Merrill Captures Second Basin Babe Ruth League Victory, 7-6

Boros Stretches Lead In Tourney

GRAND BLANC, Mich. (UPI)—Julius (Moose) Boros stretched his lead to four shots, big George Bayer fired a \$5,700 ace and Sam Sneed's current consecutive money winning record was snapped in the second round of the Buck Open golf championship Sunday.

The easy-going Boros moseyed over the long Warwick Hills Golf Club course to add a one-under-par 36-35-71 to a first round 66 for a 137 total. That put him four fat shots in front of Canada's George Knudson, southpaw Bob Charles of New Zealand and the giant Bayer.

The six-foot, five-inch Bayer, noted as golf's longest hitter, proved his deftness with the short irons too, when he holed out the sixth ace of his career — a six iron shot on the 171-yard eighth hole — to win a \$5,700 Buick automobile. It also helped him to a two-under-par 70.

And Sneed, who had cashed in 54 consecutive tournament appearances since 1958, shot a triple bogey seven by four-putting the final hole for his second straight 77, which caused him to be cut as the field was narrowed to the low 73 and ties.

Sneed's act was deliberate, because the slammer wanted no part of Sunday's two closing rounds, which start at 3:30 a.m. EDT because the first round was washed out Thursday. Thus his pitter-putting allowed him to avoid 36 holes in one day and the early rising which at 52 the masochist millionaire has come to dislike.

Boros' 137, total meanwhile set him up happily for a golfing marathon in which he will play 162 holes within six days. Counting Thursday's washed out round and four rounds in the Buick in three days, he will play two practice rounds Monday over courses to be used in the U. S. Open qualifying in the New York district and then two rounds there Tuesday in his qualifying attempt.

Although four shots back,

Charles, Knudson and Bayer all had hope of overhauling him when they grind to a close in Sunday's two final rounds. Bayer and Knudson both shot 70's Saturday while Charles had a 72.

Atones For Show In Walker Cup

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (UPI)—Michael Lunt, a 20-year-old English textile executive, atoned for his failure in the Walker Cup matches Saturday when he defeated his millionaire countryman, John Blackwell, 2 and 1, to win the British Amateur golf championship.

Lunt, who lost three of his matches and halved the other as the United States retained the Walker Cup two weeks ago, had to shoot brilliant golf on the second 18 holes Saturday afternoon to defeat the 40-year-old Blackwell, a Sunday golfer with a one handicap.

In the end, however, it was the 76-degree heat as much as Lunt which beat Blackwell, who still feels the effects of the tortured treatment he received as a prisoner of war in Japan.

In contrast to his previous rounds, the eccentric Blackwell was serious Saturday — so serious that he did not joke with the gallery and only took one drink out of the bottle of Vodka and orange juice which he carried with him. But he just couldn't keep pace with his younger opponent after holding him even on the morning 18.

Broglio Pitches Cards Past Mets
NEW YORK (UPI)—Right-hander Ernie Broglio pitched his third two-hit victory and his fourth shutout Saturday in hurling the St. Louis Cardinals to a 4-0 triumph over the New York Mets.

For the Mets, the shutout was the ninth of the season, tops in the major leagues. Broglio's shutout was the eighth by a Cardinal pitcher, which ties the St. Louis staff with Cincinnati for the league lead. The victory was Broglio's sixth of the season, four of them shutouts.
