In Salem yesterday morning, J. Francis Howard of Albany appeared in the Secretary of State's office to file a preliminary petition to refer the 1963 legislature's tax measure to a vote of the people. Mr. Howard is president of an organization known as the Citizens Committee for Economy and Equitable Taxation.

Attorney General Thornton says this morning he will assign a title for the referendum measure within the time limit.

Meanwhile, there are indications that another group plans to file a SECOND petition to refer the tax increase bill. None but Howard's petition, however, had been filed with the secretary of state by mid-morning today.

It looks like a referendum measure of some sort will be put before the public.

It's up to the voters, therefore, to be doing some thinking as to how they will vote on it in the event that 23,106 valid signatures are obtained on one or another of the petitions.

It seems rather probable that that will happen.

He continued:

"This conscience does make cowards of us all;

"And thus the native hue of resolution

"Is sicklied o'er with the pale cast of thought,

"And enterprises of great pith and moment

"With this regard their currents turn awry

"And lose the name of action."

We can ask ourselves, along with Hamlet, whether it is better, in this situation that we face, to endure those ills we have than to fly to others that we know not of.

Personally I think we'd better endure the ills we have (meaning the tax bill enacted by the recent legislature) than to fly to other ills we know not of.

Who knows WHAT we might get in a reshuffle?

Nikita Raps JFK Talks

BERLIN (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev flew to Berlin today in an attempt to match the personal success of President Kennedy's visit to the divided city 48 hours earlier. He complained that Kennedy's trip was "directed against the interests of the German people."

The Soviet leader landed at East Berlin's Schoenefeld Airfield at 2 p.m. (9 a.m. EDT) to attend celebrations next Sunday of the 70th birthday of East German Communist party boss Walter Ulbricht and perhaps to hold an Eastern Bloc summit meeting.

More Lumber Strikes Threatened

Two Unions Say Talks Not Making Progress

PORTLAND (UPI)—Leaders of two Northwest lumber unions threatened more strikes today in a lumber industry dispute that already has idled some 19,000 workers.
The announcement was made after the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) reported no progress in contract talks with the "Big Six" employer group, composed of St. Regis Paper, U.S. Plywood, Weyerhaeuser, International Paper, Crown Zellerbach and Rayonier.
IWA Regional President Harvey Nelson told newsmen Thursday his union modified its demands on travel time for loggers during Thursday's talk. He said the union also rejected an employer offer concerning weekend working hours. There was no mention of wage discussions.
The meeting was recessed subject to call by either side or by federal mediators.
Officials of the IWA and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW), which also is involved in the dispute, said the two unions would work together to bring the strike to a successful conclusion. They struck St. Regis and U.S. Plywood plants in Oregon, Washington and Northern California June 5 and the other four members of the "Big Six" shut down in retaliation.
Talks also have been recessed with the Timber Operators Council, which represents some 190 firms from California to Alaska.
Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the LSW, said the unions would settle the dispute at their leisure, "even if it takes all summer." He estimated some 70,000 workers might be affected eventually.
He said plans for extending the strike are not completed and declined to pinpoint any specific firms.
"We will select companies we believe best able to pay and to influence the industry to recognize the justice of our demands," Nelson told newsmen.
Hartley said unions feel large lumber firms have "missed the ball in the last few years" on the issue of lumber workers' salaries. Asked if the IWA was satisfied

'ZIP' Code Speeds Mail Delivery

What is the ZIP code now being implemented in Klamath County and all post offices across the nation?

Klamath Falls Postmaster Chet Langslet explained that the code is a five digit distribution code designed to speed mail deliveries by cutting down on the steps required to make a letter from sender to addressee.

It is designed to increase the utilization of electronic data processing equipment now being used by publishers, direct mail advertisers, banks, insurance companies and other large volume mailers in pre-sorting mail.

The code is also expected to aid in the manual distribution of mail and will pave the way for mechanized distribution in post offices when suitable equipment is available. The Portland Post Office, for instance, is already equipped with such machinery.

In less populated areas the first three digits will identify the main focal points of air, highway and rail transportation, and the last two digits will identify the post office or delivery station.

In cities that have local postal zones, the first three digits will identify the area, state and city and the last two will designate the local zone number.

The new coding plan, for the first time, will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading. The address on mail which has no pre-sorting by the mailer must often be read as many as eight or 10 times by postal employees. Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity of human error.

The mailer is not expected to memorize hundreds of ZIP codes. He is expected to learn the ZIP code for his own delivery area and use it in the return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, ZIP codes should be taken from return addresses on incoming mail and used in the return correspondence.

