Steels were mostly easier as were chemicals. Ford went ahead in the motors while Chrysler backtracked. International oils firmed while tobacco eased.

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Crash Ruins Big Trailer

A highway tractor pulling a 55-foot long mobile home was sideswiped by a truck and trailer about noon, Wednesday, on Highway 58, near Milepost 73, causing it to jackknife and spin off the road, Oregon State Police reported Friday.

The mobile home rolled over, dragging the tractor with it, and spewed the personal effects of its owner, Mrs. Skills of Portland, throughout the area. The house trailer, valued at some \$15,000, was a total loss, but neither driver of the two trucks appeared to be injured seriously, police said.

Sometime following the accident, Woodrow Looney, 57, Santa Ana, Calif., operator of the tractor-trailer mobile home tandem, complained of a back injury, police added.

Police records indicate that Robert David Shuman, 26, of Portland, was driving a truck and trailer loaded with machinery when he pulled into the left lane, near the Crescent Creek Bridge, to pass Looney's tandem.

As the two vehicles were abreast of one another, the passing truck sideswiped the other, causing it to jackknife. The vehicles were westbound at the time of the accident.
