

Giants Lose, Dodgers Win; Orioles Increase American Lead

Koufax Regains Form, Tops Reds

Sandy Koufax, who made such a big difference last year, is making it again this year, and that difference could amount to \$200,000 for the elated Los Angeles Dodgers.

The San Francisco Giants picked up approximately that sum for appearing in the 1962 World Series, and the Dodgers can count on at least that much and maybe even more if they win the National League pennant this year.

Baseball men generally agree the chief reason the Dodgers did not win last season was because Koufax was forced to the sidelines with a finger ailment in July. Sandy's record was 14-4 at the time and he never won another game.

The hard-throwing 27-year-old southpaw has a funny notion about his injury of last year. He figures he owes the Dodgers a pennant.

Shuts Out Braves
Koufax paid another installment Tuesday night when he blanked the Milwaukee Braves, 7-0, on six hits to boost the Dodgers within one game of first place.

Sandy lowered his earned run average to 1.51 in posting his fourth shutout and seventh victory against two losses. That puts him even slightly ahead of last year when he didn't score his seventh victory until May 20. He also had lost two games by then.

Never in any real trouble Tuesday night, Koufax struck out eight and walked two but was locked in a scoreless duel with young Denny Lemaster until Frank Howard unloaded his ninth homer in the seventh inning.

The Dodgers then broke the game open with six more runs in the ninth off relievers Claude Raymond and Dan Schneider. A trio of hits, three walks, a double steal, a balk and an error contributed to the damage.

Reds Beat Giants
Meanwhile, the Cincinnati Reds ripped the Giants, 10-6, the St. Louis Cardinals scored an 8-7 victory over the Houston Colts in 10 innings, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-1, and the Chicago Cubs downed the New York Mets, 5-2.

In the American League, the first-place Baltimore Orioles won their ninth straight by beating the Red Sox 11-6, the Detroit Tigers outscored the Los Angeles Angels, 3-1, the Cleveland Indians edged the Chicago White Sox, 3-2, and the Minnesota Twins topped the Washington Senators, 6-3.

Four Pelican Baseball Players Named To All-Conference Team

Four Klamath Union baseball players were selected to the top 15 players of the All-Conference team recently in a poll of teams and coaches on an all-opponent basis.

Rich Jackson, who turned in a fine 6-1 pitching season, was one of the three pitchers named. The other two were Stu Young of Medford and Wayne Clay of Crater. Jackson got five votes while Young drew all eight and Clay nabbed six.

Mike Barnes of Medford got the majority vote on catchers with eight while Klamath's Dave Johnson and Crater's Darryl Summerfield each polled five votes for the second spots.

First baseman John Gray was named the utility infielder of the first team with three votes. The infield included three from Medford and one from Crater.

Don Anderson at first, Dick DeFley at second and Don Miles at short, Mike Glines of Crater was named at third.

Larry Binney was named the fourth outfielder as a utility outfielder. He also polled three votes. The other outfielders were Mike Neathamer and Gary Miller of Medford and Gary Reddick of Medford. Each polled eight points but Miller who had six.

Pitcher Gary Benson, second baseman Lanny Guyer, third baseman John Parisotto and shortstop-outfielder Mike Kitching all made the honorable mention team.

Jackson was one of the best hurlers in the league. His only loss came at the hands of champion Medford which went on to the state semifinals. He had a fine 2.42 ERA and struck out 69

History's Fastest Field Ready For Hot 500 Race

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — In racing, both one lap at 151.847 and 151.153 for the 10-mile distance.

Even the slowest driver in the field, Dempsey Wilson, qualified at 147.832, well ahead of Roger Ward's 500-mile record of 140.293 last year.
