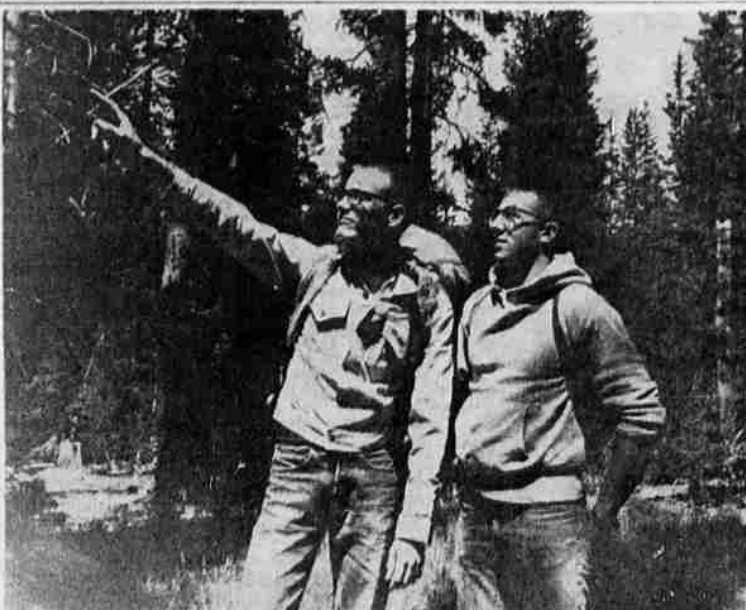

European Trip Key To JFK's New Peace Strategy

BONN (UPI) — President Kennedy's reasons for proceeding with his European trip, despite considerable advice to the contrary, are becoming increasingly clear.

The 12-day trip—with the exception of a sentimental sojourn in Ireland—is obviously a key element in his new "strategy for peace" which the President

hopes may lead to some easing of East-West tension.

Kennedy apparently felt he would not be in a good position to take advantage of any opportunities stemming from the Soviet-Chinese Communist split until he first calmed the nervous Allies who fear some American deal at their expense.

Suspensions of Washington's intentions have been sparked by French President Charles de Gaulle's repeated assertions that Europe cannot always depend on the United States. But the suspicion that the United States, 18 years after the end of World War II, might be growing weary of its role of major protector was already here.

One of the reasons Kennedy hurriedly summoned Foy D. Kohler, U.S. ambassador to Russia, to Bonn was to get a last-minute assessment of the possible course of Soviet policy in the wake of last week's Soviet Communist party meeting and next week's Russian meeting with high Chinese Reds in Moscow.

Foreign Minister Gerhard Schröder is being given particular attention in the talks because of the belief of some American officials that he may move into the chancellorship after a few months if Erhard proves as politically inept as Adenauer has always claimed him to be.

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Alturas Pool Receipts Up

ALTURAS — The Alturas Recreation Commission reported June 20 that the city swimming pool's financial condition is good and holding its own for the first time in many years.

Jack Greene, pool manager, stated the daily attendance is averaging 164 swimmers a day and as long as this holds up, pool expenses can be met comfortably.

Greene also reported that due to the increased interest in swimming this year, the pool will be kept open on Tuesday and Thursday evenings until 8 o'clock, weather permitting. "If there is enough attendance and enough interest, we will keep it open other evenings as well," Greene said.

The city pool is open every day except Sunday.

This year's staff is made up of Greene and three senior lifeguards. The lifeguards are Loretta Broadhurst, Michele Baldwin and Hazel Henson. Linda Landis of North Hollywood will be at the pool for the third year as swimming instructor and lifeguard.

Miss Landis will instruct the summer school students in the Alturas Elementary School summer program. The commission reported that the elementary school will pay \$300 for the use of the pool in the mornings during its summer program. The instructor will be furnished from the pool staff.

Greene requested that anyone interested in taking swimming lessons contact the pool office. Dixie Broadhurst will again conduct advanced lifesaving classes for those eligible and adult swimming classes. Green said lessons will be offered only if enough interested swimmers sign up. There is no charge for the lessons other than the standard pool admittance charge.

The commission reported that to date the summer recreation program at the city park is still indefinite. Funds and staff have not been available for developing the park program, a commissioner reported.

Dixie Broadhurst was officially appointed by the city council as a member of the City Recreation Commission.
