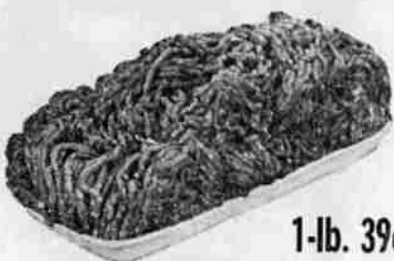

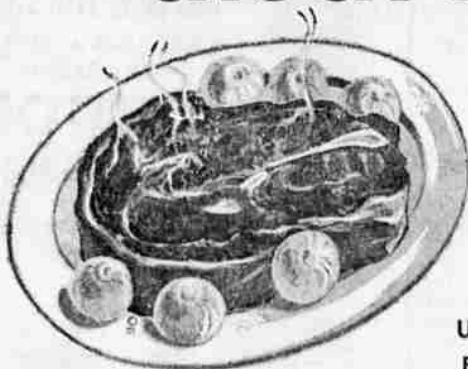

Wood Duck, Merganser Among Most Colorful

Editor's Note: This is the first of periodic articles with which it is hoped citizens of the Klamath area might become better acquainted with the extent of conservation-management programs of the Oregon State Game Commission. It is the conclusion of a great many waterfowl enthusiasts that the two most spectacularly colored birds to be found locally are the males of the wood duck and hooded merganser in full plumage. Unfortunately, few people have enjoyed observing them because of their strange habits and general rarity. Recognizing this lack of abundance, regulations for many years have limited the daily take to one bird of each.

Both wood ducks and hooded mergansers are two of a few species which typically nest in tree cavities several feet from the ground. Management personnel concluded many years ago that limitations of natural nesting cavities were the primary factor limiting the wild populations.

As a means of enhancing suitable nesting sites to increase populations, a nesting box program was undertaken a good many years ago with the added cooperation of youth groups and individuals. The program is having encouraging results if the increasing use of nesting boxes can be used as an indicator.

Here in Klamath County, the program has developed gradually to determine areas inhabited by, and attractive to the birds. Results to date show the west side of Upper Klamath Lake, Aspen Lake and much of the Sprague River as ideal for installation of the nest boxes. The annual check of boxes to determine the extent of use and for banding studies has just been completed and of 67 boxes in usable condition, 48 were being used by wood ducks, nine of which also had some hooded merganser eggs inside.

Four other boxes had hooded merganser eggs being incubated. The total waterfowl use of the boxes was 79 per cent, and this figure has been increasing nearly every year since the inception of the program. A total of 479 wood duck eggs and 87 hooded merganser eggs were tallied in the nest boxes this spring. It is not unusual for other unused boxes to be taken over by bees, chipmunks, flying squirrels, sparrow hawks, flickers, tree swallows or black birds.

In 1961, banding studies were started by capturing of the hen on the nest. Careful timing (close to hatch) and handling have resulted in no nest abandonment caused by this activity. Returns from banded birds will reveal fall migration routes and wintering grounds of the locally raised birds. Of added interest is the return of previously banded birds to the same nesting area in subsequent years.

Banding continued in 1962 and again this spring and five birds altogether have been recaptured.

in nesting boxes close by where they were banded. One bird has been captured three times now at Odessa Creek where it was first banded in 1961.

It was the original intent of the program to think in terms of the wood duck population, but gradually more and more hooded mergansers are beginning to use the nests which is an encouraging sign. This year for the first time, three hooded mergansers were captured incubating eggs in the nest and were banded.

The common question is "how do the young get out of the nest," or "aren't they hurt when they fall," as some of the boxes are over 20 feet above the ground. Within a very short time after hatching, the hen will leave the nest and call the young with a peculiar whistle.

The young birds literally hurl themselves out of the opening in the box and float like a powder puff to the ground with no ill effects. The young are equipped with a sharp tooth on the end of the bill and toenails which enable them to claw up the inside of the box if they can't hurl themselves to the opening. In spite of the fact the nest may be some distance from water, the young gather with the hen and are seldom seen again as a brood because of their secretive habits.

A good many well-intentioned individuals have put up boxes for nesting without adequate knowledge of the needs of the birds. Entrance holes are often oversize, boxes are too small or no nesting material is provided. The most discouraging sight, however, are boxes leaning backwards or with smooth lumber which prove all too often to be a trap for young birds.

He will exhibit at the Banff Indian Days in Canada; the National Indian Days at Sheridan, Wyo.; and the Gallup Indian Festival at Gallup, N.M. He will also visit several Indian reservations in connection with expanding his collection.

For the parades at the events, he has had two special horse blankets made of suede, one in blue and white and the other in red and white, to show off his beaded saddle equipment. On the blankets is leather lettering indicating the Indian Village, Lakeview, Ore.
