'Cleo' Aids Fund Drive

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The lavish days of Hollywood were recalled Wednesday night as dozens of stars turned out to see the motion picture "Cleopatra" in one of the largest fund-raising premieres in history.

More than \$1 million was collected in the benefit for the Los Angeles Music Center. Seats sold at \$250, but many contributions were made beyond the 1,811-seat capacity of the sold-out Pantages Theater.

During the intermission for the picture, actress Rosalind Russell announced that \$1,094,403.06 was raised for the music center, assuring that construction of the center theater, one of three, can begin this year. It is the only one not yet fully financed.

The \$25 million music center for the performing arts is being built on the crest of a hill that overlooks the Los Angeles Civic Center.

Berry Crop Near Average

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon strawberry fields are expected to yield 79 million pounds of berries this year, a shade above average but down 7 per cent from the 1962 harvest.

Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State University extension agricultural economist, said the figure was based on the June 1 crop conditions and estimates by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Marks noted the Oregon estimate has remained the same from May 1, but the June figure for the nation as a whole was reduced. The USDA expects a total of 492 million pounds for all season groups, 23 million pounds less than the 1962 production.

Foster Dam Work Let

PORTLAND (UPI) — Army Engineers said today a \$912,524 contract for the first main work toward construction of Foster Dam on the Santiam River was awarded to Carl M. Halvorson, Inc., Portland.

The work involves relocation of two miles of the Quartzville road and construction of two concrete bridges.

Shakespearean Scholar Dies

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — Prof. Emerita Margery Bailey, 72, noted Shakespearean scholar at Stanford University, died at the Palo Alto-Memorial hospital.

Mrs. Bailey was found unconscious late Saturday at her Palo Alto home where she lived alone. She had suffered a paralytic stroke while preparing material for this summer's Shakespearean Festival at Ashland, Ore., an annual event she helped launch nearly 30 years ago.

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Exile Leaders Claim Russian Troops In Cuba On Increase

MIAMI (UPI) — Cuban exile leaders today voiced sharp disagreement with a State Department report that Soviet troops in Cuba are "thinning out." They said there are more Russian troops on the island than ever.

"Only those with bad eyesight or those seeking to deceive the American public could make such a report," said former Prime Minister Manuel de Verona, leader of the Revolutionary Democratic Rescue Exile group.

Luis Conte Aguero, leader of the Sentinels of Liberty and other underground organizations, said "more Soviet soldiers have entered Cuba than have left since the Caribbean crisis last fall. Only a few weeks ago, early in May, some 8,000 Soviet troops departed at Santiago, Cuba, in full view of everybody."

The civilian chief of the abortive 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion, Manuel Artimo, also took issue with the State Department. Artimo, secretary general of the Revolutionary Recovery Movement, said:

"Our reports from Cuba are that very few Russians have left the island. But there has been a reshuffling of troops and arms to different places. The policy now apparently is to keep Russian troops out of sight as much as possible."

LAUNCH FOUR SUBS
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy will launch four nuclear submarines Saturday in simultaneous ceremonies.
