'Penny' Flights Offered

The Klamath Field Aero Club, an organization of flying enthusiasts, has announced that beginning immediately it will fly base personnel on short hops for "a penny a pound."

The 15-minute flights were instituted by Aero Club president, Lt. Dale P. Livingston, as a unique way of giving publicity to the re-organized club.

For an average 165 pound individual, the short hop would be conducted for \$1.65 — somewhat below the cost of fuel alone — and would provide the passenger with a spectacular view of the area.

The club owns a T-34 two-place aircraft and a Piper Tri-Pacer. Both are well equipped with radio and navigational gear.

The club also offers ground school and flying instruction to base personnel. Richard Hardy is the instructor.

Partner Rescued Mt. Everest Conqueror From Probable Death

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) — James Whittaker, first American to conquer Mt. Everest, was rescued from probable death near the summit by his climbing partner, Nepalese Sherpa guide Nawang Gombu, it was revealed today.

American expedition leader Norman G. Dyhrenfurth, of Santa Monica, Calif., told the story at the group's first news conference since returning from its historic triple assault on the world's highest mountain.

He said Whittaker and Gombu were working their way back down from the summit when 25 feet of trail on a snow cornice gave way under Whittaker's feet and he suddenly found himself in mid-air, "dangling upside down from a rope."

Dyhrenfurth said Gombu's quick action in tightening the rope saved Whittaker's life.

Whittaker, 32, of Redmond, Wash., said the snow cornice near the summit was extremely tricky and crossing them was highly hazardous. The two men reached the top May 1 in the face of heavy snow plumes and howling winds, he said.

"Everest seemed to me much higher than the height mentioned in geography books I had read," Whittaker said with a smile.

Asked if he would like to climb the 29,245-foot peak again, he said:

"Not in the near future."

Whittaker said he had gone without food during the final 12

hours of the climb, partly due to poor appetite at the extremely high altitude where even chewing became a great effort.

He said it would be impossible to scale Everest without supplementary oxygen such as the expedition used.

Gombu credited the expedition's success in placing three separate

teams on the summit—two in one day—to the "very nice oxygen masks" with a defrosting feature devised by Dr. Thomas F. Hornbein, 32, of San Diego, Calif., who participated in the May 22 double assault.

The Nepalese guide said he and Whittaker halted near the summit in a "courtesy duel," each trying

to let the other reach the top first.

"We were both getting near the summit on one rope, leading each other by turns," Gombu said.

"Near the top we both stopped for a few minutes and each waited for the other to step first," Whittaker told me "you first" and finally we compromised. We

both stepped on the top of Everest together."

Gombu said he carefully searched the summit and looked down on the surrounding slopes for a cement bust of Chinese Communist party Chairman Mao Tse-tung which a Chinese team supposedly left on the peak in 1960.

"Disappointingly enough, I did not find any proof of the Chinese claim," he said.

Dyhrenfurth said the expedition's success was "mainly due to fine teamwork, fine weather and the most valuable help of the Sherpas." He has invited five of the guides to visit the United

States as guests of the expedition.

Dyhrenfurth listed the expedition's major achievements as conquest of Mt. Everest by the West Ridge route for the first time, making a major traverse of the Himalayas with a large amount of equipment and scientific research the results of which will be announced later.
