Great Books Group Begins Fourth Year

The Great Books Foundation is a non-profit organization whose sole purpose lies in the encouragement of people to read and to meet together to discuss great books. The local discussion group, which has been sponsored by the AAUW, has just completed the third year readings.

The fourth year readings will include: 1. Confucius, The Analects, selections; 2. Plato, The Republic, Books VI-VII; 3. Aristophanes, Lysistrata, The Clouds; 4. Aristotle, Poetics; 5. Euclid, Elements of Geometry, Book I; 6. Marcus Aurelius, Meditations; 7. Sextus Empiricus, Outlines of Pyrrhonism, Book I; 8. Song of the Volsungs and the Nibelungs; 9. St. Thomas Aquinas, On Truth and Falsity, Q. Q. 16-17 from the Summa Theologica; 10. Montaigne, essays, selections; 11. Shakespeare, The Tempest; 12. Locke, An Essay Concerning Human Understanding; 13. Milton, Paradise Lost; 14. Hume, An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding; 15. Nietzsche, Beyond Good and Evil, selections; 16. William James, pragmatism, selections.

The Great Books Foundation publishes these readings in paperback books so that the group may share a common text. These may be purchased alone for \$12 per set or in groups of nine or more for \$10.50 per set.

The foundation also publishes a "Reader's Aide" for one dollar. Any person who would like to join the group next year may call Mrs. Robert Scholl at TU 2-0013 for more information or to place a book order with the group.
