

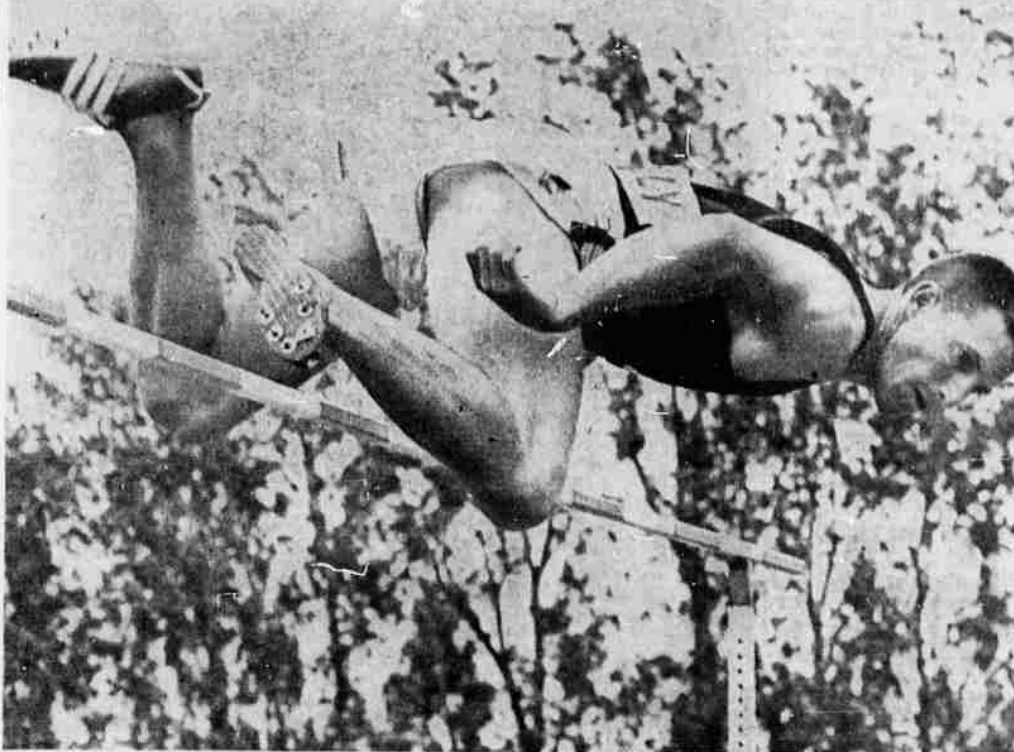
Falcons Strengthen Hold On League Lead, Whip Hawks, 9-0

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Froehling Gains Quarterfinals With McKinley

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Frank Froehling of Coral Gables, Fla., survived a grueling three-hour match with England's Roger Taylor and a questionable linesman's call Saturday to win 2-6, 6-4, 7-9, 6-2, 10-13, and join Chuck McKinley in the men's quarterfinals of the Wimbledon tennis tournament.

By placing both McKinley and Froehling among the last eight survivors in men's singles, the United States made its best Wimbledon showing in three years. Top-seeded Roy Emerson of Australia, seeking a tennis "grand slam," and unseeded Willy Burger of Germany filled the two other men's quarterfinal berths Saturday. Emerson fully avenged a Wimbledon defeat of two years ago when he overcame Lesley Turner of Australia, 4-6, 6-4, 7-5. Last year Miss Moffitt beat top-seeded Margaret Smith of Australia in the opening round.

OSU's Steve Pauly Captures Decathlon

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon State's Steve Pauly, raising to a 1,101 point effort in the javelin, captured the 1963 National AAU decathlon championship Saturday with 7,632 points.

Dick Emberger, a Marine stationed second with 7,331 points, and won the second berth on a United States track team which will compete with Russia and other European countries next month.

Pauly succeeds C. K. Yang of UCLA as national champion. Yang, who holds the world record of 9,121 points, passed up this meet to join other Nationalist Chinese athletes on a European tour.

The 6-foot-4 Oregon State basketball and track star from Beaverton, Ore., had the meet won before he cut loose with a 241-foot-3 javelin throw in the next to last event of the meet, but the 1,101 points he got for that throw were the most in one event in the two-day meet.

Pauly started the day in first place with 4,945 points. He added 894 on a 14.7 time in the 110-

meter hurdles, another 790 with a 149-1/2 foot discus throw.

He then added 715 points with a 12-foot-11 pole vault, and an unseeded 307 with a time of 4:33.6 in the 1,500 meter run which closed the meet.

