Hatfield Takes Exception To Tax Referral Measure

SALEM (UPI)—Opposition to a referral of the 1963 legislature's tax increase measure, and strong support for a planned initiative movement for a new state constitution was voiced today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

He said he hoped the public would not support the tax increase referral. "I do not think it is wise because in all probability it would necessitate a special session of the legislature," he said.

Russian Space Team Returns

MOSCOW (UPI)—The world's first man and woman space team returned to earth safely today.

The official Soviet news agency Tass announced the landing. Miss Tereshkova, a 26-year-old bachelor girl, spent about three days orbiting the earth in a flight that was longer than that of all four American astronauts who have been rocketed into orbit.

The official announcement said Valentina and Bykovsky, 28, had landed successfully "in the pre-designated area" of the Soviet Union.

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Herbert Hoover Showing Gain

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former President Herbert Hoover, suffering from anemia and an intestinal ailment, spent "a comfortable night" and continues to show improvement, a spokesman said today.

Congress Given Strong Package On Civil Rights

WASHINGTON (UPI)— President Kennedy sent Congress an "imperative" package of strong civil rights legislation today and appealed for a halt in racial demonstrations while the program is under consideration.
