The most exciting news is color—pink, peach, white and, of course, tulip stem green. There are bold over-all tulip prints and exquisite tulip embroideries on solid grounds. Other styles in the line have ruffles cut in the shape of tulips and attached to the hemline.

Several dresses are designed in a tulip-inspired silhouette, a narrow figure-skimming shape, with a high waist or no waistline at all.

Four Themes Prevail In Men's Sportswear

Weekendwear, the last but not least of the new trends, lends itself very smartly to the newly

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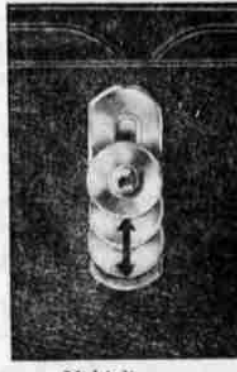
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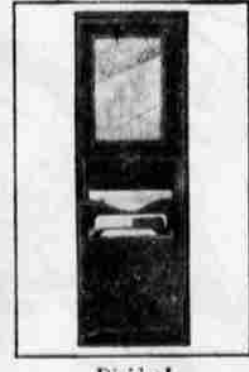
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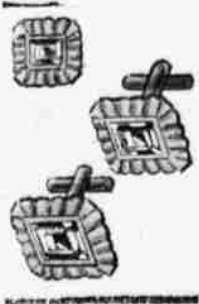
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
