Home Run Baker Is Dead

TRAPPE, Md. (UPI) — The last of Connie Mack's famed \$100,000 infield is dead.

Frank (Home Run) Baker, who earned his nickname by hitting nine home runs for the 1911 Philadelphia Athletics in the era of the "dead ball," died Friday at his home here at the age of 77. Baker, who was voted into baseball's Hall of Fame in 1955, played third base with Mack's A's from 1908 to 1914, forming the \$100,000 infield with Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins and Jack Barry under manager Mack.

The New York Yankees purchased Baker's contract from the A's after the 1916 season and he helped form their original "Murderers Row" in 1921 with Babe Ruth, Wally Pipp, Roger Peckinpaugh and Bob Meusel. Baker called it a career after the 1922 season.

His lifetime batting average was .309 for 13 years in the big leagues and only 93 home runs—considered sub-standard for a slugger in today's age of the lively ball. His career high came in 1913 when he hit 12 homers. In 1913 when Baker hit 12 homers Baker says he would have had 50 "because I hit 30 balls off the right field wall in Shibe Park that would have been home runs with a lively ball."

He was known as a "money" ballplayer also. In 23 World Series games with the A's and Yankees, Baker compiled a .367 average.

In 1915 Baker surprised the baseball world by quitting. He explained: "I simply did not like traveling around the country, being away from home so much, and Connie said I could quit if I wanted to."

Funeral arrangements were not immediately known.

Ragusa Cops Irish Stakes

DUBLIN (UPI) — Ragusa, Ireland's strongest challenger in the \$102,000 Irish Sweep Derby, romped to an easy two and one half length victory in the mile and one-half classic Saturday after Bulka, the overwhelming favorite, turned up lame at the post and was withdrawn.

Bella, winner of the French 2,000 Guineas and the Epsom Derby, had been expected to sweep the international triple crown by winning the Irish Derby which decided sweepstakes winners throughout the world.

But the long-striding son of Tanerko had to be declared out of the race by owner Francois Dupre de France shortly before the start.

Vic Mo Chroi, another French colt, was second two lengths ahead of Tiger, a challenger from England.

Ragusa, third in the Epsom Derby, was heavily played and closed at 100-7 in the betting. Vic Mo Chroi was a 25-1 longshot while Tiger was 18-1.

Oklahoma City's Hurlers Blank Opponents Again

Spokane and Portland batters are wondering today how and when they're going to score some runs—or at least one—off Oklahoma City pitchers.

The 8'er pitchers have zeroed the opposition in the past 23 consecutive innings. Friday night Ben Johnson fired a one-hitter in stopping Portland cold, 3-0. George Brunet shut out Spokane Thursday night and in the Wednesday game the Indians were held scoreless in the last five frames.

Johnson, a 13-year veteran, had his bid for a no-hitter spoiled by leadoff batter Chet Boak who singled sharply to left field in the eighth. However, Danny Murphy cut him down as he tried for a double with a perfect strike throw.

Murphy also helped the 8'ers cause with a two run home run in the fourth frame.

Johnson faced but 29 men in winning his sixth game in nine decisions. He fanned five and walked two.

In other games, Spokane downed Dallas-Ft. Worth 3-2; Denver outscored Seattle 16-9; San Diego downed Salt Lake City 3-1 and top-ranked Tacoma in the Northern Division copped a 3-1 tilt from Hawaii.

Giant Manager Andy Gilbert once again had to call an old reliable John Pregrener to get his club out of hot water. He struck out Carlos Bernier, who had homered for Hawaii's only run in the sixth inning.

Fine Crowd
Another fine crowd of 6,002 fans saw Danny Rivas get the victory, his eighth against three losses. He fanned 12 and walked two in 8 2-3 innings.

Pregrener now has struck out eight of the 13 men he faced in the series.

Consecutive singles by four Giants accounted for two tallies in the fifth and the final score came on a double by Bill Hain and a single by Jerry Robinson.

Spokane collected all of its hits and runs in the first three innings against Dallas-Ft. Worth with a key blow being George Banks' 36-foot homer, his 12th of the season and second in as many games for Spokane.

Rowe Helps
Norm Koch won the game, needing help from Ken Reese in the seventh. Koch's record stands at 6-4, while loser Gary Dotter has 4-4.

After holding down a 10-1 lead, Denver almost blew it in the seventh inning when Seattle pushed six runs across the plate before being retired. It was the fourth straight win for the Bears, who tallied five runs in the sixth on homers by Lou Klimech and J. W. Porter.

Seattle's big seventh was topped by a bases-loaded triple by Stan Johnson. He also had two other hits and a brace of walks for a big evening at the plate.

Russ Herman was the winner and has a 1-1 mark while Guido Grilli was charged with the loss and has 1-1.

Catcher Jim Sual was the hero for San Diego when he belted a home run in the eighth with Chico Ruiz on base. At the time the score was deadlocked at 1-1. Ruiz scored the other Padre run in the first when he singled, stole his 25th base and scored on a wild pitch.

John Flavin went the route for his fifth decision as he bested Koonce, also going the distance.

Papke Finishes 22-Mile Swim

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (UPI) — Isaac (Bo) Papke, 36-year-old veteran San Francisco distance swimmer, Saturday completed a 22-mile swim from Santa Catalina Island to the mainland.

Lifeguards reported Papke, who left the island Friday night at 7:53 p.m. (PDT), reached the coast near the Marineland Pier at 8:38 a.m. Saturday for a total swimming time of 12 hours and 45 minutes.

Papke, father of four and a native of Honolulu, used the Catalina Channel crossing as training for the "big swim" he hopes to make from the Farallones to San Francisco's ocean beach—a distance of 28 miles—next fall.
