

# Frail Appearance Of Pope Paul VI Belied By Courage, Cool Intellect

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Following is the first of a three-part series on Pope Paul VI, the man and his origin, his policies and what his pontificate may hold for both the Catholic and non-Catholic world.

His strength of mind and character can be seen in his eyes. It is in his dark blue eyes, deeply set and piercing, that you see the courage and cool intellect of Pope Paul VI, who otherwise gives the appearance of frailness.

Giovanni Battista Montini is a man of many complexities. He has been described as a "liberal" in church circles, but there are overtones of traditionalism and a trace of the authoritarian air of the late Pope Pius XII.

At times he is blunt, but in his writing and speeches he can be as complex and circumspect as Pius, who often took 10 pages to express painfully what others might say in a few paragraphs.

Pope Paul's life has been dedicated to keeping Catholicism in step with a swiftly changing world.

## Supports John's Moves

He firmly supported his predecessor's moves towards bringing the church in line with the space age.

And now assuming the throne of St. Peter as the 262nd pope, he has vowed to continue the forward-looking policies of John XXIII: the aims of the Ecumenical Council and its aspirations of Christian unity, and giving the church a focal role in securing a just world peace.

Pope Paul VI is no orator who appeals to the emotions of his listeners, but a speaker whose words are to be closely studied.

Even with the working men of the bustling Milan archdiocese this method of communication was fruitful. Montini, as archbishop of Milan for about nine years, devoted a good portion of his time to battling the inroads of communism. To do this he went to factories, shops, wherever workers—Communist or Catholic—were to be found.

Shape Liberal Outlook  
The new pontiff's background, the progressive Catholic atmosphere he grew up in, and his days in the Vatican secretariat of state, shaped his "liberal" outlook to matters of the world and the church.

Montini's father, Giorgio, was a crusading lawyer and journalist who for years was the leader of the Catholic party in the northern city of Brescia, a deputy in the Italian Parliament, and manager of Brescia's Catholic newspaper, "Il Cittadino" (The Citizen). Giorgio Montini and his wife, Giuditta Alghisi, died in 1951.

Giovanni Battista is the second of three brothers—all successful in the walks of life they chose, and all still living. One is a surgeon, the other a senator in the Italian Parliament.

The new Pope was born Sept. 26, 1897, at Concesio, a little village of about 7,000 persons, five miles north of Brescia and some 80 miles from the metropolis of Milan.

His early schooling was with Jesuit priests in Brescia, first at the "Cesare Ariet" college then at the "Cristo Re" (Christ the King) seminary.

Teachers later described him as "a well balanced boy, determined and very intelligent."

A prodigious reader, he amazed friends when he was appointed archbishop of Milan in 1954 after serving 20 years in the Vatican secretariat of state by taking 900 packing cases full of personal books with him to the northern Italian city.

## Hoffa Views Tax Scene Before Asking Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teamsters' president James R. Hoffa said today he would weigh tax angles carefully before presenting wage demands to trucking firms this fall because union drivers are moving into higher tax brackets.

Hoffa said in an interview that he might await congressional action on President Kennedy's tax cut proposals before deciding how much of a pay increase to seek at the opening of negotiations in October.

If taxes are lowered, he indicated he might seek more pay and fewer fringe benefits in forthcoming bargaining.

Fringe benefits — pensions, medical care and similar contract provisions—often represent a better deal for a worker who pays a high percentage of income in taxes, Hoffa said.

"Our guys are going home with \$200 a week in their pockets," Hoffa said. "It may be better to put most of my increase we negotiate into fringes instead of wages."

## Seeks Package Boost

Hoffa said he expected to seek a wage-benefit package costing about 60 cents an hour over a three-year contract period. This, he said, might be used in part to lower the present retirement age for central states' drivers from 57 to 55 and increase the present \$200-a-month pension.

Hoffa, who masterminded bargaining which led to a common expiration period for major contracts in the trucking industry, declared he had no plans to stage a national trucking strike.

The Teamsters' president and his close advisers are worried, however, about increasing railroad shipment of autos and other freight which had been carried by truck until recently.

The union has protested to the Interstate Commerce Commission about selective rate-cutting it says is aimed at ending competition from trucks and water carriers.

**Minimum Wage Set**  
The head of the nation's largest union said a nationwide minimum for truck drivers of \$3.03 an hour has now been established. Many road drivers could earn \$200 by working longer than 40 hours. Overtime is common in the trucking industry.

Hoffa showed no concern over his recent indictment on fraud and conspiracy charges in connection with loans made by the Teamsters' Central States Pension Fund.

He did not discuss this case or another federal indictment on jury tampering charges during
