

# Tourist Facilities Open To Crater Lake Visitors

Summer is coming to Crater Lake National Park and although patches of snow are reminiscent of winter quietude, the tourist facilities with the exception of the Rim Campground, are open to the public.

Regular talks are given by the naturalists on the origin of Crater Lake each evening at 8:30 p.m. at the new amphitheater in Marama.

The Rim Campground is still under snow but should be open later this month. Last Creek Campground has not been occupied yet this summer but is ready for use. Watchman Lookout will be manned this week, and visitors are invited to hike up the trail to the top, where they will get an excellent view of the lake and can visit the Watchman

museum in the ground floor of the lookout.

The spectacular rim drive is open, and the six picnic grounds available will be open in early July.

Superintendent W. Ward Yeager has listed the permanent personnel assigned to Crater Lake National Park since last summer including Richard M. Brown, chief naturalist; Glen F. Kaye, assistant park naturalist; Roy Allen, district park ranger; Larry D. Barney, park ranger; Paul F. Smith, park ranger; Warren Johnson, park engineer; and Lawrence Morton, purchasing agent.

Returning staff members include Superintendent Yeager; Neal G. Guse, assistant superintendent; Marshall B. Evans, chief ranger and Marvin G. Hersey, district park ranger.

Guse is slated to leave in July for a new assignment as superintendent at Hawaii National Park. There are more than 30 additional seasonal uniformed personnel and fire control aides on duty.

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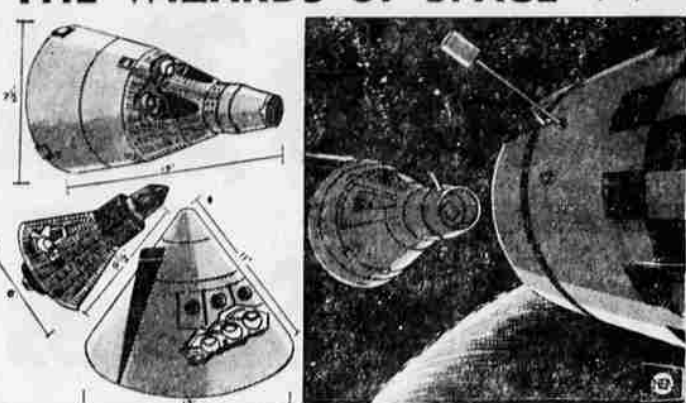
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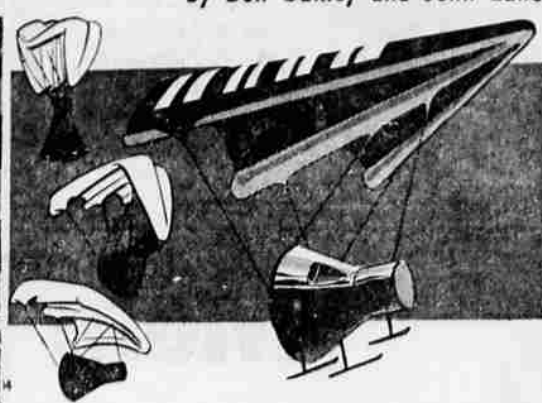
# THE WIZARDS OF SPACE (14)



Of the \$5.7 billion budget for fiscal 1964 proposed by National Aeronautics and Space Administration, nearly two-thirds—\$3.2 billion—will go into manned space flight. In addition, NASA has asked Congress for \$564.5 million to build facilities to support work in this field.

By the time the first Americans land on the moon (1968 to 1970), NASA will have spent, by conservative estimate, \$20 billion to get them there. This is 10 times the cost of the atomic bomb project of World War II.

An estimated 100,000 government, industry, military and educational personnel are being marshalled around the nation for this effort. Headquarters for manned space flight will be in Texas, where NASA is building a \$200



million Manned Spacecraft Center on a 1,600-acre tract 20 miles from downtown Houston.

At present, America has three active man-in-space programs: • Mercury, in its concluding phases. • Gemini, a two-man capsule which will develop the techniques needed for the trip to the moon. • Apollo, the three-man moon landing program.

At Manned Spacecraft Center, every phase and experience of the actual Gemini and Apollo flights will be duplicated on the ground as far as possible. A huge centrifuge will subject capsule and crews to the stresses they will experience in launching. Environmental chambers for both men and capsules will simulate conditions in space. In other simulators, men will

# Financial Worry Faces UN Next Six Months

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—Diplomats agreed today that the financial formula adopted by the General Assembly failed to settle many problems that will plague the United Nations again in six months.

Secretary General Thant scheduled a news conference today and he was expected to express his opinions on the emergency fiscal plan approved by the 11-nation assembly Thursday.

The news conference was scheduled for 11 a.m., EDT.

The most obvious problem left unsolved was the adamant refusal of Russia and its Communist allies to pay for the Congo and Middle East peace-keeping operations despite the overwhelming assembly acceptance that such payments are binding on all members.

