Sales Climbing

Detroit's performance was reflected in steel mill output last week which climbed for the third consecutive week to the highest level since mid-March 1960. Production totaled 2,628,000 tons, up 0.8 per cent from the prior week. The increase lifted production so far this year ahead of the 1962 pace for the first time.

Mill officials said, however, that in preliminary steel labor talks incoming orders are under the wire.
