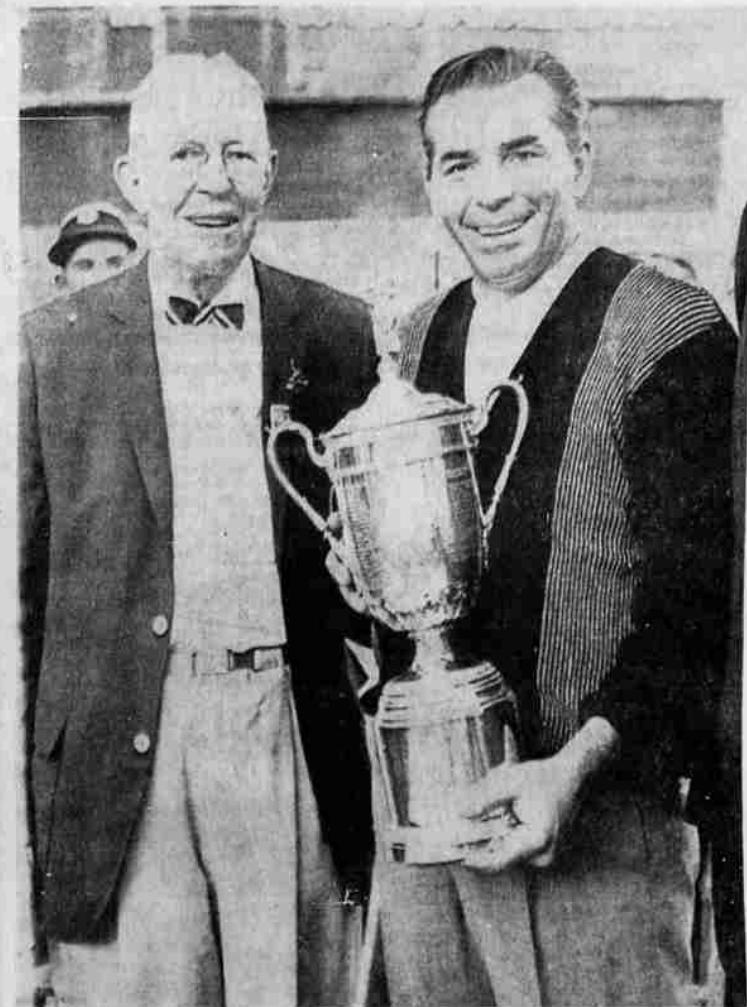

Boros Makes Playoff A Shambles In Victory Over Cupit, Palmer

BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI) — Julius Boros, getting his second golfing wind at 43, thanks Arnold Palmer and Jacky Cupit today for his second U.S. Open victory.

"First I want to thank them for the way they played the 17th hole in the final round on Saturday," Boros said. "And then I

want to thank them for taking a lot of strokes out there Sunday. They encouraged me a lot."

The oldest player ever to win America's premier golf tournament, Boros made a shambles of the playoff with Cupit and Palmer by shooting a one-under-par 33-37-70. That put him three

strokes ahead of the 25-year-old Cupit, who had a 37-36-73, and six in front of Palmer, who, suffering from dysentery, carded a 36-40-76.

It wasn't the 17th hole that counted Sunday, though. For Palmer it was the 11th, where he blew any chance he had by coming up with a triple bogey. In Saturday's two final rounds he had triple-bogeyed and bogeyed that par-four 445-yard hole.

For Cupit it was the third hole, where he double-bogeyed.

Really Hurts

"That really hurt," said Cupit. "But I thought even on the 17th green that I still could tie Julius—until he knocked in his putt for a birdie. I knew I was gone then."

The victory climaxed six weeks of golfing gold for Boros, who at 43 years and 112 days was three days older than Britisher Ted Ray when he won the Open in 1920.

Starting with the \$12,000 he won by capturing the Colonial Invitational at Fort Worth on May 12, Boros has picked up \$44,155 in that six-week span.

That doesn't count the \$1,500 bonus which he and Cupit and Palmer received for Sunday's playoff before 12,500 on the hot, exacting country club course of Brookline.

"But I'll take it," Boros said, "for it's spendable."

Credits Wedge Shots

He credited his wedge shots out of the rough for his victory.

"I always practice getting out of the rough for the Open, and Open courses usually have heavy rough," Boros said. "I was in the rough around the green four times Sunday and each time got down in two. The rough is where you can waste shots. I don't waste many that way, and that's why I have been pretty lucky in the Open."

He won it the first time in 1932—"My biggest golfing thrill, for it was my first tournament victory," Boros pointed out.

