

Scuba Diving Course Set For July

The course is open to anyone over 12 years of age, but the class will be limited to 10.

Those registering are asked to be at the pool Friday, July 5, for a test on continuous swimming 25 lengths of the pool. The first meeting will be Monday, July 8, 7:30 p.m. at the Klamath Auditorium.

Fee for the course is \$15 per student. Required equipment will be a snorkel tube, flippers and a face plate. Call the pool to register. The number is TU 4-3214.

General Fund Balance May Be \$897,000

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon will end the 1961-63 biennium Sunday with a general fund balance of about \$897,000, Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer predicted today.

General Fund revenues for the biennium totaled about \$233 million, Holmer said, about \$22.3 million less than expected.

The legislature two years ago anticipated general fund revenues of \$255,000,000, Holmer said. The \$897,000 balance takes into account a \$700,000 deficit expected this month in the State Tax Commission.

The bulk of state personal income tax refunds were paid out during June, and Holmer said the refunds would total about \$700,000 more than tax collections for the month.

To keep the state's general fund from skidding into the red, \$5.5 million was transferred to the general fund this month from the veterans' bond sinking fund.

Gov. Mark Hatfield earlier this year ordered a series of severe cutbacks in agency spending. Holmer said the underspending totaled about \$3.7 million.

In addition, there was an \$11 million increase in other state revenues from such items as the increase in the price of liquor. Holmer said personal income tax collections for 1961-63 were \$20.6 million less than expected, and corporate income tax collections were down \$2.2 million.

More Than Double
The \$897,000 balance is more than double the \$473,000 forecast by Gov. Mark Hatfield when he announced his proposed budget for the 1963-65 biennium last Dec. 1.

Some of the state's increased revenue at the end of the biennium resulted because the legislature did not eliminate the liquor purchasers' permit as requested by Hatfield.

The 1963 legislature approved a \$404 million general fund budget for the coming biennium — the largest in the state's history. To finance the budget, a \$60 million revenue increase was adopted. The bill increases state personal income taxes, corporate excise taxes, and grants some relief for taxation of capital gains.

Prison Coed Just Scared

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — An unfortunate thing happened to prison "coed" Sarah Jeannette Johns on her way to the University of Tennessee.

She succumbed to the "sudden temptations of a free, modern society" and kept late hours shortly after she was paroled to attend the university, state Corrections Director Harry Avery said Wednesday.

"I was scared of life," Miss Johns told the Pardon and Paroles Board, which revoked her parole at a hearing Wednesday. She said she went to a movie Monday night, "got scared," and spent the rest of the night and early morning drinking in local taverns. Officers were waiting for her when she returned home at 2 a.m., four hours beyond her parole curfew.

"Her conduct clearly indicates she should not be further paroled at present," said Avery. The 23-year-old woman, who had served four years of a 10-year sentence for armed robbery, was released from prison last week to study criminal psychology at the university. She had earned 12 college credits through correspondence courses.

"She will be privileged to carry on her education through correspondence courses," said Avery.
