Scores Try Discomforts In Interest Of Science

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A special study of natural resources suggests the United States may be facing a future shortage of outdoor recreation areas because of the growing area of campers, hunters and picnickers flocking to the woodlands.

The study was the work of Resources for the Future Inc. (RFF), a research foundation which specializes in estimating the nation's resource potential.

RFF economists noted that during the past 30 years the use of state and national parks has increased 10 per cent annually.

"They said that if this trend continues, by the year 2000 the nation will need a staggering 90 million more acres to handle this mass exodus to the outdoors.

At present, there are only 45 million acres of national and state park recreation land.

Recreation Area Scarce

The RFF report which was the result of five years of research, said it will be virtually impossible to find another 90 million acres for recreation by the turn of the century.

It suggested that planners would have to solve the problem by careful exploitation of present recreation acreage and multiple use of other lands.

For instance, in future years areas that might normally be set aside exclusively for growing trees may have to double as state parks.

The report also said growing pressures from those eager to use the areas will require more intensive use of present parkland.

This means building more access roads, picnic grounds and camp sites. The report suggests that just about every corner of the recreation area will have to be fitted to meet the need.

And if that doesn't do it, the governing bodies may have to ration use by limiting the length of time visitors can stay.

The report said a more intensive use program will have its drawbacks — especially for those who want nature in its pure state when they take to the woods.

Wildlife May Decline

Increased use of national and state parks will result in dwindling wildlife and fish populations.

"Large populations of wildlife have proved to be incompatible with large numbers of people," the report said.

The big increase in use of recreation areas in the present generation is the result of changing patterns in the American way of life.

The growing population is one factor that will continue to keep the pressure on. By the year 2000, RFF researchers expect the U.S. population to increase about 50 per cent.

Spain Plans Big Displays For Visitors

MADRID (UPI) — Visitors to Spain this summer will be in for an out-of-the-ordinary treat.

From July through September, a display of historic treasures will be open for visitors to the famous monastery and palace of El Escorial, 30 miles north of Madrid.

The occasion is the Fourth Centenary of the founding of the oddly-shaped monastery.

Special events in connection with the celebration include inauguration of a new museum comprising 40 rooms in the summer palace of King Philip II, the monarch who built the mastery to commemorate the victory of the Spanish Army over the French under King Henry II at St. Quentin, France, in 1557.

"San Lorenzo del Escorial," as the monastery is officially known, was built in the shape of a grill, as a memorial to St. Lorenzo. He was burned alive on a grill by the Romans in the 3rd Century.

The 90-day series of events planned for El Escorial includes "reverts, lectures, tours, festivals of the arts, popular fiestas, bullfights and fairs.

In the annals of sociology, the efforts to poke fun at dear old Dad are relatively new—about 40 years old.

Before that time, according to Rabinowitz, a graduate of the Boston University School of Social Work, Dad truly was an untouchable — a sturdy, solemn figure no one dared joke about.

How did the trend to boobyhood hatch?

Rabinowitz said in an interview that it's linked to the changing status of women. One of the ways some women lead to seek equal rights is by tearing down the other guy — in this case the papa who's supposed to be all at the hearthside.

"From what most experts can see," Rabinowitz said, "most American families still are run by a very competent Dad who almost always demonstrates a talent for right thinking."
