Merrill Rally Brings Sixth Straight Victory

Undefeated Merrill got a real scare Friday night before it pulled out a narrow 2-1 victory over Dugan and Mest in Klamath Basin Babe Ruth action and the Elks opened Malin, 11-7, in the other contest.

Merrill, thrust built its league lead to 6-0 for the season. Tulelake is second with a 4-0 record. The Merrill nine had to tally two runs in the third to get the 2-1 advantage.

The Elks had to rally with five runs in the fourth frame to beat Malin. Malin had a 7-6 lead going into the bottom of the fourth when the Elks exploded.

Ted DeVore got the pitching victory in relief of Glenn Miller. Bruce Bauer was the loser. The winners rapped out seven hits while the losers got only four off the combined talents of Miller and DeVore.

The game was tied up 6-6 going into the fourth when Malin pushed across the go-ahead run. But the Elks, using four hits, rallied for the five winning runs.

Dugan & Mest 100-0-1-3

Stable Defeats Scott

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocky Jose Stable, Cuban New Yorker, used a buzz saw hooking attack to win a unanimous decision over rangier Charley Scott of Philadelphia Saturday night and earn a probable non-title fight with welterweight champion Emile Griffith.

Stable had the better of the hard-fighting because of his closequarter hammering in their nationally televised 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden.

There were no knockdowns but each was shaken several times and Stable's right brow was slightly cut as was the inside of Scott's upper lip. Scott's right eye was badly bruised in the terrific 10th round.

Each weighed 147 pounds, exactly the welter division's limit. The three ring officials favored Stable, 22, on a rounds basis as follows: Referee Pete Della, 8-1-1; Judge Bill Reht, 5-4-1 and Judge Artie Aidala, 6-4. The United Press International agreed, 6-4.

Matchmaker Teddy Breen said champion Griffith probably would meet Stable in a non-title television fight in September, and if Stable won or made the fight close, he might get a title bout later.

McKinley, Ralston In Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Rod Laver and Miss Hard lost — Chuck McKinley is the only seeded player in the 20-man American delegation that starts Monday for the Wimbledon men's tennis championship, but many of the Yanks are touting Dennis Ralston for the title.

Commented Bill Kellogg of La Jolla, Calif., manager of the United States women's team, which won the inaugural Federation Cup tournament this week: "I think Dennis is the man for us. He's improved considerably, curbed some of his temperamental and is itching to go at Wimbledon. He'll be tough to beat."

Both McKinley and Darlene Hard of Los Angeles, the only Americans seeded for the two-week Wimbledon championships will be seeking the singles titles which have narrowly eluded them.

McKinley was beaten in the 1961 men's final by Australia's in the women's.

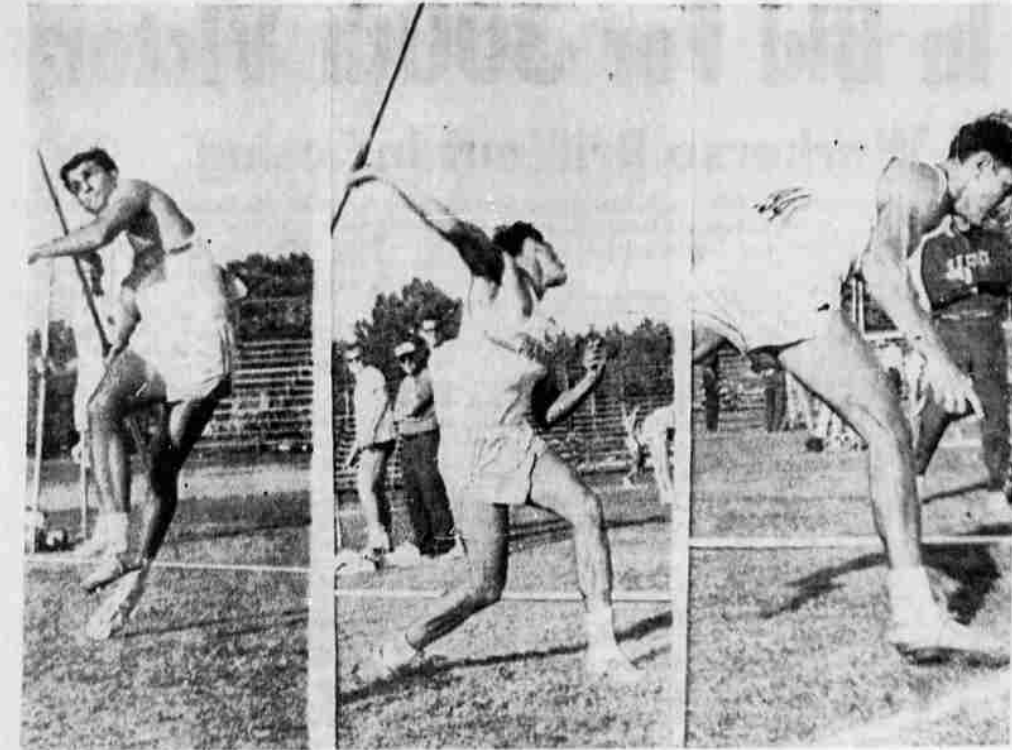

But because there was no apparent progress Edmund Meier, an aide to Gov. Millard E. Tawes who has been serving as mediator, withdrew.

Meier left Cambridge for the state capital of Annapolis and said he had "no further role to play."
