POTATO BREAD IS DELICIOUS

In spite of the dozens of different kinds of breads that we can buy, it's the simple yeast-raised white loaf that most often appears on the table. Flavor of this every day loaf can be varied a bit with the use of potato water and a bit of mashed potato as substitute for milk. Potato bread also freezes well so you can make several loaves and freeze some.

POTATO BREAD

- 1 cup of water drained from boiled potatoes
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3 tablespoons margarine or butter
- 1 cup very warm water
- 2 packages or cakes of yeast, active dry or compressed
- 1 cup mashed potatoes
- 5 1/2 to six cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 egg, lightly beaten

Heat potato water and stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure very warm water into a large bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir in lukewarm potato water mixture and three cups of flour; beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn onto lightly floured board; knead until

WISE SHOPPERS CHECK CREDIT PLAN, CHARGES

If you pride yourself on being a real bargain hunter, use the same resourcefulness when it comes to shopping for credit. Credit charges may range all the way from "nothing" to 18 per cent a year.

Many department stores now offer credit services unknown a few years ago. Two common kinds of charge accounts are offered by many department stores—the open account and the revolving account. With the vari-

ous types of credit and accounts available, it's the wise shopper who finds out which one fits her family's pocketbook.

Under an open account, the customer is able to buy whatever he needs, sign a sales slip to signify intention to pay, with no down payment required. Usually an open account carries no interest or credit charge.

Revolving charge accounts, those with payments scheduled on the installment plan, have also become more popular. Here is how they work: When

a customer applies to open a revolving charge account, she agrees to pay a certain amount of money each month on purchases from the store. The minimum payment each month is about \$10 and the maximum set by the store. The store then sets a credit limit for the customer, equal to 12 times the selected monthly payments. In this way, the customer has continuous purchasing power.

For example, if a customer decides to pay \$10 a month, she has \$120 worth of credit and may buy \$120 worth of merchandise. At the end of the month, she is billed for \$10 if the charge against her is between \$10 and \$120. When this bill is paid, she may buy enough more goods to bring the balance back up to \$120. Because this can go on indefinitely it's been called a "financial merry-go-round."

If the store makes a service charge of 1 1/2 per cent per month on the unpaid balance, the customer with a debt of \$120 at the end of the month would owe a service charge of \$1.80 which would be added to the balance. Revolving credit was designed for customers who couldn't pay for purchases of any considerable size within 30 days. Some people who could use regular or open charge accounts prefer revolving accounts because they like the "budget" feature.

Customers should be aware that cost in terms of annual interest charges may range between 12 and 18 per cent. Stores like revolving credit because it increases business and streamlines their bookkeeping. Interest charge or service charge takes care of the cost of servicing and carrying the accounts.

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
