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Tacoma Remains On Top Of PCL Diamond Heap

Catcher Mike Brumley refused at first to report to Spokane earlier this season after the Los Angeles Dodgers farmed him out and the Seattle Rainiers could be sorry today that he changed his mind.

Reluctant Mike fired Spokane to a 12th inning, 2-1 victory over the Rainiers Thursday night by crashing a triple and then racing home on a wild pitch.

In other action, Tacoma split a twin bill with Portland to remain on top of the Northern Division by four games. San Diego belted Denver, 8-3, and moved to within two percentage points of first place. Dallas-Fort Worth in the Southern scramble, and Hawaii swept a pair from Salt Lake City which now has lost 15 straight. Oklahoma City bested Dallas-Fort Worth in the other holiday game, 4-3.

Hefner had hurled 11 innings of the fine ball for Seattle then was tagged by Brumley for the fatal triple. The next two batters

draw intentional walks. John Boyle then was sent in to relieve and delivered the wild pitch that ruined Hefner and the Reds. The victory went to Ken Rowe (4-3) who took over for Norman Koch in the 11th.

Jose Santiago held Tacoma to four hits while pitching Portland to a 5-0 shutout in the opener of their twin bill, but the Giants slugged back with 11 safeties in the nightcap and won it, 8-3.

Tacoma's Johnny Rivas was the loser in the first game. He had rolled up five wins without a setback. Home runs by Jim Ray Hart and Jesus Alou carried lefty Jim Constable to victory in the second game after he survived a rough first inning.

San Diego, which mopped up the PCL last season, handled the Denver Bears, 8-3, on a six hitter by Sammy Ellis and Rogelio Alvarez's three-run homer. The blast came off loser Dennis Ribant, J. W. Porter and Wade Blasingame, who is paid to pitch, homered for the losers.

A bases loaded homer run by Tom Satriano and Bill Knopp's clutch single insured Hawaii's sweep over the Bees. Hawaii took the opener of the split twin bill, 9-4, in Provo as Satriano's slam leaved away Dick Sovde's third win in eight verdicts. The blow came off Morrie Stevens, now 2-6.

Veteran Stan Palys clubbed a home run for Hawaii after the ride back to Salt Lake City for the nightcap. But it was Knopp, another minor league journeyman who singled across the tie-breaking run in the eighth. The loser was workhorse Gordy Seyfried whose mark now is 2-8.

Oklahoma City put the wood to Joe Bonikowski for five hits and three runs in the first inning before ancient George Bamberger was wheeled into retire the 89ers in 1-2-3 order. However, the former New York Giants hurler was tagged for two singles and what proved to be the winning run in the fourth. Johnny Weekly led the Oklahomans with a pair of run-scoring singles while Ray Jablonski homered for the Rangers.

Arnie, one of the most muscular young fellows you'll ever meet, practically collapsed from exhaustion because he's been signing so many endorsements and contracts of late. It's the price a successful golf pro must pay in the new stature of the game.

Just to give you an idea of how things are going, let's pipe in on an interview with any famous golf star after he wins a major event. It goes something like this:

"Well, it was a nice one to win and I'd have to credit the new equipment I'm using. My putting was exceptional because of the Old Hickory company's new target tee special putter which I've just endorsed.

Californian Fights Off Clark's Bid For Victory

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Auto racing's old era hasn't died, but the new one has begun.

Parnelli Jones, the youthful favorite, Thursday won the richest 500-mile auto race ever run—in record time, at record speed, and for a record purse.

He rode the old car and a standard racing engine of design and power in use at the track for years. He averaged 143.17 miles per hour.

But he beat a Scotsman, grand prix sports car driver Jimmy Clark, by only 34 seconds. Clark, in a rear-engine car powered by a Ford stock motor, averaged 142.732 miles per hour.

Clark Challenges Strongly
Clark challenged so strongly in the last few laps that once he trailed Jones, a 29-year-old crew-cut racing star from California, by only 3½ seconds.

Clark was bitter over the defeat. His manager, car designer Colin Chapman, complained that Jones made gains under the yellow light, supposed to slow the field, and thus gained the advantage to win.

But Jones said he did not gain under the yellow. He tried only to protect himself, he said. In the final 20 laps, Eddie Sachs spun twice, and Roger McCluskey, half a lap away from third place, once.

McCluskey's mishap, which put him out of the race, came in front of Jones while the winner was on his last lap.

"McCluskey cut in under me," he said, "and spun, and I didn't know what was going to happen. I saw an opening and I just gunned it and got out of there."

Six Break Record
The first six finishers bettered the old speed record of 140.293 set by Roger Ward a year ago. A. J. Foyt, Houston, Tex., was third at 142.210; Ward fourth at 141.090; Don Branson, Champaign, Ill., fifth at 140.866; and Jim McElreath, Arlington, Tex., sixth at 140.862.

Others in the top 10 were Dan Gurney, Costa Mesa, Calif., 140.071; Chuck Hulse, Downey, Calif., 140.064; Al Miller, Roseville, Mich., 139.524, and Dick Rathmann, Roselle, Ill., 138.845.

No one was hurt during the fastest race ever run and 14 cars officially were running at the finish. Bobby Marshman also was running but pulled into the infield before he crossed the finish line and Eddie Sachs lost a wheel as Jones was on his last lap.

It was a great win before almost 300,000 fans; for a purse expected to run more than \$450,000, with almost \$150,000 expected to go to Jones.

Jones, who led for 167 laps, earned \$25,050 at \$150 for each time he was in front across the line. Clark led for 28 laps for \$4,200. McCluskey led for four for \$600, and Jim Hurtubise for one, for \$150.
