The disquieting moment in a hostess's life when she realizes her generous impulse to invite has overreached her facilities to serve is a rather common upset at this time of year.

Just the other day, I gaily invited 10 ladies to lunch to meet a newcomer, then realized I had only eight dining room chairs and six place settings of "good" china.

To dig out of this impasse, we turn hopefully to buffet service, fingers crossed that everyone will find a place to perch and that the food won't skid off the plates. Borrowing china to "piece out" is a high-risk venture that may break cup and saucer.

As a compromise, a resourceful friend of mine suggests a tray-buffet which is long on color and charm but short on cost.

Pastel-tinted trays, bought from the dime store, are decked out with pretty plastic mats, striped ones perhaps, in similar pastel shades of pink, green and aqua. Set with flatware, the individual tray makes a solid base for a tankard of milk or tea plus the plates of food.

One unsuspected advantage is that most youngsters, accustomed to cafeteria tray service at school, can handle this fancier version without spilling.
