Tacoma Increases PCL Lead To 3 1/2

The Tacoma Giants today were whistling a variation of that old standard, "what a difference a day makes."

Only Giants would change the title slight and call it, "what a difference a week makes."

Just a week ago Tacoma held a slim half-game lead over the Seattle Rainiers in the Pacific Coast League's Northern Division pennant chase. Today, and seven games later, that margin has grown to a comfortable three and one-half games.

The Giants added to their lead Monday night when they scored six runs in the first inning and coasted to a 10-1 victory over the Portland Beavers.

At the same time, the slumping Rainiers ran into a strong eighth-inning performance by Howie Reed and dropped a 5-0 decision to the Spokane Indians.

Elsewhere, Hawaii's Ron Moeller tossed a sparkling four-hitter as the Islanders squeezed by Salt Lake City 1-0 and Dallas-Fort Worth pounded out 12 hits to dump Oklahoma City 7-3. San Diego was idle and Denver lost a 7-2 exhibition decision to the Kansas City Athletics.

Jack Davis capped Tacoma's first inning explosion when he smashed a home run 400 feet over the left centerfield fence with two teammates on base.

The Giants starter, Jerry Thomas, survived a shaky third inning and went the distance for his fifth victory of the season. Portland scored all its runs in the third on a triple by pitcher Les Krauss, doubles by Jay Hankins and Ken Harselson, and a single by Manny Jimenez.

Careless Official Destroys Shinnick's Shot At Record

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Everybody agrees that Phil Shinnick of University of Washington broke the world record when he broad jumped 27 feet, 4 inches at the California Relays in Modesto the other night.

But officials are just wasting their time and falsely raising the hopes of the 20-year-old athlete if they think they ever can get the record certified.

For those who came in late, somebody forgot to turn on the wind velocity gauge for the jump — and that eliminated all chances of a world record right there.

"I can't see any way the international federation could recognize the world record," said a sad Harold Berliner, high official in world track and field circles. "We know he jumped the distance, but there's no way to prove how strong the wind was blowing."

The allowable wind velocity is 4.73 miles per hour. And it had been blowing between three and seven miles and hour just before the jump. So there's no way of telling if it was a legal jump.

Berliner says he asked the man who was supposed to gauge the wind, Leon Glover Jr., about the error.

"He said he didn't look at the gauge, but believed the wind was about four and one-half miles per hour," said Berliner. "That would have ruled out the jump right there."

And Charley Hunter, veteran chief referee, said he would not certify the mark.

If it's any solace to the sandy-haired Shinnick, he isn't the first one who has been robbed of a world title because of an error by an official.

Earlier this year Bob Hayes, one of the world's great sprinters, was clocked in 9.1 for the 100-yard dash — and thought he had the world mark all by himself.

Then it was discovered that the official wasn't firing the right caliber pistol and the record was rejected.

At Oerter, the world discus king, thought he had a new world mark in a meet last spring. But it was discovered there was a minute slant in the field — and the record was denied.

Shinnick's broad jump was a super-human effort on his part — possibly a jump that was inspired by watching Ralph Boston go out around the 27-foot mark.

It's doubtful that the Spokane, Wash., youth will come near the
