

Green Light Will Indicate Election Of New Pontiff

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—A Vatican official has announced that a red or green light will be used during this week's conclave to indicate the outcome of voting for a new Roman Catholic pontiff. The statement Sunday by Msgr. William Acrow of the Vatican Secretariat of State confirmed a UPI dispatch of June 8 that electric lights would be used to supplement the traditional signal of black and white smoke.

Funeral Rites For Pope End

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Nine days of funeral services for Pope John XXIII ended today with a solemn Mass in St. Peter's Basilica attended by churchmen and politicians from all over the world. Seventy-two cardinals were present for the services presided over by Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, gray-bearded French-born dean of the Sacred College. On Wednesday, the cardinals will begin the conclave to elect the successor to Pope John, who died June 3 at the age of 81.

For the Mass, representatives of 85 governments and international organizations gathered beside the red-draped catafalque lit by 88 candles and topped by the jeweled papal crown.

After the services, the cardinals moved to the consistorial hall where they received the government delegations one by one, including U. S. representatives headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

There was no official representative of the Soviet government but a two-man delegation represented the Russian Orthodox Church.

Fire Destroys Salem Store

SALEM (UPI)—The Woody Furniture Co. in downtown Salem was destroyed by a roaring fire which started shortly before midnight Saturday.

Crews had the blaze under control in about 2 1/2 hours, but mopping up operations continued through Sunday and a standby crew was left at the scene Sunday night.

Cause of the blaze was under investigation and owner Don Woody said he would have to go through his books to estimate damage. An unofficial estimate valued the building at \$200,000 and furniture stock at \$500,000.

The concrete and wood building was completely gutted. Four floors of rugs, furniture and appliances went up in flames or were left in charred ruins. All fire units in Salem and several from suburban areas were called to the scene.

First American Woman In Space Must Be Good Astronaut

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The first American woman in space will be there not because she is a woman, but because she is a fine astronaut or engineer or scientist. She will have qualified for space flight in competition with other professionals, male or female.

At least that is the fervent hope of the space agency officials who operate far removed from the pressures of political and publicity.

The time when women will be in demand for long space voyages, because of their exclusive biological qualifications, is far in the future. Planning experts say it is a safe bet that women will soar into space long before they venture into the void as prospective mothers of generations borne en route to explore and perhaps colonize distant planets.

In the meantime, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) is recruiting only astronauts who are experienced jet test pilots with engineering or scientific degrees.

They all happen to be males because in American society only men are trained for such roles. But this will not always be the case.

Importance Will Slack
The sex of astronauts will not always be so important in the future as they are in this decade. But up through the Apollo landings on the moon, space flight calls for a lot of muscular endurance. It is a fact that men are stronger than women. But as spacecraft become roomier and physical endurance less important, women will become more competitive in space.

In psychomotor tests, in which sheer endurance is not paramount, the two sexes are on a par, as they are in intellect. A considerable amount of nonsense has been written about "women's role in space." One Air Force expert wrote that any woman astronaut would have to be exceedingly flat-chested to wear the tight Mercury space suits. He was not giving tailors the credit due them.

Women have made sweeping

statements on the subject, too. One solemnly told Congress that women would make better astronauts than men because they eat less, use less oxygen, stand pain and loneliness better, react quicker in an emergency, are less prone to heart attacks, and more resistant to radiation.

It is true that a normal woman consumes slightly less oxygen than a normal man of the same weight, but the difference is so slight that it could have no effect on a space mission.

Much is made of woman's ability to stand the suffering of childbirth. But space flight is not childbirth, and many men have been known to perform prodigies under suffering at least comparable to childbirth.

Highly Individual
In any case, specialists say, tolerance of pain is highly individual, regardless of sex. It also is true that women have a statistical edge on men when it comes to heart disease, but that is of little significance in the age group of astronauts.

None of the other claims to feminine superiority are proven, scientists say.