Asked to explain how he suddenly regained his touch, the time-faced beller from Mid Times, N.C., replied:

"I just go out there and hit the ball. When I hit it well, I win. When I don't hit it well, I lose. It's as simple as that."

Sorry For Palmer

He said he felt sorry for Palmer in the playoff "because I know he had a bad night and felt horrible out there."

Palmer paid his own tribute to Boros.

"When you play the kind of golf he did, you should win," Palmer said. "It would have taken a miraculous round to have beaten him, and Jacky and I were just not up to it."

Medford Hands KF Hawks Double Loss 12-0, 4-3

The Klamath Hawks, plagued by a nine-run second inning, fell before the Medford American Legion team Sunday at Gem Stadium, 12-0, in the Southern Division League game and lost the non-counting second tilt, 4-3.

The loss was the fourth against two wins for the Hawks in league play. It gave the Medford team a 4-1 record and second place. Klamath's Falcons and Grants Pass, were both 4-1 going into Sunday's game. The winner of that game took sole possession of the lead and the loser dropped to third.

The first game was just one of those nightmares which a team has once in a while. Losing pitcher Tom Pilgrim couldn't find the plate in the one and two thirds innings he worked and when he did, the Medford batters belted the ball. Mary Cunningham came on in relief of Pilgrim and did a very creditable, although hopeless, job.

Medford's hurler, Bill Enyart, had the Hawks handuffed throughout the contest. He gave up only one hit and that one probably could have been called either way. It came in the fifth in-

ning on a hard shot off the bat of first baseman Bob Woldt. Shortstop Dan Miles went to his right and made a brilliant catch in the hole. His throw was wild to first and in the dirt. But it appeared that Woldt had the throw beat, anyway.

Medford tallied twice off Pilgrim in the first. With one out Miles singled and stole second. Mike Neathamer walked and Jim Calhoun rifled a shot to left field which Alan Kenyon let drop from his glove, allowing Miles to score and Neathamer to move to third. He scored on Tom Barker's fielder's choice.

The second inning was the nightmare. Pilgrim struck out leadoff batter Daryl Stockton, but then walked Ron Edmonds. Enyart reached first when Mike Spiker threw his batted ball wild to second in an attempt to cut Edmonds down. Don Anderson walked to fill the sacks. Miles hit a long, high fly ball to left field. Kenyon ran around and finally misjudged the ball, letting it drop free and two runs scored. Miles was held at first and cut down at second on the back half of an attempted double steal. Anderson reached third but Miles was caught on the throw from third to second.

Pilgrim then walked three men in a row to force Anderson home and fill the sacks again. He was lifted at this point in favor of Mary Cunningham who was at shortstop. He was shaky to begin with. Ken Phipps singled off him right off the bat to drive two runs home. The throw in from left field was wide and allowed the runners to advance. Cunningham hit Stockton with a pitch and Edmonds singled to drive in two more runs. Enyart walked and Anderson hit a bad hop single over second for another run, the ninth.

The Medford nine made it 12-0 in the third with a single run when, with one away, Calhoun got a bad hop single and took second on an error. A fielder's choice moved him to third and a single by Phipps scored him. But Cunningham was untouchable after that. He set them down in order in three of the final four frames and gave up only one more hit.

Medford made some fine plays to back up Enyart's pitching. The second game, a non-counting, found the Hawks with a lead, but they couldn't hold it. Medford tallied one run in the first off starter Rick Hennick. With one out Miles walked and stole second. He moved around on Calhoun's hit and scored on an error by Spiker at second.

The Hawks roared back with two of their own. Roy Van Pelt walked and was cut down at second on Kenyon's fielders choice. Kenyon stole second and Cunningham ground out. Curt Coleman's single moved Kenyon around to score and Spiker's hit scored Coleman shortly after. Medford regained the lead to

stay in the third. Miles was picked off after walking and Neathamer walked and stole second. A ground out for the second out moved him to third and Barker was hit with a pitch. Rich Wooten walked to jam the sacks and Jim Brennan's grounder was muffed for an error to let a run score. Jim Cox's single tallied both Barker and Wooten. That was all Medford needed.

The Hawks rallied with a run in the fourth but it wasn't enough. Spiker led off with a single and took second on a wild pitch. Homer Garriash walked and Roger Bartlett's single scored Spiker.

The Hawks outbatted the Medford team in the second game with five hits to only two for Medford. Hennick was relieved by Crume in the third and was the loser in relief. Spiker got two of the five hits.

The Hawks will be at home Wednesday night for a game with the Tri-City Gems at Gem Stadium at 8 p.m.
