

Crater Cats Take Lead In KF Babe Ruth League

The Crater Cats took over sole possession of first place in the Klamath Basin Babe Ruth League at Gem Stadium Tuesday night by handing previously unbeaten Merrill an 8-3 loss. Superior Troy upset Gun Store for its second win, 5-2.

The victory left the Cats with an unblemished 5-0 record in the league and moved the Merrill crew into second place all alone with a 6-1 record. Tulelake is third at 5-1.

The win came on another masterful pitching performance of Bob Moore. He now has given up only two hits in three complete games, one of which was a no-hit game, and the Cat pitching staff has allowed only six hits in five games.

Cutting Rights Top Meet
BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — Commissioner Joe Foss and the American Football League club owners today got into a two-day huddle to call the policy-making pawns for the professional circuit's fourth campaign.

Major topics on the executive committee's calendar include cutting rights, security arrangements, scouting regulations, cut-down dates, pre-season schedules, training camp periods and television exposure.

The league's general managers and coaches will get together Friday — and possibly Saturday — for what promises to be a lively round of trade talks.

The question of cutting rights was expected to cause considerable debate, based on the outcome of the first phase of the league's equalization draft May 11. A bid to beef up the New York Jets and Oakland Raiders, the door-mat teams in 1962, fell short of expectations.

The Jets (formerly Titans) only selected Indiana tackle Jeff Slabough, a Buffalo pick, and West Virginia end Gene Heeler from San Diego in the special draft that provided 24 eligible players. Oakland's lone choice was defensive halfback Claude Gibson of San Diego.

A provision worked out by the owners in May appears to be a controversial one. It would give the Jets and Raiders first crack at all players released by American, National and Canadian league teams.

Many owners have indicated they might vote to change the present set-up on cutting rights.

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
