

T. Lema Wins Memphis Open, Buys Champagne

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—Champagne Tony Lema lived up to his name and his promise Monday and ordered three bottles of "the best you've got" for himself after he won the \$50,000 Memphis Open.

The tall, unassuming California

pro nabbed the \$9,000 first prize from Tommy Aaron in a sudden-death third hole playoff. Both ended 72 holes with 270.

The victory was the first of the season on the PGA circuit for Lema, who has placed well in money in every tourney he has

entered. He now ranks second on the tour money list with more than \$44,000.

"I'm satisfied with my playing," grinned Lema. He finished the 36-hole finale over the 6,500-yard course with 68 for a total 270. "I thought I had a good chance all the way through," he added.

Aaron In Trouble
Lema's first drive in the playoff landed on the right of the fairway, where he chipped up to about 40 feet. Aaron's smash ended in the rough to the left, and the 26-year-old South Carolina pro knocked the ball from the rough across the green and into a sand trap.

Aaron knocked a flyer across the green again, then came up onto the green about 10 feet from the trap. Aaron knocked again into the cup, but Lema — two strokes behind — cupped his putt from three feet and took the crown.

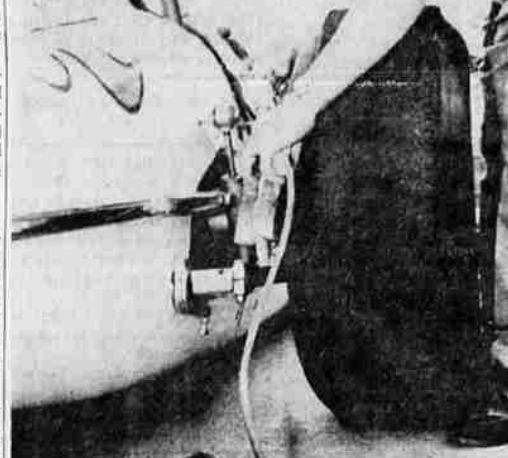
Tied in the third slot were Bruce Crampton and Harold Kneese, both with 274. Kneese had taken a slim one-stroke lead on the field at the end of the morning round.

Unlucky In Playoffs
Gary Player, seasonal top ranker, overcame his mediocre score and finished in fourth place with 275. Behind the South African ace came Dow Finsterwald, George Bayer and Gene Littler with 276. Littler had stolen the show earlier in the day with a record-tying seven-below-par 63 for 18 holes, tying the tournament record set in 1959 by Tommy Beech.

Aaron said he thought he "played good all day. But I've never won a sudden death—not as an amateur or anything."

Masters and U.S. Open champ Jack Nicklaus ended the round with a 278 total after a spectacular hole-in-one on the first day of the four-day tourney. It was the first ace of his professional career.

Cary Middlecoff, one-time dentist who lives in Memphis, ended with 279. Middlecoff set the tourney record with his 1961 victory of 266.

Dead Man's Dream May Be Top Story Of Memorial Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—The dream of a dead man might be the biggest story of the 500-mile race this year.

The late Bud Winfield had the dream; he built two cars to go after auto racing's biggest prize. He called them the Novi Governor Specials when they were built some 20 years ago.

Twice his supercharged babies, turning out almost 700 horsepower, won the pole position as the fastest qualifier for the race on the first day of time trials. Twice, the speedsters had the highest overall qualifying speed.

But they never won the race. Two veteran race pilots, Ralph Hepburn and Chet Miller, were killed in them.

Hepburn died when his Novi bolted like a runaway horse into the wall three times, only days after he declared "I've got the best race car ever built and it's the one that'll win the '500' for me."

Rarely Finish
The Novis rarely finish the race. Once Duke Nalon wound up third in 1948, the best performance. The complicated cars required such fine tuning that the roughness of a 500-mile high speed dash defeated the best mechanical talent.

For almost a decade the Novis were dreams on the sidelines, not in the race, but still they were the biggest crowd pleaser at the track. Then Andy Granatelli

bought them and built a third car and this year they're the darlings of the race buffs.

Granatelli has spent more than \$250,000 on the cars—rebuilding, revamping, redesigning, modifying, seeking to beat the bugs that assailed the monsters.

This year, to the surprise of almost every fan, Jim Hurtubise, Bobby Unser and Art Malone drove all three into the starting field for the 500-mile race. Hurtubise qualified at 150.137 miles per hour. Unser at 149.421, and Malone at 148.343—speeds which Winfield anticipated and couldn't get.

Basic Design Remains
It would be untrue to call Granatelli's Novis the Winfield Novis, because many modifications have made them into new machines. Yet the basic motor design remains, the basic conception is there. The differences are in the accessories used to meet the desire.

Carburetion problems have been the biggest headache. Last year the cars were trucked away from the track, unable to qualify. Granatelli had predicted they would go 160 miles an hour.

This year Granatelli has new aircraft fuel injectors to feed the superchargers. So far there's been no trouble.

"Maybe these cars can go 155 or 157 miles an hour," Granatelli said.

Maybe the dream of a dead man, with modifications, will come true.

cles in the major league pennant races.

The Yankees trailed the Baltimore Orioles by 2 1/2 games and the Dodgers were 2 games back of the San Francisco Giants when all the teams took time out Monday to catch their collective breaths.

Both the Yankees and the Dodgers will be on the road for the next two weeks, making their immediate tasks all the more difficult.

The Dodgers have won 18 of 25 games at home thus far this season but are 8-11 on the road. The Yankees completed a 9-2 home stand Sunday to bring their season record at Yankee Stadium to 13-6. However, they are only 10-8 on the road.

Starting with a night game at Boston tonight, the Yankees will play 15 road engagements in the next 14 days. Their most important stop will be at Baltimore next week, when they square off against the Orioles in three straight night games.

Orioles Are Hot

The Orioles, winners of eight straight and 13 of their last 14 games, play three-game sets at Kansas City and Los Angeles this week before returning home for their scraps with the world champions.

The Dodgers launched a 15-game road trip last weekend at San Francisco, losing two of three games to the Giants. They move on to Milwaukee for the start of another three-game series tonight then have stops at Cincinnati, Houston and Chicago before resuming their war with the Giants at Los Angeles June 10.

Maury Wills wasn't with the Dodgers when they headed east, remaining in Los Angeles for X-ray treatment of a foot injury. If the calcium deposit on the second toe of Wills' left foot doesn't respond to treatment he may require surgery. That would knock the base-stealing champion out of action for another three weeks.

Hank Optimistic

While the Dodgers were having their share of troubles, manager Ralph Houk of the Yankees was extremely optimistic when he left for Boston.

"We've got good reason to feel pretty good as we start on this long trip," he said. "We've just finished a fine home stand, the lineup is solid for the first time and the pitching has been looking up."

When it comes to pitching, though, you can't beat that Baltimore staff. Milt Pappas, unbeaten in four decisions, is pacing all American League pitchers with a 1.59 earned run average. Teammate Steve Barber (8-3) is

third with a 2.27 ERA mark and Robin Roberts, another Bird is sixth with a 2.65 average.

Is it any wonder that Baltimore fans are talking pennant so early in the season?

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
