

Juan Marichal Pitches No-Hit, No-Run Game At Houston Colts

Dodgers Keep Pace With Giants, Don Drysdale Defeats Cubs, 4-1

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The second-place Los Angeles Dodgers kept pace with the league-leading San Francisco Giants by beating the Chicago Cubs 4-1 on seven-hit pitching of Don Drysdale and nine-hit attack against Larry Jackson.

Drysdale, never in serious trouble, struck out six men and had good control and did not walk a man — the fourth time he has performed this feat in a complete game this season. He registered his eighth victory against seven defeats.

The Dodgers did not get any extra base hits off Jackson, now 7-6, but scored one run in the first inning on a pair of singles and three more in the second inning on four singles.

Cub catcher Dick Bertell tri-

pled to open the third inning and came home on Jackson's infield fly for the only run off Drysdale. Jackson doubled to left center in the fifth inning but could not get as far as third base before Drysdale got the side out.

The Dodger pitcher got some

good support in the field, particularly in the sixth inning when Willie Davis made a running catch of Billy Williams' drive close to the 400-foot mark in center field. The victory brought the Dodgers even with the third-place Cubs, 1-1, in the series. The se-

ries will be completed Sunday in a doubleheader. Davis was also a big man at the plate, driving in two runs and scoring one himself. He got two hits in four times at bat. Maury Wills, with one single, extended his hitting streak to 11 games.

Cloninger's Relief Hurling Aids Braves Win Over Phils

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Brilliant relief pitching by Tony Cloninger and a wild fifth inning by Philadelphia pitcher Johnny Klippstein gave the Milwaukee Braves a 5-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Saturday.

Cloninger gave up only three hits and struck out eight batters in the final 4-2-3 innings to pick up his first victory of the year. He has lost three.

The first hit was a pinch single by Clay Dalrymple in the fifth that scored two runs, both charged to starter Denny Lemaster. The other hits came in the ninth when pinchhitter Bob Olds hit an in-

field single and Johnny Callison singled to left. Home runs by Lemaster and Lee Maye in the second and a first-inning run driven in by Eddie Mathews on a sacrifice fly accounted for the first three Milwaukee runs.

The hard-luck Lemaster for whom the Braves had gotten just one run in his four previous starts ran into trouble in the fifth when the Phils scored on singles by pinchhitter Frank Torre, Callison and Don Demeter and a sacrifice fly by Roy Sievers. Dalrymple's single scored Callison and Demeter.

The wild fifth inning off Klippstein saw Mathews start things off with a single. Klippstein then proceeded to walk Mack Jones, Tommy Aaron, pinch batter Norm Larker and Del Crandall to score Mathews and Jones.

Jones, who entered the game with 13 hits in 26 times at bat since becoming a regular June 7, was walked four times, three of them unintentional. Philadelphia manager Gene Mauch used 20 players in an attempt to move past the Braves and Pittsburgh Pirates into sixth place.

A's Drop ChiSox In Loop

CHICAGO (UPI) — Jay Hankins' two-run triple and three-hit relief pitching by Dale Willis and John Wyatt Saturday carried the Kansas City Athletics to a 4-3 victory which dropped the Chicago White Sox to second place in the American League.

Hankins' drive to left field in the fifth inning got by Floyd Robinson to score Wayne Causey and Ted Bowfield to wipe out a 2-0 Chicago lead.

The Athletics scored an earlier run in the same frame on a single by Chuck Essegian, an infield out and Causey's single.

Ray Herbert, early-season Chicago pitching ace, who has not won a game since his fifth shut-out of the season on May 14, suffered his fourth loss in nine decisions.

The White Sox jumped on Kansas City starter Diego Segui in the first inning with two runs on four hits, and threatened again in the third when Bowfield came on in relief.

Bowfield, who got credit for the win, pitched two scoreless innings before he was removed because of a groin injury.

Giants Regain First In NL Loop

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — High-kicking Juan Marichal fired a no-hitter past the Houston Colts Saturday for a 1-0 victory that lifted the San Francisco Giants back into first place in the National League.

Marichal, who broke in to the majors three years ago by pitching a one-hitter against the Philadelphia Phillies, allowed two walks and struck out five in posting his sixth straight win.

Ironically, Marichal's last defeat came on May 11 when Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers beat the Giants with a no-hitter in Los Angeles.

Left fielder Willie McCovey kept Marichal's string going in the seventh inning when he raced over to his right and reached up high with both hands to snag a line smash by Carl Warwick with Bob Aspromonte on first base.

The right hander from the Dominican Republic faced a total of 29 batters.

It was the first no-hitter to be pitched by a Giant since May 11, 1959 when Carl Hubbell turned back the Pittsburgh Pirates for the then New York Giants.

It was a tough defeat for Dick Drott, who didn't give up a run until the eighth inning and held the Giants to three hits in going the distance.

Jim Davenport opened the eighth with a double to left field for the Giants' first hit since the first inning when Willie Mays had beaten out an infield single. Drott retired the next two batters but then Chuck Hiller lined a double to right field that scored Davenport.

Drott's record now is 2-4 and he has been beaten by the Giants 11 times in his 14 decisions with San Francisco.

The only Colts to get on base were Al Spangler, who walked in the fifth and Aspromonte who drew a pass in the seventh. Spangler was erased when Bob Lillis hit into a fielder's choice that ended the inning. Then McCovey caught Warwick's liner in the seventh, and that inning ended as Rusty Staub fled to Mays in center.

A crowd of 18,869 was on its feet cheering when Marichal came out to open the ninth inning. First he retired pinch hitter Johnny Temple on a foul fly to first baseman Orlando Cepeda. Then Pete Rummels, twice the American League batting champion, stepped in to pinch hit for Ernie Fazio and went down swinging. Rookie

Brook Davis followed Rummels and looked at a called third strike, ending the game.

Marichal's no-hitter was the third in the majors this year. In addition to Koufax's masterpiece, Don Nisbitt of the Houston Colts pitched a no-hit victory over the Philadelphia Phillies May 17, although allowing one run.

Yankees Topple Tigers

NEW YORK (UPI) — Al Downing, troubled more by his own wildness than the Detroit Tigers, pitched the New York Yankees into first place in the American League Saturday with a 9-2 victory.

Downing, registering his second route-going victory since being recalled from Richmond, issued seven walks and gave up seven hits. But he also struck out nine batters for the second time in as many starts.

Tom Tresh hit a two-run homer for New York and Hector Lopez drove in four runs with a double and a single.

Mickey Lolich, ninth straight lefthander to start against New York, worked the first six innings for Detroit and took his third loss against one victory.

The Yankees scored twice in the second on Elston Howard's double. Harry Bright's single and Clete Boyer's double. Two walks, Jake Wood's error and Lopez' double added a pair in the fourth.

Against Bob Anderson in the seventh, the Yankees got two on Tresh's 10th homer. Dick Egan gave up three in the eighth of three singles, a double and an infield out.

Indians Rip Washington

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Pedro Ramos, making his first start in three weeks, pitched seven innings and gave up only one hit to give the Cleveland Indians a 4-0 victory over the Washington Senators Saturday.

Ramos, who had been sidelined by a strained muscle in his pitching arm, retired 20 batters in a row before Jim King doubled with two out in the seventh inning.

King went to third on a wild pitch, but Ramos induced Chuck Hinton to ground out to retire the side.

The Cuban righthander left the game after the seventh inning when his arm became tired. Ted Abernathy took over and blanked Washington without a hit in the last two innings.
