

Drama Team To Perform

"The Sacred Music and Drama Team" from the Bible Standard College of Eugene will appear at the Bible Standard Church in Clifton on Tuesday, June 25, at 7:30 p.m.

Rev. James A. Ringseth, pastor, said the group will present "The Life of John Williams," a sacred drama depicting the life of a pioneer English missionary who sacrificed his life taking the Gospel to the cannibalistic South Sea Islands.

Word of his death brought many volunteers to take his place on the field, and during World War II, shipwrecked U.S. Navy sailors fearfully went ashore to find themselves welcomed and hospitably treated by the Christian islanders.

The college team will include "The Venturers Trio," composed of three girls from Ventura, Calif., Pam Stewart, Diane Joller, and Donna Warner. John Freeman from Eugene will portray John Williams in the dramatic production, and Rev. W. E. Bryant, Eugene, dean of the college, will be in charge of the service and assist with the dramatization.

The public is invited to attend the program which will also feature vocal trio, duet, and solo selections. There will be no charge for admission.

Bible Standard College is the official ministerial and Christian educational institution for its parent organization in the western United States.

Lutheran Pastor Notes Seven-Year Ministry With First Local Sermon

June 16 was a memorable day for Rev. Malcolm Unseth, the latest addition to the Klamath Falls ministerial ranks. Last Sunday he delivered his first sermon at the Klamath Lutheran Church and also marked the seventh anniversary of his ordination.

The Unseth family arrived at its new home, the church parsonage at 1120 Eldorado Ave., on June 13, having time to do little more than re-arrange the packing boxes before being caught up in the affairs of the congregation.

Preparation in less than three days for the first Sunday at church and the welcoming reception at the Winema Hotel that afternoon was no small task for Lois Unseth. There was still a large freezer in the middle of the kitchen floor, household articles half unpacked, and five children to direct around

and through the maze left by the movers.

But after weathering the initial storm successfully, the Unseths, including Catherine, 15; Minda, 12; Malcolm III, 11; Gretchen, 5; and Jonathan, 4, are confident they will soon be comfortably settled and familiar with the new routine.

A native of Chicago, Rev. Unseth came here from the Mt. Olivet Lutheran Church in Portland, where he served for six years and 10 months.

The family's move to the parsonage was actually a result of a Lutheran Church policy. He explained that following seminary graduation, a student must receive a call from a church before being ordained. Mt. Olivet was the first church to issue him a call, and he accepted without a great deal of hesitation. Within the next few weeks, Rev. Unseth was ordained and the family journeyed to Portland for an extended residence in this part of the country.

Rev. Unseth is a graduate of the Augsburg College and Theological Seminary, Minneapolis, Minn., and received his degree in theology from the Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, in May, 1956. He was employed as a pharmaceutical salesman in northern Illinois during a break in his education at Luther College, and spent nine months in military service. His brief career in the Naval aviation program extended from 1945 to the summer of 1946.

Rev. Unseth met his future wife, who hailed from a suburb of Chicago, while they were both attending high school in Dunee, Ill. Lois later attended Beloit College in Beloit, Wis., majoring in education, but her educational plans were interrupted by marriage in 1947 and the next few years were devoted to raising a family and putting a husband through school.

In addition to the excitement of moving and making new acquaintances, the Unseths have other interesting plans for the summer. Rev. Unseth will leave July 11 for a month's tour of Europe and the Lutheran World Federation assembly in Helsinki.

Finland, while Lois and the children visit her home in Illinois. Her father will be celebrating his 80th birthday, and for the first time in many years, all five daughters will be together for a reunion.

Rev. Unseth will fly round-trip with a friend from Portland, Dr. Lee Craig, who intends to pick up a car in London which the pair will use for a whirl-wind tour of ten countries.

Their agenda includes a visit to several tourist attractions in London; the largest Lutheran Church in the world in Ulm, Germany; the Institute of Oceanography in Monaco; historic religious shrines in Rome, Italy; and Avignon, France, the seat of papacy from 1309 to 1377. Rev. Unseth also plans to tour several other cities in France and Germany, as well as Switzerland, Norway, Sweden, and Holland.

The last three days of the trip will be spent at the Lutheran World Federation Assembly, scheduled July 30-Aug. 10, before departing for the United States from Copenhagen, Denmark, on Aug. 12.

Although not an official delegate, Rev. Unseth will be able to observe the sessions and attend the mass closing service which will be conducted on a huge athletic field to accommodate the expected throng.

The Lutheran World Federation assembly is held every four years and is open to Lutheran ministers and laymen from all branches of the church in all parts of the world. Special meetings are conducted for women and youths preceding the assembly.

Rev. Unseth said the primary purpose of the convocation is to give the Lutheran Church "an opportunity to hear united witness to the world of its faith and life." Committees who have been studying the church doctrine and justification of the faith will present their reports, and various churches will report on their missionary work. The assembly will also redefine, in contemporary terms, the Lutheran theology, he added.
