Infield Fly Rule Pop-Up Wins Game For Hot Cards

Stan Musial, a man who has done everything can now claim he also has seen everything after winning a game with a pop-up

that was declared out because of the infield fly rule.
If that beats you, don't worry too much about it because it also beat the San Francisco Giants

Friday night and gave the St. Louis Cardinals a 6-5 victory that boosted them within two games of the National League lead.

Here's how it happened:
Musial came to bat with the bases full in the ninth inning, nobody out and the score tied at 5-5.

He popped the ball up a few feet behind first base and the umpires immediately called the infield fly rule. That means it's an automatic out but the Giants' infield, somewhat confused, allowed the ball to drop and Curt Flood raced home from third base with the winning run.

Musial was called out but credited with a run batted in because under the infield fly rule runners may advance at their own risk.

Larsen Charged With Loss
Don Larsen, first of three St. Louis pitchers employed in the ninth, was charged with his third loss in as many decisions while Bob Gibson picked up his third victory in relief. Bill White tied the score at 5-5 with a two-run homer in the seventh inning.

The Cincinnati Reds defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 7-4; the Pittsburgh Pirates blanked the New York Mets 2-0; the Houston Colts ended a five-game losing streak with a 3-2 win over the Milwaukee Braves, and the Chicago Cubs nipped the Philadelphia Phillies 2-1, in other NL action.

In the American League, the New York Yankees climbed into a first place tie by whitewashing the Cleveland Indians 4-0; the Los Angeles Angels beat the Baltimore Orioles 7-4; the Detroit Tigers snuffed the Minnesota Twins' 10-game winning streak 3-1, and the Kansas City A's walloped the Washington Senators 9-3.

Pavletich Sparks Rally
Don Pavletich's two-run single highlighted a three-run fifth inning rally by the Reds that beat Dodger reliever Ed Roebuck and helped Jim Maloney to his seventh victory in nine decisions. Willie Davis and Vada Pinson each hit homers.

Jerry Lynch's two-run homer in the seventh inning broke up a scoreless struggle between the Pirates and Mets. Lynch connected off Carl Wilentz, now 4-4, and the blow was all the margin Don Schwall needed for his third victory. Schwall held the Mets to four hits.

Ken Johnson also hurled a four-hitter against the Braves in gaining his third victory for the Colts. Off loser Bob Shaw and two Milwaukee relievers but capitalized on a pair of errors by Shaw and Norm Larker. John Bateman singled home the winning runs in the fourth. Hank Aaron hit his 16th homer with one on.

Billy Williams' fourth inning double followed by Ron Santo's single produced the winning run for the Cubs against the Phillies. Bob Buhl evened his record at 4-4 with help from Lindy McDaniel in the eighth. Chris Short suffered his fifth loss in six decisions.

Four players were locked at .67. They were Juan Rodriguez, Claude King, Miller Barber and Bill Collins.

Several of the game's brightest names passed up the tourney despite the lavish purse, \$10,000 of which will go to the winner.

Among the missing were Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player. Three others among the top 10 money makers also were absent. They were defending champion Billy Casper, Doug Sanders and Gene Littler.

Sept. 13 is the only open date for the Tigers. All games will be doubleheader night. Games will be the jayvee game beginning at 6 o'clock and the varsity game at 8 o'clock.

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — Par was no problem for contestants in the \$55,000 "500" golf tournament Saturday, and it appeared that only players who shot par or better for 36 holes will survive for the last two rounds.

Fred Hawkins, a non-winner on the tournament trail since 1956, set the early pace, coming in with a 64, seven strokes under regulation for the course and two swings under his closest competitor.

John Carmichael, a 23-year-old from Martinsville, Ind., made one of the best runs of the round to tie Hawkins, but could do no better than par on the final five holes and wound up with a second place 66.

Piper, Gooding Among Year's Top Prep Stars

Johnny Carpenter, director of sports and special events for Radio Station KOIN in Portland, announced that Tom Jernstedt, senior at Yamhill-Carlton Union High School, is 1963 winner of KOIN Radio's Annual High School Athlete of the Year Award.

Among those who received consideration from the judges was Don Piper, nominated by his teammates and administration from Klamath Union High and Kent Gooding of Henley High. Don and Kent will receive certificates as outstanding students entered in the 1962-63 competition.

Judged on a basis of scholarship, citizenship and athletic achievement, Tom Jernstedt was selected as winner from more than 60 entries from every part of the state of Oregon.

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New Managers' Woes Mount As Opposing Pitcher Homers

If he thought the New York Mets were the worst team in baseball he must be beginning to wonder about the woebegone Washington Senators.

They have lost eight out of nine since Hodges officially took over as their manager on May 23.

And the way they have lost some of those gambles would bring tears to the eyes of a hobbyhorse.

Gil watched them lose their first game under him on a cheap homer. They dropped another one on a muffed infield pop-up and Friday night they went down to defeat again on a grand slam homer by the rival pitcher.

Orlando Pena was the fellow who did it, clouting his first major league home run during a six-run rally and pitching a five-hitter for good measure in leading the Kansas City A's to a 9-3 victory over the Senators.

Six Homers Hit
Pena, who had lost his last five games, struck out seven and did not walk a batter en route to his fifth victory. His fifth inning homer was one of six hit during the game.

Ed Charles and George Alusk also connected for KC while Larry

Osborne, Don Lock and Jim King each homered for Washington, Don Rudolph was charged with his seventh defeat in 10 decisions.

Elsewhere in the American League, the New York Yankees climbed into a percentage tie for first place by blanking the Cleveland Indians 4-0; the Los Angeles Angels downed the Baltimore Orioles 7-4; the Detroit Tigers ended the Minnesota Twins' 10-game winning streak 3-1, and the Chicago White Sox shut out the Boston Red Sox 6-0.

In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals shaded the San Francisco Giants 6-5; the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the New York Mets 2-0; the Chicago Cubs edged the Philadelphia Phillies 2-1; the Houston Colts beat the Milwaukee Braves 3-2, and the Cincinnati Reds downed the Los Angeles Dodgers 7-4.

Osinski Wins Third
Ex-reliever Dan Osinski scored his third victory of the season and

his first as a starter in the Angels' win over the Orioles, who dropped their third in a row. Rookie Charley Dress led off the fifth inning with a homer off loser Milt Pappas and the Angels clinched the outcome with two more runs in the same frame for a 7-2 lead. The loss was Pappas' first after four wins.

Jim Bunning ended the major leagues' longest winning streak by limiting the Twins to seven hits as he recorded his third triumph for the Tigers. Gus Triandos' single with the bases full was the key blow off loser Jim Perry during a three-run rally by the Tigers in the fourth. Earl Battey's 10th homer in the ninth deprived Bunning of a shutout.

Johnny Buzhardt checked the Red Sox on three hits while the White Sox pounded loser Gene Conley for five runs during the first three innings. Charley Maxwell clipped Conley for a triple and a single, scoring twice and driving in one run. Nellie Fox and Pete Ward also had two hits apiece. The victory was Buzhardt's fifth compared with two losses.