Competing in his seventh decathlon, Pauly surpassed his all-time best mark in five of the 10 events. His previous best total mark was 7,244 last year. He finished third in the 1962 championships and was a member of the U.S. team which competed against a Russian team last summer at Palo Alto.

Pauly's first day marks were 11.5 in the 100 meter dash, 22 feet 10 in the broad jump, 47 feet in the shot put, six feet in the high jump and 49.6 in the 400 meters.

Behind Pauly and Emberger in the final standings came Dave Edstrom, Oxnard Air Force Base, 7,336; Russ Hodge, Oxnard Air Force Base, 7,112; Bill Toomey, Santa Clara Youth Village, 6,822; Phil Mulkey, Birmingham, Ala., 6,295; and Charles Mosely, University of Alabama, 6,205.

The meet was run in bad weather both days. Temperatures were

in the 50s, heavy rains fell at times and a cold wind blew across the field.

Emberger defeated Edstrom in the final event for second place. The Marine from Roanoke, Va., ran the 1,500 meter in 4:19.2 for 625 points. Edstrom, who had pulled ahead after nine events, scored only 491 points with a 4:32.6 clocking in the event. It was still Edstrom's best time in that event.

Mulkey went for broke in the pole vault and failed. Knowing he would lose ground in the javelin, he elected to pass a number of lower heights in the pole vault and try for a big score at higher elevations. The former Memphis State star cleared 11 feet 10 1/2 inches in his second try and passed again at 13 feet 3/4. Then he failed in three attempts to clear 13 feet 7.

Floyd Patterson Opens Drills

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Floyd Patterson sparred and worked out before more than 1,000 fans packed into the Dunes Hotel exhibit hall Saturday—the largest crowd ever to watch a boxer train in this gambling resort city.

Patterson, training for his July 22 chance to retain the heavyweight championship title from Sonny Liston, went through vigorous sessions, including three rounds of sparring with brother Ray Patterson and Richie Norden of Stamford, Conn.

Liston, who trains at the Thunderbird Hotel, took the day off and will resume Sunday.

The previous largest crowd to watch a boxer in training in Las Vegas was in 1961, when about 900 watched Sugar Ray Robinson train in the same hall for a bout with Gene Fullmer.

Jackson Hurls Three-Hitter

The Klamath Falcons strengthened their hold on first place in the Southern Division of the American Legion Baseball League Saturday night at Gem Stadium when fireballing Rich Jackson stopped the Klamath Hawks on three hits, 9-0.

The win gave the Falcons a 7-1 league record for the season and handed the Hawks their sixth loss in nine games. The Falcons lead the league.

The Klamath Hawks go to Ashland today for another league game while the Falcons, originally slated for a set at Oregon City, will be idle because the Oregon City game was rained out.

The Falcons had the game in hand all the way behind the fast ball offerings of Jackson who has yet to lose a league contest. He struck out seven in getting the win while Steve Young absorbed the loss. He was relieved in the sixth by Tom Pilgrim who worked the final frame.

The league leaders jumped off to a quick 3-0 lead and never were in any real trouble. LeVoy Young led off with a single and went to second base on an error. He wasted his energy as Larry Binney stepped up and tripped him home easily. Binney trotted home when John Parisotto got the third straight hit, but the Falcon third sacker was

chopped down on a throw back to first base when he made his turn. Mike Kitching flew out to center and Jay Paxton was hit by a pitch. He moved to second on an error and scampered home on Dave Johnson's single.

Jackson allowed a hit to lead off batter Dick Bath but didn't give up another hit until the fourth to Alan Kenyon. There wasn't a Hawk base runner to get past second base.

The Falcons came back with the clinching runs in the third inning, five of them. Lanny Guyer led off with a single and Johnson backed him up with another single. Guyer took third when the left fielder bobbled the ball. John Gray's grounder was muffed, allowing Guyer to score. Jackson then hit a single to third. LeVoy Young got his second hit of the game to plate Gray

and Jackson scored on Parisotto's sacrifice fly to right field. Kitching slammed a single to score Young with the fifth run.

The final run by the Falcons came in the fourth. Guyer worked Young for a walk and took second on a wild pitch. Young struck Johnson and Gray out, but hit Jackson with a pitch. He then walked both Young and Binney to score Guyer on a force.

There was no more scoring as Coach John Paxton began inserting subs for the Falcons and Coach Irv Whitte did the same for the Hawks. The Falcons got 14 players into the game and the Hawks 12.

Young, Parisotto and Johnson led the winners with two hits each. Bath, Kenyon and Young got the three hits for the Hawks.

Coach Whitte probably will start Marv Cunningham against Ash-

land today. Ashland has yet to win a game and the Hawks have beaten them once.
