ble and single, Jack Slezak a pair of singles, and Crawford a pair of singles. Todd drove in five runs with his doubles.

The Balsiger-Dugan and Mest game was a comedy of errors. The winning Balsiger's group committed six miscues but won with the aid of 11 by the losing Dugan and Mest team.

Jim Korsen took over the pitching chores for Balsiger's and got credit for the pitching win. He relieved Rudy Tena who worked the first four frames and gave up 10 of the 11 runs. The winners notched eight hits off Jim Bridges and Dennis Goosing. Goosing absorbed the loss.

The losers got only two hits off Tena but he walked eight in the four-inning stint. The winners were struck out 10 times by Bridges and Goosing.

Alan Mezger, Mike McNery and Tena led the winners with two singles each. McNery's hits drove across four runs. Alan Mitchell, Steve Ward and Dan Henry were the three hitters for the losers with Ward's being a double.

Handful Of Veterans, Army Of Youths In Golf Tourney

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—A handful of old-timers and an army of youngsters battled it out today for medalist honors in the 52nd annual California State Amateur golf championships.

Only five players were able to break par in Monday's first round of the 36-hole qualifying test. Four are barely old enough to vote and the other is 35-year-old Eli Bari-

lean Jr., of Santa Cruz, a two-time winner of the state title.

Grouped at one-under-par 71 as the second round began were Bariteau; George Archer of San Francisco, holder of the Northern California open, Trans-Mississippi and San Francisco City titles; Chuck Courtney, a former San Diego State College star; David K. Stockton of San Bernardino,

one of USC's top players, and John Sirman, Fresno State College player.

Some of the oldest and best-known names in the state's amateur golf circles found the going mighty rough in the opening round of qualifying. And so did some of the youngsters, including John Lotz, Northern California match and medal play champion.

Lotz, after a wearying plane trip from Des Moines, Iowa, where he finished runner-up in the NCAA championship, ballooned to a 81 Monday and needed a good round today to qualify for the championship flight.

John's younger brother, Dick, defending champion in this event, was exempt from qualifying, but played anyway and shot a line 72 at Cypress Point.

But among those who found the going rough were Verne Callison of Sacramento, the champion in 1959, who fired 81 at Pebble Beach Monday; Bruce McCormick of Temple City, the kingpin in 1945-46, who ballooned to 89; Ernie Pieper Jr. of San Jose, a titleholder in 1941-44, who went for 78 at Pebble, and 1961 champion John Richardson of Long Beach, who scored a 77.

One surprise was the fine showing of Mat Palacio of San Rafael, who at about the half-century mark is the oldest ex-champion in the field. Palacio fired a fine one-over-par 73 in his opening test at Cypress Point.
