Koufax' Comeback Leading Dodgers

Dust off that comeback of the year award and mail it special delivery to Sandy Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers.
There's a long way to go until season's end but it's clear that Koufax and the award go together like ham and eggs — or like guts and skill.
A little less than a year ago Koufax' career was endangered by a finger ailment. He didn't win a game for the Dodgers over the second half of the 1962 National League season and he went to spring training this season as one of the biggest question marks in major league baseball.
It's taken him just two months to demonstrate that he's shaken off the effects of the ailment and is again one of the great pitchers of baseball.

Throws Fifth Shutout
The blinding speedballer turned in his fifth shutout and ninth victory of the season Thursday night when he fireballed the Dodgers to a 3-0 win over the Houston Colts that enabled Los Angeles to retain first place by two percentage points. Koufax struck out 10 and walked only two behind a nine-hit attack that included two hits each by Tommy Davis and Wally Moon.
Koufax' five shutouts tie him with Cincinnati's Jim O'Toole for the league lead and his 102 strikeouts in 167 innings leave him only two behind teammate Don Drysdale. Thursday night's game also marked the fifth time in his career that Koufax has struck out 10 or more men in a game.
The San Francisco Giants shined the Chicago Cubs 2-1, the Cincinnati Reds downed the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-2, and the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Philadelphia Phillies 7-3 in other NL

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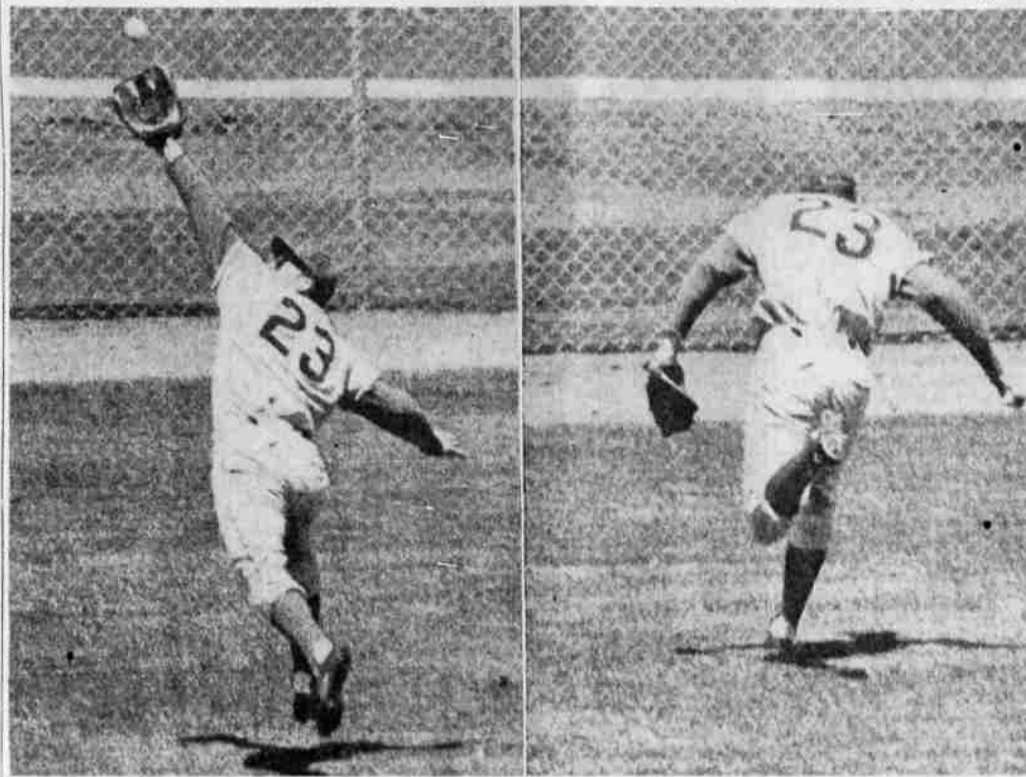

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles nipped the New York Yankees 5-4, the Minnesota Twins defeated the Kansas City Athletics 6-3, the Cleveland Indians whipped the Detroit Tigers 5-3 and the Boston Red Sox scored a 7-5 victory over the Washington Senators.
Willie Mays homered in the bottom of the 10th inning to break up a brilliant pitching duel between Billy O'Dell and Dick Ellsworth and give O'Dell his ninth win of the season against two losses.
Home runs by Leo Cardenas and Gordon Coleman helped the Reds overcome a 2-0 deficit and move into fourth place. John Tsiouris pitched a five-hitter and struck out six to win his second game while Don Cardwell suffered his eighth defeat.
Ernie Broglio won his seventh game for the Cardinals in a game shortened to six innings by rain. Gene Oliver homered for the Cardinals and Earl Averill and Roy Sievers hit homers for the Phillies.

The old Orioles would be proud of Brooks Robinson.
The Orioles, circa 1890-1899, wrote the text book on baseball behavior: When the catcher suffers a broken knuckle he rubs it in the dirt and goes on catching; when a pitcher has a sore arm he asks to pitch a doubleheader; when a batter is knocked down by a pitch he gets up and puts the slug on the pitcher.
Robinson, 26, is a new Oriole but Uncle Wilbert Robinson himself would be leading the cheers today for the "old Oriole" way in which Brooks picked himself out of the dirt Thursday night and delivered a two-run single that gave the Baltimore Orioles a 5-4 victory over the New York Yankees.
The bases were filled with Orioles and the Yankees held a 4-3 lead when Robinson batted against reliever Bill Kunkel in the seventh inning. Kunkel promptly sent Robinson sprawling in the dust of Yankee Stadium with a brushback pitch.
Delivers Winning Hit
Robinson's answer was to dig in for the next pitch and deliver the two-run blow that snapped the Orioles' five-game losing streak and knocked the Yankees out of first place in the American League.
Left-hander Steve Barber, aided by Dick Hall's three innings of first-inning relief, became the AL's first 10-game winner of the season. Jerry Adair of the Orioles and Elston Howard of the Yankees hit homers.
The Cleveland Indians beat the Detroit Tigers 5-3, the Minnesota Twins defeated the Kansas City Athletics 6-3, and the Boston Red Sox scored a 7-5 win over the Washington Senators in other AL action.

Frank Malzone's three-run homer and Jack Lamabe's one-hit three-inning relief pitching enabled the Red Sox to sweep their two-game series with the last-place Senators.

Peace Call Issued By AAU

NEW YORK (UPI) — Another call for peace has been issued by the Amateur Athletic Union.
At stake in the war with the National Collegiate Athletic Association is a strong, representative team for the United States in the 1964 Olympics, and more immediately for the dual meet with Russia next month.
AAU President Louis J. Fisher Thursday called on the NCAA to help present a united amateur sports front for the Olympics.
In a telegram to R. F. Ray of the University of Iowa, president of the NCAA, Fisher said: "Our fine amateur athletes deserve an end of this sports conflict and the United States needs our patriotic cooperation to maintain its rightful place in international sports."
The AAU and NCAA have been feuding for control of amateur track and field. It appeared a settlement had been reached with the help of arbitrator General Douglas MacArthur, but there have been several skirmishes between the two groups in recent weeks.
Fisher pledged "equitable representation" to the NCAA on its governing council.

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
