

Wool Prices Expected To Decline Moderately

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department said Monday world wool prices are expected to decline moderately during the remainder of 1963 because of competition from manmade fibers.

In a review of the wool situation, the department said that during the early months of 1963, world prices were the highest since late 1957 and early 1958 for the finer grades of wool and the highest since early 1960 for the medium and coarser grades. Demand was stable for the lower-than-normal supplies, due to lower carryover stocks and smaller production.

The department said consumption can be expected to remain steady through 1963. Total use of

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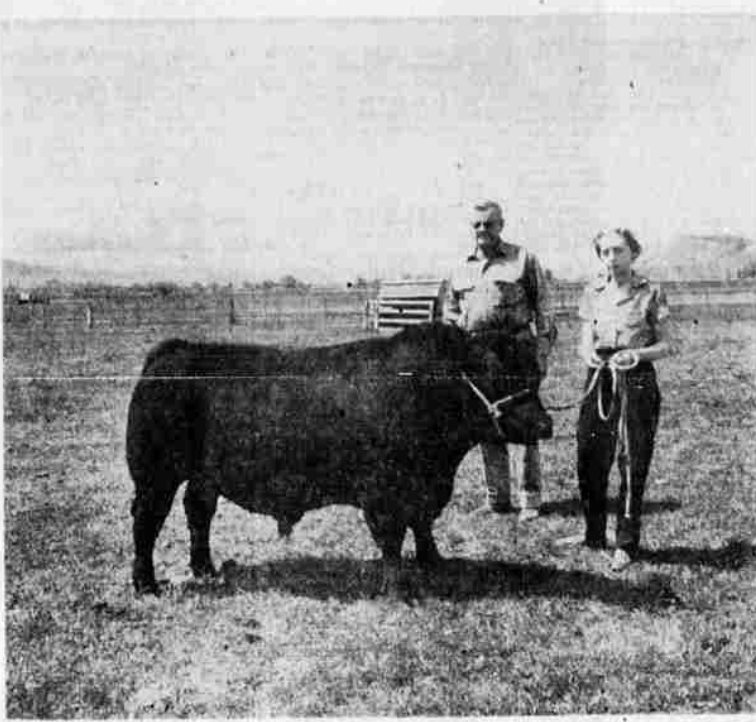

New Wheat Proposal Speculated

With the defeat of the national wheat referendum, speculation is running heavy on the possibility of no wheat program for 1964. However, practical politics creep into the picture in spite of the clamor at the moment. Next year is a national election year. It is inconceivable that the administration would be willing to hit the campaign trail in November following a harvest price of \$1 wheat and attempt to garner votes of the nation's two million wheat farmers.

On the other side of the coin, a number of Congressmen have said they would push for a new wheat legislation based on voluntary cutbacks tied to supports. There has even been some talk of reviving the direct payment schemes evolved by the Brannan plan of a few years back.

One editorial we've seen came up with a novel suggestion. The gist of it was to the effect that we are always experimenting with new plans for controlling supply and demand, and suggested we experiment with free enterprise for a year to see what would happen.

Such a suggestion would have been humorously ridiculous a few years ago, but now is being offered in a serious vein. Contrarywise, a few years ago a plan to control supply and demand by government edict would have met with scorn. It shows how far we have moved toward socialistic thinking in a period of 20 years.

Another amusing note. All supply control plans are predicated on the theory that they are temporary and are only being used to return to supply and demand. Someday.

Grain Receipts Reflect Slump

Grain movement through the grain inspection division of the Oregon Department of Agriculture appeared to be moving toward a slump the first of this month.

Incoming shipments inspected in Portland in April dropped to 8,547,694 bushels from 10,619,409 bushels in March. Wheat continued to be the main incoming grain, with the total in Portland 7,208,731 bushels. In March the figure for wheat was 9,168,794 bushels.

Wheat exports going through the Portland office totaled 7,775,181 bushels for April compared with 7,516,327 bushels in March.

At the Pendleton office of the grain inspection division the grain weighed and inspected dropped from 186,134 bushels in March to 125,400 bushels in April.

The Merrill office had four track inspections and 11 truck inspections in April. In March there were 69 track inspections and one truck inspection by that office.

Breeders Service Selects 2 Bulls From Warren Herd

Scott and Zephra Warren, Algoma Angus cattle breeders, received enviable recognition for their herd recently when the American Breeders Service selected two of their yearling bulls for use in their artificial insemination service.

The American Breeders Service select their bulls only from herds that have been kept supervised records for several years. This provides complete information on the producing ability of the dam and the sire, of all calves born in the herd.

The bulls were selected after thorough examination of the records of many herds in the United States. The selection was based on the records the Warrens kept in connection with the Oregon Beef Improvement Association and the Performance Registry International, headquartered at Denver, Colo.

The Oregon program was developed and is conducted as a cooperative activity between Oregon State Extension Service and beef cattle producers of the state. Scott Warren is vice president and a director of the association.

Under these programs the cattle are weighed and graded by the county agent, as weaners and yearlings. Ray Petersen, local agent, has worked with the Warrens since they started official records in 1955. One of the bulls sold, Algoma Bardoliermere 46, had a 205-day adjusted weaning weight of 615 lbs. and his yearling adjusted weight was 1095 lbs. The other bull, Algoma Bardoliermere 48, weighed 643 lbs. as a weaner and 1018 lbs. as a yearling.

Their bull calves have weighed as much as 664 lbs. at the 205-day weaning weight. Requirements for a weaner is 475 lbs. at 205 days without a nurse cow or creep feed and 675 lbs. for a yearling. It is estimated that only about 10 per cent of the beef cattle in the United States will make these weights.

In addition to meeting very high standards of performance and conformation, the bulls were thoroughly examined by a veterinarian from the Madison headquarters for any disease or physical defects.

Both bulls were sired by Illini Bardoliermere 5, purchased from the University of Illinois. The offspring from this bull have been rapid gaining cattle with very desirable conformation. Ninety per cent of his calves have exceeded the minimum requirements of the Beef Improvement Association.

The Warren bulls were shipped to Madison, Wisconsin, national headquarters for the company, where they will be bred artificially to 600 cows each to get an actual progeny test on the bulls.

Part of the terms of the sale provide for the Warrens to retain one-third ownership in these two bulls. This makes it possible to use semen from the bulls in their own herd. Also, through the transaction, the Warrens acquired one-third interest in a bull, Ankorian F. A. 361, owned by the American Breeders Service and in use by them in their service. He is a son of Eileenmere 1032, International Champion in 1949. This bull was proven a superior carcass
