Play Needs X-Ray Eyes

The expert is popularly supposed to be able to look at dummy; play a couple of cards and then know what each of his opponents holds. This idea is a tremendous exaggeration, but sometimes he can play a hand in such manner that he will achieve the same result.

South's seven no-trump was one of those gambles that good players take all the time and when he looked at dummy everything appeared to be under control. He had twelve top tricks and unless clubs broke very badly his seven of clubs would be a thirteenth.

Dummy's king of spades held the first trick and South started right after clubs only to get the bad news when West discarded a heart on the second club lead.

Nothing daunted, South took the last two high clubs and discarded spades from dummy. Then he cashed the ace of diamonds and ran off four rounds of hearts. East discarded two spades and two diamonds and South let a spade and the nine of diamonds go. Then he laid down dummy's ace of spades and East had to take a third diamond go. South threw away his last club and claimed the last two tricks with the king and jack of diamonds. He didn't care who had the queen because he knew that each opponent had but one diamond.

Kindergarten Plan Sponsored

MALIN — The Malin Parents and Patrons recently voted to sponsor a kindergarten which will begin operation on Sept. 9. It will meet Monday through Thursday from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

A \$5 registration fee must be paid at the time of registration, and the cost of the kindergarten will be \$10 per month, including snacks and insurance. The class will be taught by Mrs. Gordon, retiring first grade teacher.

Children who will be 5 years old before Nov. 15 will be given first priority. After Aug. 15, the class will be filled to a maximum of 20 by 4-year-olds. The 4-year-olds will be selected according to the date they were registered on a first come, first serve basis. The registration fee of any children in this group not selected will be refunded.

A parent handbook and a policy statement will be prepared in the near future.

Teacher Pay Bill Boosted

SALEM (UPI) — The forces seeking better pay for college teachers and state employees won another round Wednesday in what has become an intense legislative tug-of-war.

The House voted 33-27 to send a salary increase bill to its Education Committee for addition of more money.

The bill was returned last week to the Ways and Means Committee. But it sent it back to the House without any changes.

Rep. Eugene Hulett, D-Eugene, told the House Ways and Means already decided to increase the workload of college teachers to save money.

"If he is capable of doing competent and inspiring work under a heavier work load, then he is the kind of teacher we want," Hulett said.

"However, he is also the kind of teacher other states are anxious to have and are willing to pay accordingly... the ability of the teacher who faces our children in a college classroom is what matters the most."

Lessons Dated At Malin Pool

MALIN — Red Cross swimming lessons will begin June 10 at the Malin Community Park pool. Each course will consist of 10 lessons.

Tickets may be purchased after June 4 at the school or later at the pool. There will be adult classes at 8 a.m. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings, and parent and pre-school classes every day at 11:30 a.m.

Pear Industry Faces Threat

MEDFORD (UPI) — Congressional failure to extend the Mexican farm labor program may damage the multimillion dollar Rogue River pear industry, an industry spokesman said Thursday.

Don Root, president of the Jackson County Fruit Growers League, said there are not enough domestic workers in the area to harvest the crop.

The industry has employed between 250 and 300 Mexican laborers annually. The House of Representatives earlier this week refused to extend the law under which the workers enter this country.

Root said the Rogue River Valley was in a unique position because of its distance from large labor markets. Jackson County growers have scheduled a meeting Monday to discuss the problem.

The ban on Mexican workers will not go into effect until 1964.

Police Plan Arrest For Demonstrators

 Authorities at Jackson, Miss., were prepared today to arrest racial demonstrators by the thousands.

Wire was strung around two exhibit buildings at the state fairgrounds and Jackson Mayor Allen Thompson said the prisoner compounds could confine 10,000 persons. Negro leaders said they would step up their segregation protest campaign.

At Tallahassee, Fla., 220 Negroes were ordered to appear in court today to answer charges of disobeying an injunction against demonstrations. Two Negroes and a white man picketing a segregated restaurant at Charlottesville, Va., were beaten Thursday.

In Washington, the Defense Department said it has transferred 150 troops of the 101st Airborne Division to Ft. Campbell, Ky., to Ft. McClellan, Ala., to replace 150 infantrymen. The department said the shift was not connected with the removal Thursday of about 400 troops from the Birmingham, Ala., area where President Kennedy sent troops following racial violence on May 12.

Jackson police Thursday broke up a campus demonstration by 500 Negro high school students, some of whom threw rocks, bottles and bricks at officers. Three policemen were reported slightly injured. Two persons were arrested at the school and 25 more demonstrators were arrested in downtown Jackson.

Get Riot Training
 Highway patrolmen from throughout Mississippi were moved into the capital and put on standby alert at night headquarters where they underwent riot control training.

Thompson and two city commissioners warned Thursday that violence would support demands of civil rights leaders that federal troops be sent to Jackson. Negroes later in the day requested that Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy intervene "to prevent further unlawful arrests and harassment."

Police at Tallahassee Thursday arrested 257 persons for staging two brief racial demonstrations in the Florida capital. A crowd of about 200 white persons cheered and applauded when police moved in on Negroes picketing a segregated theater. But officers had to use tear gas to break up another demonstration by about 85 Negroes. One girl fell to the ground in the bluish smoke, but was picked up by a fellow demonstrator and apparently was not hurt.

Three Pickets Beaten
 The three men at Charlottesville were protesting segregation in a restaurant when they were attacked by two white men who beat them with their fists. Police arrested all five men and charged them with assault.

The Rev. H. F. Johnson, head of the Charlottesville branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), was hospitalized with undetermined injuries.

There were these other racial developments:
 —A biracial committee at Nashville, Tenn., said Thursday it has completed its organization and had "launched immediately" into racial problems facing the Tennessee capital.
 —Three Negroes tried unsuccessfully to enter three downtown theaters at Chattanooga, Tenn., Thursday.
 —An NAACP official said at Radnor, Pa., Thursday that demonstrations at a school construction site in Philadelphia were the start of a nationwide drive against segregation in unions.

Two Policemen Slashed In Philadelphia Riot

 Two policemen were slashed and several persons were injured today in a new flareup of violence at a Philadelphia construction site where hundreds of Negro demonstrators protested alleged job discrimination.

One patrolman was slashed on the wrist and another on the arm during a fight which broke out when Negro pickets refused to move to permit workers to report to their jobs.

Five other policemen and about 200 pickets were cut and bruised in the melee.

The workers got through to the school construction site which had been the target of protests for a week. It is located in a largely Negro neighborhood in North Philadelphia.

The violence broke out two hours before a seven-point agreement was reached to end the mass picketing and employ Negroes in skilled jobs on public construction projects in Philadelphia.

It called for the immediate hiring of a qualified Negro plumber, steamfitter, two electricians and a sheetmetal worker at the school site.

In the South, authorities at Jackson, Miss., were prepared to arrest racial demonstrators by the thousands. Two large buildings at the state fairgrounds were set up as temporary jails.

The city of Durham, N.C., announced it would open its municipal swimming pools on a desegregated basis, a move taken earlier in the week by Atlanta.

Cecil Moore, the president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) branch in Philadelphia, said the picket protests would continue until more Negroes are employed in skilled trades at the school site.

He pledged to assemble 4,000 pickets today to carry on the demonstration.

Authorities in Jackson were taking no chances should new demonstrations break out in the Mississippi capital city.
