## Analyst Notes World Gains Credited To United Nations

Had the United Nations, under the prodding of the United States, not intervened in Korea it is a reasonable assumption that Korea today would be totally occupied by the Communists.

Similarly, without United Nations action it also is reasonably certain that today there would be no unified Congo.

And, going back to the earliest days of the world organization, it also is a safe bet that Soviet Russia would be occupying part of northern Iran had not the pressure of world opinion been brought against it through the United Nations.

Each of these actions represented an extension of U.S. foreign policy and help to explain why, through both Democratic and Republican administrations, the United States has been willing to shoulder more than its share of the financial burden of U. N. undertakings.

Similarly, each of the above ran

directly counter to Soviet policy. Despite persistent efforts to reshape the U.N. to its own advantage, the Soviet Union never yet has won a major victory in U.N. debates.

They were boycotting the U.N. at the time of Korean intervention.

They failed conspicuously in 1960 to impose a three-headed Troika system on the secretary general's office which would have torpedoed U.N. action in the Congo.

In 1963 they are attempting to impose a "financial veto."

This means that they have refused to pay the more than \$46 million they owe in back installments on U.N. peacekeeping operations in the Congo and Middle East and have announced that henceforth they will pay nothing on any U.N. operation with which they disagree.

Altogether, some 40 U.N. members, including France, Belgium, and Nationalist China, have paid nothing on either or both the Congo and the Middle-East operations.

Under U.N. rules, all are subject to losing their vote after falling two years behind in their payments.

Some are hardship cases and may be forgiven on grounds that they are behind due to circumstances beyond their control.

As a matter of pride, the Soviets scarcely could afford to plead that they are too poor to pay.

France and Belgium, both of which strongly opposed the U.N. Congo action, are expected to find some device by which arrangements can be met without admitting a change of heart.

The main problem is the Soviet Union.

If the Soviets could reduce the U.N. to an impotent debating society simply by withholding funds there is little doubt that such would be their course.

On the other hand, it is not believed that the Communists are ready yet to abandon their place in the U.N.'s world forum, leading to a conclusion that their present maneuvers are to establish a bargaining position.

But, meanwhile, the U.N. is approximately \$130 million in the red. And the prospects are that, so long as the U.S. considers the United Nations an important arm of foreign policy, it will continue to pay a disproportionate share of the world organization's costs.

## Death Term Vote Nears

SALEM (UPI)—A pair of measures asking voters to abolish the death penalty neared final legislative approval Monday.

The Senate voted to accept House amendments to the two measures. The House, however, still had to vote to accept the conference committee report bearing out earlier House decisions.

One of the measures, a constitutional amendment, would take capital punishment from the constitution and transfer the whole matter of murder penalties to the laws. This would go to the voters at the November, 1964, general election.

The other, a bill that needs the governor's approval, would go into effect if voters approve the amendment. It would abolish the death penalty, and make the penalty for first degree murder life imprisonment.

The convicted person would have to remain in prison for at least 10 years, and would be subject to parole for the rest of his life if released.

## Senate Rejects CD Motion

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate Monday rejected a move to send the civil defense budget back to committee, then voted 22-8 to cut Oregon's civil defense agency to

a 3-member coordinating staff attached to the governor's office.

The move to send the budget back to committee so the agency could be expanded and become eligible for federal funds failed 16-14.

Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham, led the unsuccessful battle to get the bill sent back to committee. He said "it is essential to the welfare of the state to have strong

state leadership in civil defense."

Gov. Mark Hatfield had requested funds for a 20-man civil defense agency.

When the move to send the budget back to committee failed, Sen. Ted Hallock, D - Portland, urged his colleagues to defeat the budget and thus kill the state civil defense agency. "Oregon might lead the nation in having the guts to abandon a program of digging holes in the ground," he said.

The cut - down civil defense budget already has been approved by the House. It now goes to the governor.

### Lanes Limited

SALEM (UPI)—The Goshen-Creswell section of Interstate 5 in Lane county will be limited to two lanes of traffic for about four weeks starting May 27, while shoulder paving is completed.

## Compensation Bill Considered

SALEM (UPI)—The controversial "three-way" workmen's compensation bill regained life today and flitted out of committee on a 5-3 vote.

The action came at a meeting of the House Labor and Industries Committee, which redrafted the Senate-passed bill, and then killed and revived it several times before today's action.

If the measure makes headway on the House floor and passes, it would have to return to the Senate, and probably go to a conference committee.

The measure has been the subject of fierce pressures both from industry and from labor.

It is the same problem that helped delay the legislature's adjournment two years ago before the 1961 proposal finally died.

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## Attorney General Urges Theaters Be Integrated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy today urged Southern theater owners to desegregate their movie houses voluntarily to avoid demonstrations by Negro groups that could erupt into violence.

Kennedy told about 40 members of the Theater Owners of America to anticipate demands by Negroes for lowering of racial bars and solve their problems "at the local level."

The President's brother was reported to have warned the theater owners to expect Negro protests and demonstrations if they continue existing racial restrictions.

A Justice Department spokesman said the attorney general would meet with other groups facing racial trouble in the future. It was learned he met last week with hotel owners in New York.

John H. Stember, spokesman for the theater owners, declined to comment after the 90-minute conference in Kennedy's office. His group represents about 80 per cent of the movie houses in the South.

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
