs. Hall suddenly crossed the center line. The driver was attempting to return to the southbound lane when she collided with the Lim vehicle, the witness said.

Leon had arrived in the United States from Cuba several months ago. The other three were long-time residents of Siskiyou County.

Two other motorists were injured in one-car accidents and included Thomas M. Dillon, 18, Mount Shasta, who received an eye injury when he drove his car into a divider strip on U.S. 99, north of Dunsmuir, about 7:59 p.m., Saturday, and Cecil William Engleman, 18, Yreka, who also received an eye injury.

Engleman lost control of his automobile on a curve on State Highway 82, about five miles west of Yreka, and slammed into a guard rail, 11 p.m., Friday. The victim was taken to the Siskiyou County Hospital. Dillon was treated for his injury at the Mount Shasta Hospital.

cities, and the one-shot withholding tax collection speedup held in reserve for use if the cigarette tax is reformed by the voters.

—A 1 per cent net receipts tax on all income over \$500 to \$16,000, and 1 1/2 per cent over \$16,000.

—Graduated income tax with a new fractional rate schedule.

—A 5 per cent optional standard deduction.

—Unlimited medical deduction above 5 per cent of income.

—A \$24 tax credit for a single person, \$48 credit for a married couple, and \$20 credit for each dependent.

—Personal capital gains tax revised to a maximum 5 per cent tax on gain, one-year holding of asset required, \$1,000-loss carry forward limit, and elimination of the "reinvest in Oregon" requirement.

—Corporate excise tax: Manufacturing 4 per cent up to \$25,000, and 4.5 per cent above; business, 6 per cent up to \$25,000, and 6.5 per cent above.

The package is designed to raise an additional \$60 million needed to finance a \$405 million general fund budget for the 1963-65 biennium.

If the compromise is rejected either by the full House or Senate, a new conference committee would be appointed.

KFPA Selected Winner Of State Safety Award

For having attained the best safety record among 14 forest protective associations and districts throughout the state during 1962, the Klamath Forest Protective Association has been named the winner of the Annual Safety Program Award by State Forester D. L. Phipps.

On behalf of the association, Supervisor George Wardell of the KFPA was to receive from Jim Walker, assistant state forester, a plaque citing the local organization for its achievement. The presentation was to be made sometime this afternoon at KFPA headquarters.

The ceremony will mark the first time that the KFPA has received the award since it became established several years ago, Wardell said.

The award, given annually to the fire district with the best safety record involving vehicles and personnel, will go to KFPA which has not had a chargeable accident in the past 36 months, Wardell states.

A letter from State Forester Phipps to the KFPA disclosing that it was the recipient of the award states in part:

"Your record is a commendable one. It speaks well of your leadership ability and your recognition of the value of safety in an efficient operation."

"We are pleased to note the tangible evidence of the success of your safety program in lower insurance rates and trust that you have noted the increased efficiency and fewer absences."
