

Cardinals Top Dodgers, 2-1, Retain NL Lead

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Charlie James' sixth inning home run led the St. Louis Cardinals to a 2-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers Saturday and allowed the Redbirds to hold their slim half-game National League lead.

The Dodgers dropped two and one-half games off the pace and into a third-place tie with the Cincinnati Reds.

Bob Gibson, who allowed a second inning homer to Tommy Davis for the Dodger tally, picked up his sixth win of the year although he needed help. He allowed seven hits, struck out five and walked one batter in 7 2-3 innings.

James' game-winning homer came on a 2-1 pitch off rookie Nick Willhite, who was appearing in his second major league game. It was one of four Cardinal hits, all off Willhite, whose record is 1-1.

The Cards took advantage of miscues by the Dodgers to tie the score in the fifth inning.

Julian Javier led off with an infield hit. He was safe at second when Dick Tracewski dropped a throw after Tim McCarver had bunted. Gibson sacrificed the two men to second and third and Javier scored when Willhite committed a balk.

The young lefthander struck out eight during his six-inning stay.

Gibson left in the eighth inning with Dodger runners on second and third as Bobby Shantz came on to retire Wally Moon. Shantz was relieved in the ninth by Ron Taylor after he gave up one hit.

O'Dell Pitches Giants By Braves

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Veteran left hander Billy O'Dell reached the halfway mark in his bid for his first 20-victory season Saturday with a nifty two-hit performance in pitching the San Francisco Giants to a 3-0 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

The 30-year-old O'Dell, who went right into the majors when he broke into organized baseball in 1954, picked up his 10th win of the year in going the distance for the sixth time this season. The closest O'Dell ever came to a 20-victory season before was last year when he posted a 19-14 record as the Giants won the National League pennant.

The Giants used three consecutive singles in the sixth inning to get O'Dell his first run and Ed Bailey singled home two more insurance runs in the ninth.

The only hits off O'Dell were Denis Menke's second inning single and Frank Bolling's third inning single. The farthest the Braves ever advanced a runner was to second base and that happened in the ninth when third baseman Jim Davenport made a throwing error in fielding a grounder by Frank Bolling who got two bases before the ball could be retrieved.

A pair of double plays by Jose Pagan, Chuck Hiller and Orlando Cepeda wiped out two base runners who had gotten on with walks.

The loser was starter Bob Shaw, who now has a record of 3-5. He had limited the Giants to four scattered singles before Hiller singled with one out in the sixth. Willie Mays sent Hiller to third with a followup single and Willie McCovey then scored Hiller with another single. Mays led off the ninth with another single and McCovey sent him to third on a double, the only extra base hit of the game.

Felipe Alou ran for McCovey and after Cepeda drew an intentional walk to fill the bases, Bailey sent home Mays and Alou with a single. All the runners in the ninth were charged to reliever Hank Fischer, who was yanked after Bailey's hit and Claude Raymond came on to retire the side in order.

The strong young pro from Clarksville, Tenn., knocked his drive into the rough and needed three swings to get it back on the fairway. His live iron first moved it 25 yards, still in the rough. His seven iron second sent the ball 35 yards, and still in the rough. So he took a sand wedge

and finally banged it out on the fairway, and settled for a fat seven. "The only thing you can do is tee it high, let it fly—and pray," Rudolph said.

Dennis Ralston Cops Tennis Title

PRINCETON, N. J. (UPI) — Dennis Ralston of Southern California added the NCAA championship to his list of tennis accomplishments Saturday when he turned back Marty Riessen of Northwestern 9-7, 2-6, 6-2, 6-1, in the final.

Ralston later teamed with Rafael Osuna, the dethroned singles champion, to defeat Bill Bend

and Ramsey Earnhart, 9-7, 4-6, 7-9, 6-4, 6-1, in an all-Southern California clash for the doubles title.

Riessen upset Osuna in the semifinals Friday but was no match for Ralston in the final. It was the second straight year Riessen had reached the title round. He lost to Osuna in last year's final at Stanford University.

Ralston, who won the national indoor singles title earlier this year, combined a strong service with accurate passing shots and overhead smashes in wearing down Riessen.

Only in the second set did Riessen get a chance to exhibit his deadly replacement shots and brilliant net play. But he soon tired attempting to flag down Ralston's smashes on the Princeton University court.

In the doubles final, Ralston and Osuna refused to panic when they fell behind in sets, 2-1, and eventually overpowered Bend and Earnhart to avenge their loss to the same pair in the Athletic Association of Western Universities tournament last month.

