Thomson & McKinnon feel that preoccupation with the conduct of the 30 top grade stocks in the Dow-Jones industrial average and the pros and cons of technicians tends to divert attention from the ever-increasing number of stocks outside the average which may prove the main spring of the remaining drive in this bull market.

Lawrence Hieberg of Bache & Co. notes that although stocks have been in retreat recently it has at least been an orderly retreat. He feels the market is bucking and filling and he looks for possibly further consolidation before another advance is staged.

Major Setback Rocks State Civil Defense

Civil defense has suffered a major setback in Oregon, but most state legislatures are proceeding with plans to protect their populations against nuclear attack.

Some states have even stepped up their programs to build and equip fallout shelters. A United Press International spot check indicated that the majority are continuing their civil defense programs at the present pace.

The civil defense controversy flared this week when the Oregon Legislature voted to cut the

state's 18-man civil defense agency to just three persons. Gov. Mark Hatfield, a civil defense supporter, had asked \$190,000 for the program. He was voted \$32,000.

City Commissioner Stanley Earl of Portland, which voted down civil defense funds last week, said "in the event of a nuclear attack these fallout shelters will become crematoriums."

In Washington, a House Armed Services subcommittee began hearings on President Kennedy's \$175 million federal fallout shelter program.

Oregon's Sen. Wayne Morse sent word he considered the civil defense program senseless, wasteful and unrealistic.

There was strong support for the fallout shelter campaign in Congress and even in Oregon, however.

California's Rep. Chet Holifield, whose state has been in the forefront of civil defense preparations, said fellow lawmakers were dodging their responsibility. Another Democrat, Rep. John D. Dingell, of Michigan, said "once the bombs start flying and the rockets are leaving the launching pad, it will be too late to engage in any hole digging."

Hatfield called Oregon's anti-CD stand a victory for "the peace at any price club."

Civil defense headquarters in Washington hoped to bring Oregon back into the fold and said no other state had shown similar leanings.

New York, where Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller has been one of the nation's leading civil defense apostles, scaled down its huge program. But the reasons for the legislature's action appeared to be more budgetary than philosophical.

Many civil defense officials said legislators, like the general public, aren't interested in worrying about fallout shelters now.

The nation's civil defense boss, Asst. Defense Secretary Stuart L. Pittman, put it more bluntly. "The mood of Congress is the same as the country," he said this week. "They would rather think of other things."

Barton Bars Three-Way Bill Action

SALEM (UPI) — Senators ac-

cused House Speaker Clarence

Barton of backroom tactics today over the controversial "three-

way" workmen's compensation bill.

The Senate-passed bill was reported out of the House Labor and Industries Committee a few days ago after a stormy career during which it was completely rewritten. Barton Tuesday sent it to the Ways and Means committee.

Today, Ways and Means tried to meet on the bill, but lacked a quorum of House members.

Sens. Walter Leth, R - Salem, and Walter Pearson, D-Portland, protested on the Senate floor following the meeting.

Leth said if Barton is "trying to manipulate the end of the session, I oppose it."

"I want the people of the state to know the responsibility for a lack of quorum rests with one man."

Pearson said Barton killed bills in committee and ordered the committee members not to attend the meeting.

Sen. Ward Cook, D - Portland, Ways and Means co-chairman, defended Barton and suggested the speaker's action in sending the bill to Ways and Means was sincere.

Nine members and three guests were present at this meeting. Mrs. Noble served refreshments and punch at the close of the meeting.

Bobcat Kittens Under Study By Lakeview Biology Class

LAKEVIEW — The biology class of the Lakeview High School may be unique in its position of having bobcat kittens under observation.

Not only is the development of the small animals being watched, but they are carried around on student's shoulders and played with generally as tame kittens would be.

It all came about when Walter Leehmann Jr., who runs his cattle out in the desert country of Little Big Juniper about 75 miles northeast of Lakeview, found the kittens in an old homesteader's cabin where he stores salt for the cattle. Wanting to get the mother, he waited until he heard her in the cabin about a month ago. Armed with a .22 caliber pistol, he opened the cabin door and she immediately sprang at him in an effort to protect her young. Luckily, his first shot killed the huge animal.

Ordinarily in such a case the kittens would also be destroyed, but he decided the youngsters at school might be interested in seeing them. He brought the four kittens home, and his wife, Jean, took over the job of feeding them. Milk from a baby bottle was

used, but their jaws had to be pried open by Leehmann in order to insert the nipple.

His three young sons and two small daughters would like to have kept them for playmates, but as that wasn't feasible, he took them to show to school children.

The kittens made the rounds of the first school, and then went from one school to another until they ended up in the science department of the high school. Here Tom Brady, biology instructor, asked if they could be kept for observation.

The classes continued to feed them and one day found a mother cat, who had lost a litter of kittens, and she immediately took over the job. When they were about a month old, their "nails" were trimmed. In the meantime one was turned over to Don Combs of the State Game Department's law enforcement division and another to Eldon McLaurie of the Fish and Wildlife Service. The two remaining kittens became the pets of the school.

Recently it was thought a supplementary milk supply would have to be started again, as it seemed apparent that the moth-

er cat had lost hers. She still cleans and washes them as if they were her own and snuggles in the box with them. They are brought out in the sunshine at intervals and will wander around the school lawn. They are not quite as playful as tame kittens, but Brady feels they may be in need of a vitamin supply.

At the close of the school year, the bobcats are to be turned over to one of the zoos in the state.

State Police Arrest Man Wanted For JFK Threat

A man who threatened the life of President John F. Kennedy was arrested by Oregon State Police in downtown Klamath Falls, 8:50 a.m., today, and is in the city jail awaiting transfer to the U.S. marshal at Charles Town, W.Va.

Apprehended by police was Alex Louis Holcomb, 30, a one-time employee of Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, who was traced through an application for employment he placed with Weyerhaeuser.

The U.S. marshal at Charles Town holds a federal warrant charging Holcomb with threatening the life of a President. The threat was apparently contained in a letter written by Holcomb to the President, but the accused

has declined to state the exact contents of the correspondence.

Holcomb was to be arraigned before U.S. Commissioner David Vandenberg Jr. sometime today and will remain in the local jail pending his release to the custody of federal officers.