The code number should be placed on correspondence following the city and state in addresses. For example, Herald and News, P.O. Box 941, Klamath Falls, Ore. 97601. The national deadline for implementation of the code is July 1.

Judge Named For Hearing Of Sheriff

Judge Don H. Sanders of Douglas County has been named to serve on the Klamath County Circuit Court bench at a hearing in which Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton will reply to charges of contempt of court filed against him by Deputy District Attorney Gob Thomas.

Notice that Judge Sanders had been assigned to preside at the contempt hearing was made known in a letter received Thursday by the county clerk from William M. McAllister, chief justice of the State Supreme Court. The chief justice did not say when the judge would come to Klamath County.

The assignment of a noninterested judge to serve during the proceedings was made by the chief justice upon the request of the Klamath County Circuit Court in a letter it wrote to the State Supreme Court June 14.

The charges of contempt were filed against Sheriff Britton during the last week of April after he was alleged to have discussed the Robert Huitt trial with a member of the jury assigned to that case. The trial was in process at the time of the incident.

The conversation between the sheriff and the juror was later made known to the court and as a result Judge David R. Vandenberg Sr. declared the case a mistrial.

The substance of the conversation was indicated in affidavits presented to the court by the juror and the deputy district attorney and sets the scene of the incident in an elevator at the courthouse.

On trial was a Robert Huitt, who is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon as the result of the April 22 shooting of a California man at the defendant's residence in Agency. Huitt is accused of wounding the victim in the leg with a bullet discharged from a rifle. His new trial is set for Aug. 6 in Judge Vandenberg's court.

Lodge Gets High Post

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy is sending a leading Republican to a diplomatic post in a country regarded by the State Department as one of the decisive battlegrounds of modern history.

Kennedy announced Thursday in Dublin that he intends to nominate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., former U.N. ambassador and 1960 GOP vice presidential candidate, as American ambassador to Vietnam.

Lodge will take over the post in Saigon this fall, succeeding Frederick E. Nolting Jr.

Southeast Asia in general, and Viet Nam in particular, have been for several years the major area of Communist strategy for expansion by internal subversion and guerrilla warfare.

Goldwater Given Ovation

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—It had all the flavor and color of a Republican presidential nominating convention.

"The man who" was there. Delegates roared their approval of him. They brandished banners, buttons and books during repeated interruptions of a speech by the nation's conservative standard bearer, Sen. Barry Goldwater.

Goldwater, addressing the national Young Republican convention, Thursday lashed out at liberals and President Kennedy.

"It is the moral bankruptcy of the liberal politicians which is causing the young people to move toward the Republican party," the Arizona Republican senator said.

"They are the reactionaries. They haven't had a new idea for 30 years."

He said the liberals are obsessed with economic solutions for all problems and have entered into a "cynical alliance" with big city political bosses. He said city machines were a "national disgrace" and any politicians who accepted their support were "phony liberals" without the ideals of true liberals who pioneered the movement.

The convention delegates, 75 per cent of whom voted support for Goldwater as the 1964 GOP presidential nominee in an informal poll, were prompted to pandemonium by the Arizona delegation which arrived here with 2,000 pounds of signs, campaign buttons and books to extol their state's senator.

The 35-minute speech was hailed with demonstrations of delegates waving Goldwater banners, the Stars and Stripes and Confederate flags.

Observers compared it with old-time nominating conventions with all the elements of a hotly contested fight for the coveted prize.

Goldwater, taking an indirect poke at President Kennedy, said "the stern cold fact is that no Democrat can be elected to national office today who is not unrepentant and unbreakable obligation to the corrupt big-city machine."

He told the crowd between cheers that America's military chiefs should be asked for their opinions on the U.S. nuclear test ban proposals.

Goldwater's speech followed a prediction by former California GOP Sen. William F. Knowland that the Republicans could carry the South in the next election and did not need to win either New York or California to elect a president. Knowland, editor and assistant publisher of the Oakland (Calif.) Tribune, told the convention that "there is no Southern state we need to concede to the New Frontier."

In a similarly prepared statement, District Attorney Crabtree denied having knowledge that the

Ability Of Youth Proven

The ability of youth in employment areas is being proved this summer, and brought to public attention through a cooperative program, "Put Youth On The Job."

The project, undertaken by a local committee of representative groups with the assistance of the Oregon State Employment Service, is of definite benefit not only to the young people seeking work, but to employers as well.

In a short survey made this week, those who have given boys and girls, young men and young women up to 24 years, an opportunity to find his ability level, and a testing program or aptitude tests provide still further information on the applicant's chances for finding employment.
