# How Long Can A Person Wait For Arraignment?

Under the tenets of due process of law, how long may a person who has been arrested be lawfully detained in jail before he is arraigned by a magistrate? That question was foremost in

## Pope Paul Described

whom have "made good" despite the varied paths they have taken. His father was Giorgio Montini, a crusading lawyer and journalist who for years was the leader of the Catholic party in Brescia, a member of the Italian Parliament, and manager of Brescia's Catholic newspaper, Il Cittadino (The Citizen). His mother was Giuditta Alghisi. Both have been dead for several years.

## Chose Priesthood

Giovanni Battista chose the priesthood. His early schooling was with Jesuit priests in Brescia, first at the "Cesare Ariet" College, then at the "Cristo Re" (Christ the King) Seminary. According to what his teachers said later, he was "a well balanced boy, determined, and very intelligent."

## He Studied at the Ecclesiastic Academy

He later studied at the Ecclesiastic Academy in preparation for the Vatican diplomatic service and in May 1923, when only 20 years old, he was sent to Warsaw as secretary to the papal nuncio.

## Returned to Rome

Montini returned to Rome later that year to continue his studies at the Ecclesiastic Academy and the following year began work in the Vatican secretariat of state, where he was to spend the next 30 years. In 1925 he also was nominated ecclesiastical assistant to the Federation of University Catholics and founded the movement of Catholic graduates.

## Successor Tardini

He prospered in the atmosphere of the secretariat of state and in 1937 succeeded Msgr. Domenico Tardini as substitute of the secretary of state, a post he held until November of 1952 when Pope Pius XII named him pro-secretary of state for ordinary international affairs.

## Was Close Friend of Pope Pius

There was no doubt of his close friendship with Pope Pius. When Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli was elected pontiff in 1939 Montini, according to Vatican insiders, was one of the first men he telephoned following the conclave.
