'Moonshine' Days Back In Lakeview

LAKEVIEW — There appeared shades of old moonshining days in the office of the Lake County sheriff this week when jugs, bottles, and jars of assorted sizes and shapes, many of them filled from varied stages of whiskey-making, were collected as evidence in two raids here.

Representatives from the sheriff's office, city police, Oregon State Liquor Commission, and federal authorities made the first raid at a trailerhouse in the south end of town.

They arrested Bud Jones, 36, and his wife, Archie Louise, 22. Garnered in this raid were several empty containers with evidence of liquor in them and one full fifth. It was evident the officers said, that an attempt had been made to pour the liquor down the toilet.

They then traveled to the Wayne Newman residence on the Westside and found one five-gallon bottle and several bottles with liquor in them. This was about 11:30 p.m., and Newman was taken into custody.

Jones and his wife appeared before Justice of the Peace Richard Moffett Tuesday morning and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of illegal possession of alcoholic liquor. She was fined \$75 and court costs and sentenced to three months in the county jail.

On payment of the fine the sentence was suspended with a one-year good behavior clause. Jones was fined \$300 and costs and sentenced to four months in jail. He was unable to pay the fine and was placed in jail. If the fine is paid, there will be a suspension of two months of the jail sentence on a condition of good behavior for one year following the release of the defendant.

Action on Newman was postponed on request of his lawyer.

Fort Rock Cave Once Family Dwelling Place

FORT ROCK—Dust was settled by the night's rain and the sun broke intermittently through cloudy skies as more than 200 gathered at the mouth of Fort Rock Cave June 22 to witness its designation as a national historic landmark.

Gathered near the mouth of the cave, where the ceremonies were held, spectators soon identified themselves with the ancient families who once used it as their dwelling place.

Dr. Luther S. Cressman, retiring head of the University of Oregon Department of Anthropology, was the guest speaker. He headed the excavation party many years ago which discovered woven sagebrush sandals and mating which dated early man's dwelling here more than 9,000 years ago.

"From whatever resting place the ancient dwellers might observe, they must look down on this gathering and ask: 'What's going on here?' This was just our home — and a very good one," began Dr. Cressman. "Whatever these individuals may have held about ancient man as primitive and unlearned gave way to admiration for their courage, understanding of feelings of despair and silence as conditions changed and food became less plentiful, as babies cried for the milk their mothers' diet could not provide," he continued.

"Through it all they cherished loveliness and beauty," said Dr. Cressman in describing the remnants of their habitation.

The speaker had been introduced by Phil Brogan, Bend, associate editor of "The Bulletin." Brogan recalled visiting the site at the time of excavation in 1938.

With 22 themes and periods commemorated in this manner, Fort Rock Cave is designated to the "prehistoric hunters and gatherers" classification.

Following the dedication, Merritt "Bud" Parks led a caravan of cars to the town of Fort Rock where lunch was served by the local grange women. Plans to serve lunch at the new Fort Rock State Park were abandoned when rainy weather made conditions uncertain.

At the grange hall, visitors viewed sandals taken from the cave which are now preserved in the Oregon State University museum. Also on display were Indian bowls and spear and arrow points from the collections of north Lake County present-day dwellers.

There was an opportunity to meet Dr. and Mrs. Cressman informally. She spoke of her husband's work, recalling the spirit of adventure always pervading the work of the science to which he has devoted his life.

Mr. and Mrs. Russell Jackson of Corvallis were among special guests for the occasion. Klamath Falls visitors included Rep. George C. Filcraft and son, George D. Filcraft.

Britain Names New Minister

LONDON (UPI) — Joseph Godber, minister of state for foreign affairs and a member of Parliament since 1951, today replaced disgraced John Profumo as war minister.

Godber, 49, has been in the Foreign Office since 1960 when he was appointed joint undersecretary of state. He was named minister of state the following year.

Profumo resigned June 4 after admitting he lied to the House of Commons in denying his intimate relationship with 21-year-old playgirl Christine Keeler for Britain's scandal of the century.

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Chamber Hears New Business Plan

Editors of travel magazines and leaders of industry interested in relocating their businesses in the Pacific Northwest should be invited to take an expense-free guided tour of the state.

That suggestion was one of several proposals brought before the State Department of Planning and Development at its meeting with managers of county chambers of commerce, held earlier this month in Portland.

A report of both that meeting and a conference of the American Travel Institute held earlier the same day was made by George Callison, manager of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, to the chamber at its regular meeting Wednesday in the Pelican Cafe.

In remarking on the session with the State Department of Planning and Development, Callison stated that the idea of the statewide tour was presented as one means of advertising the benefits Oregon offers to industry, as well as to tourists, to businessmen who are considering relocating their firms, or establishing branch offices, in the Pacific Coast states.

Another proposal was that managers of county chambers of commerce be established as an advisory board to the SDPD.

While the department considered those suggestions, it was also conducting other programs designed to publicize Oregon's advantages to industry outside of the state.

Among those projects is the distribution of the publication, "Watch Oregon Grow," to some 6,000 readers in other states, Callison stated. During a three-year period that circulation has increased from 3,000, he said further.

Also being circulated outside of the state is a motion picture, "Oregon Today," a film with a self-explanatory title.

A third project involves "The Homesick Oregonians Club," composed of approximately 1,000 former residents of the state who are living elsewhere for various reasons. Club members receive publications about Oregon from this state and pass on the information they receive to people interested in the state, he explained.

On the American Travel Institute Conference, Callison commented largely on the San Diego Visitors and Convention Bureau's program to attract tourists to that area.

Callison quoted Robert Smith, official of the bureau who attended the conference, as remarking, "The effort to bring in tourists reflects the amount of energy expended on the project."

If energy is the criteria for a successful tourist attraction program then San Diego has a super abundance of it, Callison pointed out.

In San Diego County last year tourists spent \$225 million compared with \$217 million for the entire state of Oregon. But Callison stated that Smith conceded money was equally as important as energy.

Funds are necessary, first, to issue invitations to tourists through various media and, finally, to take care of them while they are in one's county. Remember, a tourist can be an unpaid salesman for the area after he goes home, Callison remarked.

He then talked briefly on figures reflecting tourism in the United States and of that amount \$2.1 billion is spent on foreign travel.

To reap some of that \$2-billion pie, Great Britain disburses annually about \$1 million for advertising directed to the world traveling tourist, Canada expends another \$5 million, and Bermuda adds nearly \$1 million more.

For every dollar Oregon spends to attract tourists it receives 10 in return, a good exchange but still meager when compared with the 92 to one proportion realized by Florida, Callison said.

In other business, Chairman Ross Haglund of the chamber's National Affairs Committee invited the membership to attend a meeting of the committee, July 9, when it will discuss civil rights legislation now before Congress. Haglund said the committee would study the legislation and then recommend that the chamber either endorse or oppose it.

Jim Monteith, president of the chamber, stated that the board of directors would meet next Tuesday and urged members who are delinquent in their dues to make payment before that time.