Southern California compiled 27 points in walking off with the team title. U.C.L.A. finished second with 13 points, two more than Northwestern, and Miami (Fla.) was fourth with 11.

White Sox Ax Indians

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Relief artist Jim (Aunt) Brosnan helped young southpaw Gary Peters hurl the Chicago White Sox to a four-hit 2-1 victory over the Cleveland Indians Saturday with doubles by Ron Hansen and Tom McCraw driving in the Sox' runs.

Peters, now 4-3, gave up a single to Woodie Held in the third and then retired 13 straight men before Willie Tasby led off the eighth inning with a homer that cut Chicago's 2-0 margin to one run.

When Al Luplow followed with a single, Brosnan was called in and he retired pinchhitter Gene Green and Held on fly balls to end the rally. Brosnan then blanked the Indians in the ninth.

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Howard's homer, with the bases empty in the sixth inning off starter and loser Wilbur Wood, gave New York a 3-0 lead, too much for Boston's two-run comeback rally in the sixth.

Radatz, who escaped being charged with the opening loss, came back to appear in his fourth successive game and hurled two scoreless innings in the nightcap.

Kunkel, in frequent trouble after relieving starter Bill Stafford in the fourth, shut off Red Sox rallies in the sixth and eighth, and with Bridges' help, in the ninth.

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Yanks Rap Sox Twice

BOSTON (UPI) — Elston Howard's 13th homer of the year Saturday night gave the Yankees a 3-2 victory over the Red Sox after New York had taken the opener of a day-night doubleheader, 6-5.

The front-running Yankees reached Boston relief ace Dick Radatz for what proved to be the winning run in the opener on three straight hits, the clincher a bunt-single by Roger Maris.

Yankee reliever Bill Kunkel won the night game, which was played before 31,217, the largest Fenway Park crowd of the season. The separate admission games drew a total of 33,076.

Kunkel loaded the bases on two hits and a walk with nobody out in the ninth inning, but forced Chuck Schilling to line into a double play. Marshall Bridges then took over to strike out Gary Geiger.

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Reds Notch Fifth Win

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — John Taitouris pitched the streaking Cincinnati Reds to their fifth consecutive victory and moved them into the thick of the National League pennant race by shutting out the Houston Colts Saturday on six hits, 3-0.

The Reds scored single runs in the first, third and fourth innings off Bob Bruce and Taitouris survived several jams to post his third complete game triumph in his last four starts.

The shutout was the third of the season for a Red pitcher over the Colts and the second straight.

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Bob Hayes Leads Early Qualifiers

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The United States qualified athletes Saturday for competition against Russia, including speedy Bob Hayes who broke the world's record for the 100-yard dash in the 75th annual National AAU Track and Field championships.

Hayes, who plays football almost as well as he runs, and he runs pretty fast, turned in a blistering 9.91 last night to lead qualifiers on the American team which will be completed with the second day running of 12 final events.

Seven final events were completed Friday. Hayes, a Florida A&M sprinter, and a halfback on his school's football team, has bypassed a possible career on the gridiron in order to concentrate on the 1964 Olympics.

The competition saw Brian Sternberg, world record holder in the pole vault, shatter a meet record by clearing the bar at 16 feet 4 inches, four inches shorter than his world mark.

Hayes Jones, the Detroit school teacher, regained his 120-yard high hurdles title by equalling the meet record of 6:13.4. This was his fourth national AAU crown, having won in 1958, 1960 and 1961.

Pete McArdle, second last year, won the six-mile run in 28:29.2. The 33-year-old bus mechanic from New York City is the Pan-American games 10,000-meter champion.

Dave Davis of the U.S. Marines dethroned defender Gary Gubner of the Grand Street Boys Club, New York, in the shot put with a toss of 62 feet 5 1/2 inches. Gubner, who gets married Sunday in New York, had to settle for third at 60 feet 5 1/2 inches while Parry O'Brien, once the kingpin of the event, was runnerup with 62 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Larry Stuart of the Southern California Striders won the javelin with a throw of 255 feet 3 inches and teammate Ralph Boston made it three-in-a-row in the broadjump with a leap of 28 feet 10 inches.

The Striders piled up 44 points.

Phillies Tip Mets, 2-0

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ray Culp, the National League's outstanding candidate for rookie of the year honors, pitched a five-hitter and struck out 11 Saturday to gain a 2-0 victory for the Philadelphia Phillies over hard-luck Roger Craig and the New York Mets.

It was Culp's second win of the season over the Mets. He is the only Phillies pitcher who has beaten them at the Polo Grounds and the victory raised his overall season record to 9-3.

For Craig it was the ninth straight loss and 11th of the season.
