Ed Sachs Admits Wrong Words Used

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) — Race driver Eddie Sachs of Detroit was back in the good graces of the United States Auto Club today after apologizing for his criticism of officiating at the Indianapolis 500-mile auto race.

Sachs could have been fined or suspended for his conduct, but the USAC executive committee at a closed meeting with him Monday let him off with one year's probation.

USAC said its ruling meant Sachs could still race during the probationary period but could make no remarks which might reflect on the integrity of USAC officials.

"I know I was wrong even before they called me in," Sachs said after the session. "I used poorly chosen words. I did not want to question the integrity of USAC officials."

Sachs was ordered last week to appear before the committee to explain statements attributed to him that "politics" enabled Parnelli Jones to win the Memorial Day classic.

Sachs' criticism came minutes after the finish of the 500-mile race when he charged that J.C. Agajanian, owner of Jones' car, had talked USAC officials out of blacklagging Jones. Sachs claimed Jones should have been taken out of the race because his car was losing oil in the final laps and was a danger to other drivers.

By United Press International If you're looking for a brief rundown on Monday's Pacific Coast League action, forget the league standings and game results.

Look instead for a couple of off-field items from the widely separated cities of Portland, Ore., and San Diego, Calif.

Item one: Portland Beaver manager Les Peden was fired and replaced by Danny Carnevale, a scout in the Kansas City Organization.

Item two: San Diego pitcher Sammy Ellis was suspended indefinitely for insubordination to climax a running dispute with manager Don Hefner.

Meanwhile, on the playing field, Oklahoma City blanked the Padres 7-0 and Spokane topped Seattle 4-1. Denver dropped a close 8-7 exhibition game to the Minnesota Twins and Dallas-Ft. Worth was rained out at Salt Lake City.

Peden, a 40-year-old veteran of 17 years of minor league baseball, joined Portland as a playing manager last year and the Beavers finished sixth in the PCL with a 74-69 record.

Peden also played in 47 games and compiled an impressive .351 batting average.

This year Peden concentrated on his managerial duties. (He just recently placed himself on the active list and belted a grand slam home run Saturday night.) The Beavers are currently in third place in the Northern Division with a respectable 28-28 record.

But this did not satisfy the Kansas City Athletics, parent team of the Beavers.

"We hoped the Beavers would be doing better at this stage of the campaign," Hank Peters, Kansas City's farm director, said in announcing Peden's dismissal Monday. "We feel a change of managers might perk up the club."

The feud between Ellis and Hefner had been building up for some days and finally exploded Monday with Hefner's statement: "There's not room for both of us on the ball club, either he goes or I go."

The suspension was a direct result of an incident Sunday, although Ellis had already been assessed two fines for run-ins with Hefner.

When Hefner went to the mound Sunday in the second inning to remove Ellis, the pitcher argued with the manager for several minutes before 4,495 fans. Ellis said Hefner accused him of not doing his best.

"Hefner knew my arm has been aching and I didn't want to cause any further damage to it by throwing too hard," Ellis said in his own defense.

By OSCAR FRALEY UPI Sports Writer NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York Mets will not be going anywhere but to old "K.C." and to the "Dook" it's an almost unbelievable joyride toward baseball oblivion.

Neither of them, Casey Stengel nor Edwin "Duke" Snider, has ever seen anything like baseball as it is played by the Mets in the Polo Grounds. This could be the windup year for both, or maybe they'll bring out another one. The "new breed," as the Met fans are known, are enough to possibly make both of them go for one more shot.

Casey, Duke Enjoying Ride With NY Mets

Milwaukee Braves, calls the Polo Grounds "the chamber of horrors." But Stengel and the "Dook" are their boys and it leaves Snider slightly pee-pyed.

The Duke has plenty of snow on the roof now and for several seasons, has been fighting a losing battle of the middle-aged bulge. He is a man operating from memory, his 36 years having frayed the talents after 20 years in organized baseball.

He was one of the front line heroes when the Dodgers rumped and rattled around Ebbets Field from 1947 through 1957. Then when the club went west to Los Angeles, Snider was thoughtless to say that he admired the move.

Snider had good reasons. A Californian, he had an avocado farm in his native state. And, as the years piled up, it was felt that he probably would hang up his spikes if he was dealt away. He probably would have, if he had been peeled off to Washington or Kansas City. Yet, because of his admiration for Stengel, he stayed on despite his shift to the lowly Mets.

And, coming down the far side of the hill, he has found it to be an amusing experience. One, he will tell you, which transcends anything that ever happened in Flatbush.

Have Little Punch The Mets, still in their infancy, have very little real punch. Give the Duke his pitch, however, and he still can wallop it out of the park. Like Friday night, when with the Mets trailing 2-0 and two men on base, they began to stomp and scream: "We want the Dook!" So Stengel sent him up and the "Dook" obliged. He banged one out, his 16th of the year and 299th of his career, and the Mets won it 5-2. Stengel did a jig all the way to the clubhouse and the fans almost rocked the old Polo Grounds into the river. "I've never seen anything like it in my career," Snider shakes his head, almost in awe. "How can you help but knock yourself out when people cheer for you like that?"

Missouri, Texas Meet Today In Second Round Of NCAA

OMAHA, Neb. (UPI)—Missouri, which proved Monday the advance word on its pitching staff was no joke, planned to send unbeaten Jack Stroud against Texas tonight in the second round of the NCAA national baseball tournament.

Sophomore Keith Weber, another of the Missouri's hurling heroes, turned in the standout performance of Monday's marathon program with a six-hit, 3-0 triumph over Holy Cross.

Weber's gem vaulted the favored Tigers into the winners' bracket for an engagement with Texas tonight. Charley Hartenstein (6-2) is scheduled to throw for the Longhorns. Texas rode over Southern California, 8-3, Monday.

Tonight's other winners' bracket contest sends Arizona, an 8-1 first round winner over Penn State, against Florida State. The Seminoles pulled a 5-2 victory over Western Michigan out of the fire with three runs in the ninth.

Jim Nichols (9-3) of Arizona has been nominated to face Florida State's Al Thomas (9-2).

In the afternoon twin bill, Penn State will see Dick Noe (2-1) in its fight for survival in the double-elimination series against Western Michigan's Lee Salo (7-1). Don Riedl (3-4) of Holy Cross will face either Pete Hillman (4-1) or Duane White (5-3) of Southern Cal.
