Prices Jump

In Portland

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The price of goods and services in Portland, Ore., reached a new high in April, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics said today.

The bureau's all-items index for Portland reached 106.2, up 0.5 per cent over January of this year and 2.2 per cent over April of a year ago.

The over-the-quarter increase was general except for food and medical care. Food dropped 0.8 per cent in the January - April quarter and medical care 0.2 per cent. Transportation accounted for the biggest increase, 2 per cent.

Price Index

Plan Protested

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Monday protested plans of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics to discontinue its "consumer price index" for Portland.

Hatfield said the bureau has indicated it will discontinue the Portland index next year.

The governor said the information on Portland retail prices is important in labor negotiations, and is used by companies making industrial decisions.

Agriculture

Building Okayed

SALEM (UPI) — The Senate Tuesday approved a new 20,000-square foot agriculture building.

The \$1 million structure, which would be built in about two years, is planned as the first unit in a group which ultimately would house state natural resources agencies headquartered here.

Final location and design of the structure have not yet been determined, although the structure is to be a part of the capitol mall program.

PORTLAND (UPI)—The government has filed an action in Federal court here seeking judgment of \$7,000 from Walter E. Wang, Redmond livestock dealer.

Assistant U.S. Atty. Victor E. Harr said the government claims Wang operated as a dealer on 14 different days without furnishing a reasonable bond. He said the action was taken under the Packers and Stockyards act of 1914.

Jury Finds

Rood Guilty

A criminal case that has been in the judicial mill for more than 26 months was brought to a close Monday when a Klamath County jury judged Jane E. Rood guilty of operating a lottery following a one-day trial before Judge Lyle R. Wolff, in Circuit Court No. 1.

The jury of seven women and five men deliberated one hour and 55 minutes before voting 10-2 for the verdict of not guilty, with one woman and one man dissenting. It began deliberating at 4:42 p.m. and announced its verdict to the court at 5:37 o'clock.

The charge against Mrs. Rood was filed early in 1961 after she was accused of selling chances on a punchboard to two state police officers, not in uniform, who entered her establishment.

She was convicted of the offense in Klamath County District Court in March 1961, but the ruling was later appealed to the State Supreme Court.

The court filed its opinion last April 24 and the case was scheduled for trial May 27 in the Klamath County Circuit Court.

Mother, 2 Children Hurt In Auto Mishap

A woman motorist and her two youngsters miraculously escaped critical injuries, and possibly death, when the automobile she was driving collided with a truck and trailer about five miles south of Chemult, 8:20 p.m., Tuesday, Oregon State Police at Gilchrist have reported.

Mrs. Richard Twyman, 39, of Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, was southbound on Highway 97 when she turned left in front of the truck as it was in the process of overtaking the vehicle. The truck slammed into the left side of the car and roared off the highway into a grove of trees, plowing the automobile ahead of it.

When the vehicles churned to a stop, the right front wheel of the truck crumpled the left front door of the car and became imbedded in the driver's seat. The impact of the collision threw Mrs. Twyman away from the driver's side of the car and she and her two children, Louis, 6, and Debra Lee, 14, were still in the vehicle when it finally stopped among the trees.

Maj. Richard Twyman was following the family car in a truck, pulling a horse trailer, and observed the collision as his wife attempted to turn off the highway into Blue Star Memorial Park. Mrs. Twyman was taken by Peace Ambulance to Klamath Valley Hospital where she was reported satisfactory today following surgery for a deep laceration of the arm.

Louis, who received a bump on the head, and Debra, victim of minor lacerations and shock, were treated for their injuries at the hospital and released.

The operator of the truck, Frank Grothers, Grants P.A.S., was not injured.

Before the accident, Major Twyman and his family were en route to Western Oregon with their horses.

Long-faced members of the Governor's Advisory Council on Civil Defense looked at a two-year budget that would slash the 18-member state agency to 11 or fewer persons and agreed there was nothing else to do.

The council told State CD Director Robert Sandstrom to inform the federal government that if it

The Klamath County Court appeared to be in sympathy with a deemphasizing of civil defense at the local level in view of a drastic slash in the county budget of the civil defense office for fiscal year 1963-64, but other than stating the county's CD budget for the past two years, the court declined to comment.

The allocation provided by the county for CD during the forthcoming fiscal year is \$2,329 compared to \$11,975 for the last fiscal year. County Civil Defense Director Joe Soarles also declined to comment on the cut-back.

Civil Defense at the county level is financed from federal, county, and city funds. The federal government provides 50 per cent of the costs, the city contributes \$600, and the county supplies the remainder.

was able to match dollar-for-dollar the \$34,000 allotted by the legislature that it probably would be able to carry out its three basic functions—the fallout shelter program, radiological monitoring and the attack warning and communication system.

Sandstrom said it probably would be up to the federal office to decide what to do about field hospital units.

Gov. Hatfield originally asked legislature for \$195,000. This, with federal matching funds, would have expanded the agency to 20 persons. With proposed state funds the agency would be left after June 30 with three persons.

Hatfield charged the legislature was guilty of "failure to uphold public responsibility."
