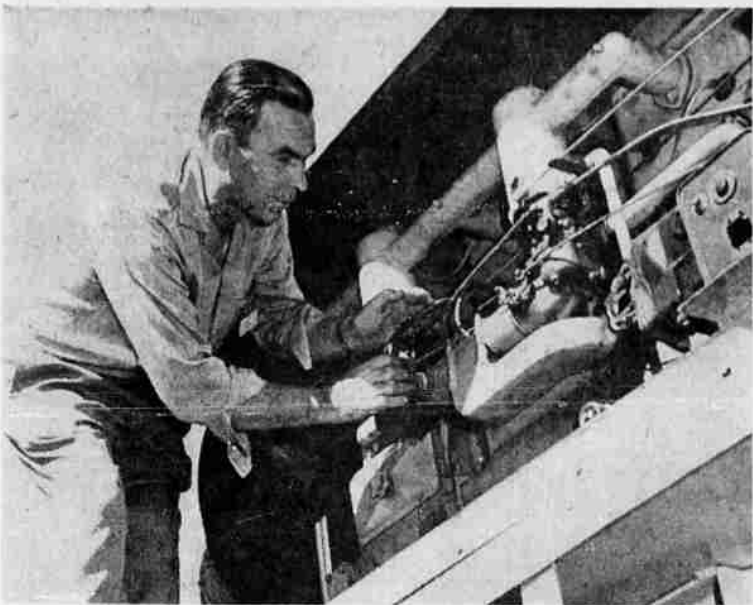

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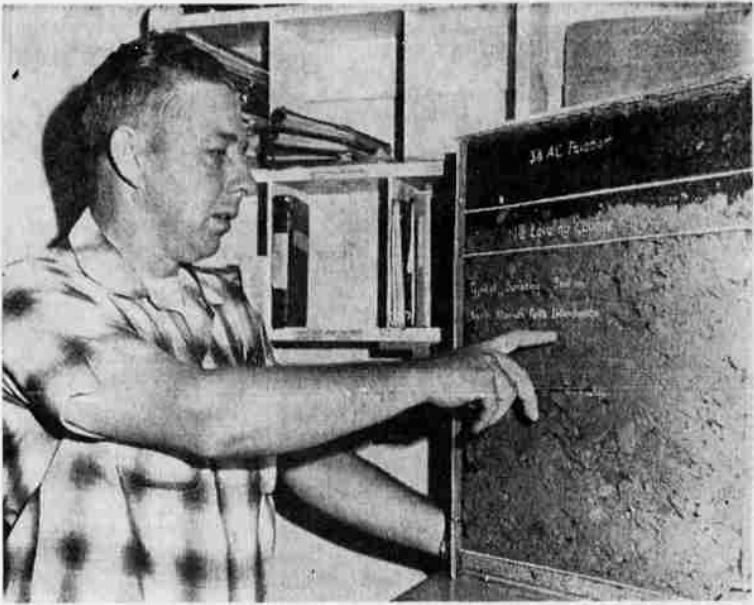

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PUBLIC INSPECTS INNER WORKINGS OF HIGHWAY DEPT. — A meat grinder-like piece of equipment which chews snow banks and spews the remains countless feet away, a rotary broom that requires about 500 parts to spin it, and a display of a cross section of highway were three of a number of exhibits observed by the public during an open house at the local offices of the State Highway Department Tuesday. The open house was held locally in connection with National Highway Week, being

observed nationally from May 26 through June 1. The equipment that crushes solid snow into powder and blows it away is mounted on the front end of a Snowgo, more familiar to the public as a snowplow. The motorized equipment is operated with two gasoline engines, one to accelerate the truck and the other to run the snow crusher. In photo at left, Clarence Ham, highway department machinist, adjusts the motor that spins the snow crunching augers in an opening housing at the front of the truck.



The six-cylinder engine has a six-inch bore and seven-inch stroke. In the center photo, Max Mitchell, mechanic, points out some of the 500 parts that propel the brooms on a motorized street sweeper. The steering wheel of the street sweeping unit is located on the right side of the vehicle so the operator may observe one of the mechanized brushes as it collects trash along the curbstones.

In the other photo, Reid Meritt, engineer, points out a cross section of fill and asphalt similar to that used in the construction of the highway known as the Klamath Falls Interchange. The surface of the road is 20 inches in depth, consisting of 16 1/2 inches of rock, capped with 3 1/2 inches of asphaltic concrete. Approximately 130 people attended the open house.

6,000 Students May Become Dropouts From High School

SALEM (UPI) — An estimated 6,000 high school students are about to make a decision that will affect the future course of their lives, and possibly trap them forever at a below-average income level.

They will drop out of high school.

Not every dropout is doomed to be a failure. Some enter the armed services and find themselves in their new life. Others realize later the limitations of restricted schooling and take night courses or in some other manner resume their education.

Percentage-wise the situation has improved over the past 11 years, although the number of dropouts has remained about the same because of expanding enrollments.

Glen Weaver of the Department of Education said one of three, or 6,847 of the 18,918 students who entered the ninth grade in 1948, dropped out before graduation in 1952.

The 1958 freshman class totaled 26,762. The dropout rate was one in four, and 20,750 graduated in 1962, for a loss of 6,012.

In this modern age, a high school diploma is only the beginning.

Eldon Cone, director of the State Employment Service, has released an "open letter" to 1963 high school graduates which urges them to consider their job future carefully.

"In this jet-propelled, automated age of electro-mechanical innovations the high school diploma is not always a passport into the better jobs in a highly competitive labor market," He urged high school graduates



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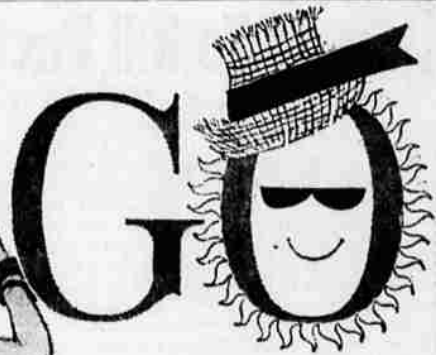
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