The Communists and France were the only serious dissenters Thursday when the assembly approved the seven-part financial program, winding up a 45-day special session called to deal with the money crisis.

The program, aimed at erasing the \$100 million deficit and improving peace-keeping financing in the future, included resolutions which:

—Declared that the financing of peace operations is collective responsibility of all members, and set forth other principles for the future.

—Appropriated \$42.5 million to continue the Congo and Middle East operations until the end of this year.

—Sought to collect the arrears of approximately \$100 million owed by delinquent members for peace activities.

—Extended the sale of U. N. bonds until next Dec. 31.

—Asked Thant to study establishment of a "peace fund" open to subscription by governments, institutions and individuals.

# Tobacco Farm Operator Found Guilty Of Killing Negro Girl

HAGERSTOWN, Md. (UPI)—The youthful operator of a big tobacco farm was found guilty Thursday of manslaughter and assault in the death of a Negro waitress he camed and cursed at a society ball.

William Devereaux Zantinger, 24, accused of striking the woman with a toy cane and using abusive, profane language to address her, was convicted by a three-judge circuit court panel sitting without a jury.

Attorneys for the husky Zantinger, who runs a 1,200-acre farm at Mount Victoria in southern Maryland, were given until Tuesday to file motions for a new trial. The court deferred sentencing until they took the action.

Zantinger faces a maximum punishment of 10 years in prison and a \$500 fine on the manslaughter conviction. There is no set maximum penalty for assault.

The victim, Mrs. Hatti Carroll, 31, who had a history of heart trouble, died of a cerebral hemorrhage eight hours after the incident Feb. 9 in a downtown Baltimore hotel. The panel ruled that the combination of the caning and the abusive language "caused or hastened" her death.

Zantinger, who sat with his head bowed while the verdict was read, also was found guilty of assault on two other Negroes with the cane—a bellhop and a second waitress.

Witnesses said Zantinger cursed Mrs. Carroll, a grandmother who had 11 children of her own, for not getting him a drink fast enough and beat her with his cane. She then collapsed.

# Sub Crash Photos Viewed

ABOARD THE USS FORT SNELLING AT SEA (UPI)—Experts today began analyzing photographs taken of paper scraps on the ocean floor off the New England coast to determine if the pictures were made Thursday by the Navy bathyscaphe Trieste in 8,400 feet of water.

The papers were discovered by the Trieste in a 60-by-70-foot area near the point where the \$45 million sub made its last dive 22 miles from the coast last April 10. The two-man crew aboard the

Trieste also reported making sonar contact with an unidentified 60-foot object in the area.

Two Russian ships renewed intrusions into the 23-mile search area, which was posted as off-limits to non-search vessels in a "notice to mariners" on April 22. The Navy requested ships of all nations to stand clear.

Thursday afternoon, the fishing trawler support ship Kuper, flying the hammer and sickle of the Soviet Union, headed on a course which would have carried it within 1,300 yards of the Trieste's diving position.

Officials said the bathyscaphe and its crew would have sunk if it had surfaced and collided with the Soviet ship.

The Trieste was not scheduled to dive again today. Officials said the bathyscaphe probably would go down Saturday and again on Sunday. The officer in charge of search operations, Capt. Frank A. Andrews, indicated the Sunday dive may be the last in the series if no positive results are obtained then.

# Man Charged In Slayings

NEW LONDON, Conn. (UPI)—A 26-year-old man was arrested and charged with murder today in the shooting deaths Thursday night of a postman, his wife and their 10-year-old son.

Police said the killings climaxed a long-standing feud between the suspect, Nicholas Ukraine, and Robert Reidy, 43, one of the victims Reidy's wife, May, and their 10-year-old son, Mark, were slain in the parlor of their home.

Authorities quoted Ukraine as saying that Reidy, a neighbor, "harassed" him.

Reidy and his wife, a nurse, and Mark were pronounced dead on arrival at Lawrence Memorial Hospital.

Police said the Reidys were killed by three bullets from a .38-caliber revolver.

# Press Bureau Makes Stand

WASHINGTON (UPI)—United Press International told a Senate committee today its Special Service Bureau "does not accept assignments on behalf of foreign governments."

The statement was made by Earl J. Johnson, UPI vice president and editor, in a letter to Sen. J. William Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations.

Johnson said that following a re-examination of the work of the Special Service Bureau, "I see no cause for reproach, implied or otherwise, in this operation."

The committee, studying the operation of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, previously heard testimony that the former International News Service (INS) for a time in 1956 prepared dispatches financed by the late Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo through an American public relations firm. The firm's contract with the INS Special Service Bureau was terminated after INS was merged with United Press in 1958 to form United Press International.

"When UPI took over in 1958, our methods and standards prevailed," Johnson said.

Johnson said that while there was no evidence before the committee that UPI ever had performed such a task, "I understand your concern...and assure you and your committee that we will continue to make certain that it does not."

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
