Bouffants Cause Grief To Mortarboard Makers

NEW YORK (UPI) There's no summa cum laude for the bouffant hairdo from those who supply mortarboards for girl graduates.

The teen-ager with the big head on graduation day is just a headache to the cap and gown suppliers, industry sources said today. They would like to see the hair tamed just for that one event in a girl's life anyway.

And one supplier has gone so far as to publish a brochure for high schools, suggesting various hair styles best suited for the mortarboard.

"The bouffant's a major problem," said John Barbera, sales administrator of the E. R. Moore Co., which produced the brochure. "We talk down teasing, and hope the girls will be conservative at least for that one important hour in their lives."

"On graduation day the bouffants gotta go," said Philip Gelvin, executive vice president of the Collegiate Cap and Gown Co. But industry sources said all mortarboard sizes have grown a bit, simply because today's children are larger than previous generations.

"Ten or 15 years ago, a boy of six feet two inches on the basketball team was a giant," said Gelvin. "Today, they're six feet seven, eight and nine and nobody thinks anything about it."

The larger stature of today's graduate is reflected in larger gown sizes too. But gown lengths do not vacillate with fashion — they're still worn approximately eight inches from the floor, although today's teen-age girl is wearing her regular hemlines almost kilt length.

Major changes for the whole industry are in the riot of new colors for the high school graduate, the new fabrics in lighter weights for scholars of all ages, and a demand now for caps and gowns right down to the kindergarten level.

Gelvin's firm listed more than two dozen colors ranging from black, navy, and maroon to white, rich purple, brilliant gold, scarlet red, several shades of greens and blues, and smoke gray. The bright and light colors for the halls of ivy are a result of the nation's whole consciousness of color, said Gelvin. "You see it in homes, in the cars."
