

Giants, Cards, Cubs Tie For Lead; Birds Sock Yanks Again

Lindy McDaniel Hurls, Hits Cubs Past Stumbling Giants

Lindy McDaniel of the Chicago Cubs and George Altman of the St. Louis Cardinals, who figured in a six-player deal nine months ago, figured again today in a three-way tie for the National League lead.

The fantastic Cubs, Cardinals and slumping San Francisco Giants are all deadlocked for first place and the two men chiefly responsible for the snarl are McDaniel and Altman.

McDaniel, an ordinarily weak-hitting relief pitcher who usually gives way to a pinch hitter, won his own game Thursday with a 10th inning homer off Billy Pierce that beat the Giants 3-2 and gave the Cubs their fifth straight victory.

Third Season Win
The victory was McDaniel's second in as many days, third of the season and the Cubs' 11th in their last 13 contests.

McDaniel was as effective on the mound as he was at bat in handing the Giants their fourth straight setback. Taking over for Barney Schultz with the bases full and one out in the top of the 10th, he picked Willie Mays off second base and then struck out Ed Bailey to end the threat.

Like McDaniel, Altman didn't get into the Cardinals-Phillies game until the late innings but when he did get his chance in the eighth he delivered a pinch double that drove in the winning run in a 5-4 victory for St. Louis.

Started With Cubs
Originally, Altman began his major league career with the Cubs but was dealt to the Cardinals last Oct. 17 in the same trade that sent McDaniel from St. Louis to Chicago.

200 Trackmen Run Tonight In NCAA Small Team Meet

CHICAGO (UPI) - More than 200 track stars take a shot at fame and future today and Saturday in the first National Collegiate Athletic Association championship for its small college members.

Entries have been made from 33 schools and while the competitors will be looking for honors in the meet, they'll also seek advancement to the university division championship at the University of New Mexico the following week.

The first six finishers in each event will be eligible to enter the New Mexico meet.

Several of this weekend's field stacked up an almost certain entrants for the university championship and possibly potential winners there too.

Notable among these was Loyola University's star miler, Tom O'Hara, already clocked under four minutes three times this year, and the standout favorite in the 22-man field this weekend.

Three other athletes appeared likely to win their events and perhaps show the potential to

qualify for the Olympic team as well.

Two of them were on the 1963 U.S. Pan American team, Jim Johnson of Virginia State who won the 400-meter dash in the Pan Am, and Russ Rogers of Maryland State, third in the Pan Am in the 440-yard hurdles. Another Maryland State star, Charles Mays, has won the AAU national crown in the broad jump and has a best performance of 26'3".

Finals will be held in seven events today and in 11 events Saturday.

Houk, Hitchcock Feud May Flare As Bright As 1962

Ralph Houk and Billy Hitchcock have another feud going and this one could be a pip.

The two managers had to be separated during a sudden flare-up in New York last summer. Neither threw any punches in Baltimore Thursday night but both got in some hot-tempered conversational licks after the Orioles beat the Yankees 4-2 to take a 1 1/2 game lead in the American League race.

"We'll win the pennant," snapped Houk, obviously smarting over the fact the Yankees lost two out of three games to the Orioles. "Baltimore won't beat us. You can bet on that and you can put it in headlines."

Cooling off a bit, Houk conceded "the Orioles have a good ball club," then hastily added, "but I think we have a better one—even with our injuries."

Appraised of the Yankee manager's comments, Hitchcock countered: "I'm glad Houk is so concerned about the Orioles. He must really be worried about us to be so concerned."

The Yankees, who lost Mickey Mantle for at least a month when he suffered a broken bone in his left foot Wednesday night, also suffered another blow Thursday night when starter Jim Bouton was struck on the jaw by Jackie Brandt's line drive in the fourth inning.

Bouton, owner of a 7-1 record, was forced to leave the game and had to have 12 stitches taken.

In a ball game where there was less conversation, the Washington Senators beat the Boston Red Sox 2-1 for their fourth victory in a row and their longest winning streak of the season.

Larry Osborne's 10th homer with one man aboard off loser Gene Conley in the first inning was all the margin Dave Stenhouse needed for his third victory although Ronnie Kline had to be summoned from the bullpen to retire Carl Yastrzemski for the final out of the game.

No other games were scheduled in the American League.

Over in the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals climbed into a three-way tie for first place with San Francisco and Chicago by defeating the Philadelphia Phillies 5-4. The incredible Cubs scored a 3-2 decision over the Giants in 10 innings, and the Cincinnati Reds swept a two-nighter from the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-5 and 10-5 in the only other games scheduled.

Compton Has Top Men

COMPTON, Calif. (UPI) - The Compton Invitational Track and Field Meet tonight features a number of superlatives on an entry list which includes six seven-foot high-jumpers, five sub-four-minute milers, and six 16-foot pole-vaulters.

The meet has attracted major attention from track and field fans because of the presence of New Zealand's Peter Snell who may be forced to break his world mark of 3:34.4 if he hopes to win. A fast early pace might leave the door open for an upset victory by one of the following: Jim Beatty, holder of the American record at 3:36.3; Jim Grelle, whose best is 3:36.7; Dwyll Burleson, 3:37.6; and Carl Weisiger, 3:37.3.

Snell said this week the way to beat him was to run him into the ground with a fast early pace. Several Los Angeles Track Club runners teamed up with this thought in mind at the recent California Relays in Modesto but Snell outlasted them all, winning in 3:54.9. Weisiger was second and Beatty third.
