Cooperation Urged To Help Make Mosquito Control Plan Effective

LAKEVIEW — A mosquito control program can be effective but everyone must cooperate, said Bill Moser, Lake County extension agent.

The mosquito control program is being carried out by the Lake County Jaycees and the Oregon State Board of Health in cooperation with the Lakeview City Council. Mosquitoes are easily and economically controlled if all stagnant streams, sloughs, ponds and puddles are chemically treated to prevent reproduction, Moser noted. These areas of stagnant water are required by the mosquitoes for reproducing themselves. It

only takes a few square feet of still water to produce thousands of mosquitoes daily, he added.

The mosquito lays eggs in stagnant water, and within a few days the eggs grow in larvae or "wigglers" from which the adult mosquito emerges in two to seven days. It is when the mosquito is in the larvae stage, living in stagnant water, that control measures are most effective.

Ponds treated with granular insecticides can be kept free of mosquito larvae all summer, preventing the mosquito from ever

reaching the adult stage, Moser said.

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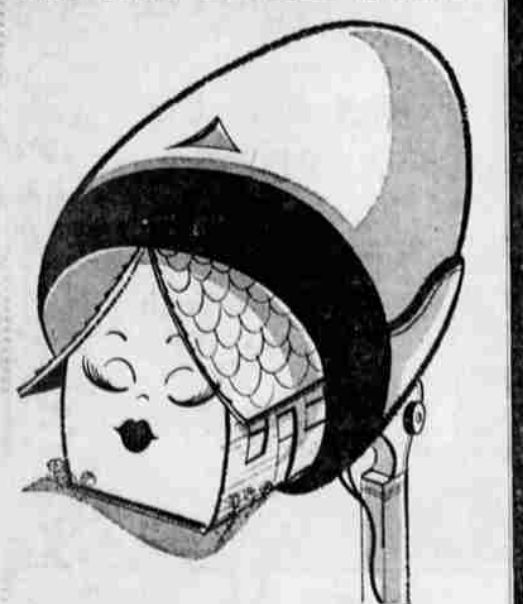
MOUNT SHASTA—New traffic control lights for the city of Mount Shasta will be turned on July 1 and will flash on and off for four days to acquaint the public with the lights before they are put into actual operation.

The lights have been installed at the Walnut and Lake, and Walnut and Alma intersections. Walnut is the main highway through town.

Installation was a joint city and state project costing \$13,000. Mount Shasta's portion was \$6,400, with one-half of the amount paid out of the gas tax refund. The balance due has also been budgeted from the gas tax refund money.

Locations were determined by sign. The intersection of Walnut and Lake is the fire equipment route to all points. Alma and Lake intersection required the services of an officer and a patrol car three times a day during the year. With the installation of lights, this expense to the city has been eliminated. Industrial Electric Co. of Redding is the contractor.

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
